Part II.

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FOREWORD

A MODERN COLLEGE.

"The Georgia State College for Women is distinctly a woman's college. It does not seek to imitate the educational practices that have prevailed in colleges for men. It does not seek to conform to tradition. In its fixed requirements, the College has deliberately broken away from what it considers many of the false fashions of the past. It believes that women have interests and ambitions and spheres of usefulness peculiarly their own. It believes that there are fields of work for women which call for new courses of study. It believes that the education of young women should be vitally concerned first about matters of health and character and personality. It believes that all the sciences and arts should be made to contribute to an improvement of the home, the school, the farm, the child, and of society in general. Following these new ideals in education, the College asks not only what has been taught, but also what ought to be taught to women."—Statement of Dr. Marvin M. Parks, President, in Annual Report, June, 1913.

THE COLLEGE

LOCATION.

The Georgia State College for Women is located at Milledgeville, a city of 5,534 inhabitants, situated in Baldwin County, on the Oconee River, near the geographical center of the State. As the old capital of the State for many years during the most interesting periods in the history of Georgia, and in the days of her greatest statesmen, the city of Milledgeville is full of inspiring historical associations. It is now a beautiful, thrifty, well-paved city, serving as the center of an urban and suburban population of over ten thousand people, and both in orderliness and culture an ideal home for the college.

Milledgeville is a very healthful city. It is free from malaria and all climatic diseases, and is abundantly supplied with pure water from a good system of waterworks. The surrounding country is rolling in its formation and presents to the eye as beautiful and varied landscapes as can be seen anywhere in Georgia. The society is as good as can be found in any locality in the State. There are Baptist, Episcopal, Methodist, Presbyterian and Roman Catholic churches in the city, with regular services in each church every Sunday.

The city is easily accessible from all parts of the State by means of the Georgia Railroad (Macon and Augusta), and the Central of Georgia Railway (Macon and Covington); and also by bus.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT.

This college is the State College for Women. It was created by a special act of the Georgia Legislature in the summer of 1889. The bill for its establishment was introduced into the lower house of the Legislature by Hon. W. Y. Atkinson, then a representative from Coweta county, and afterwards for two terms Governor of the State. He was president of the Board of Directors of the College from its foundation to the time of his death in 1899. He was succeeded in this office by the Hon. F. G. DuBignon, by Col. James M. DuPree, by the Hon. T. E. Atkinson, and by Chief Justice Richard B. Russell.

The first president of the College was Dr. Joseph Harris Chappell, who held the office from 1890 to 1905, a term of fifteen years, the last year being spent on leave of absence, during which Dr. Marvin McTyeire Parks was acting president. In 1905 Dr. Parks was elected president and served continuously, save for an interruption of eleven months (August 1, 1922, to June 30, 1923), while acting as State Superintendent of Schools, until his untimely death on December 29, 1926. Dr. Jasper Luther Beeson, who had served as acting president of the College from August 1, 1922, to June 30, 1923, was again made acting president and served as such until his election as President of the College, July 31, 1928.

The work of the College, from the beginning, when the foundations were well laid, has been full of vital energy. The growth of the institution in numbers and influence throughout the State has been very rapid, until it has now become one of the three leading institutions of higher learning in Georgia.

The College has remained firm to its ideal and purpose as a woman's college and is striving, without sacrificing the realization of the noblest culture and the attainment of high scholarship, to fit young women for proper home-making, for teaching and other educational and vocational pursuits, and for taking their proper part in intellectual, social and political activities.

AN EDUCATIONAL PIONEER.

The Georgia State College for Women has been a pioneer in many forms of education which are now becoming more popular, and are promising to be of vast service to the State. Founded in 1889, following upon the establishment of the Georgia School of Technology for men, this institution was the first college for women supported by the State of Georgia. It was the first normal school in Georgia, and the first to offer a modern professional training for teachers. It was the first college to require Agriculture and Home Economics in a regular course of study for students. It was the first college in Georgia to teach Home Economics. It was the first institution in the South (in 1906) to place Home Economics on a par with any other department, and to offer diplomas for specialization in the home sciences and arts. For several years, even before the influence of the great war had accelerated

interest in that direction, this institution was among the first in the country to place great emphasis upon Health Education, and to maintain a fully organized department for the study of that subject. Lastly, it was the first normal school in the State to rise into a standard college and to confer the baccalaureate degrees. The college rejoices in the opportunity it has had for this pioneer service to the State of Georgia, and the South, and it is gratified at the growing popularity of these subjects, which have been rapidly incorporated in the curricula of many colleges and universities.

RIGHT KIND OF FASHION IN EDUCATION.

The recent rapid growth of the College is gratifying; the increased attendance, the new buildings, the attractive equipment, the harmonious organization, the splendid curricula, the fine college spirit,—all these are encouraging. But more important than temporary success, is the influence a college exerts upon the formation of correct ideals. Hence, the Georgia State College for Women desires not primarily to achieve success, but to promote a type of education suited to the real needs of the young women of Georgia of the present day. The College has always exerted an influence upon the formation of the right kind of fashion in education. The success of the College in this respect in Georgia is a no mean achievement.

PURPOSES OF THE COLLEGE.

The object of the State in establishing and supporting this College is to provide for the young women of Georgia an institution in which they may get such special instruction and training as will prepare them to earn their own living by the vocation of teaching or by those industrial and fine arts that are suitable for women to pursue. Moreover, for the sake of a higher culture, the institution teaches those branches of learning that constitute a good general education and lead to the achieving of the baccalaureate degrees and to the becoming competent to pursue graduate studies after graduation. It furthermore instructs and trains its students in those household arts and sciences that are essential to the complete education of every woman, whatever her calling in life may be or in whatever sphere of society she may move. In other words, the purpose of the College is to prepare the young women of Georgia:

1. To do intelligent work as teachers, according to the best methods known to modern pedagogy.
2. To earn their own livelihood by the practice of some one or other of those industrial arts suitable for women to follow.
3. To exert an uplifting and refining influence on the family and society by means of cultured intellect, which can only be attained by a systematic education in the higher branches of learning.

4. To be skillful and expert in those domestic arts that lie at the foundation of all successful housekeeping and homemaking
5. To be competent to pursue graduate studies and achieve the higher degrees.

RELATION TO THE PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM OF THE STATE.

The Georgia State College for Women is a teachers' college of the State, granting degrees and diplomas to larger classes of students each year, who go out well trained for positions in the elementary schools, the high schools, and special lines of instruction, throughout the State.

EQUIPMENT OF THE COLLEGE

RESOURCES AND ADMINISTRATIVE ECONOMY.

The plant of the Georgia State College for Women, including buildings, grounds, and equipment, is now valued at about one and three-fourths million dollars. The actual appropriations from the State for buildings and equipment since the establishment of the College thirty-six years ago have been small. But the present estimated value has come not only from direct appropriation by the State, but also from the marked economy in construction, from the building and equipment added through the savings from college management, from the grounds and old Executive Mansion, Annex and Hospital donated to the College, and finally from the rapid increase in the value of buildings and grounds.

The annual income of the College from state appropriations, beginning January, 1930, is as follows:

For maintenance.....	\$210,000.00
For extension work	12,500 00

The buildings of the College, though beautiful in architecture and convenient in arrangement, have been erected with marked economy, and the administration of the College has been noted for its careful business management. There has been a special effort in the College to maintain economy for the State, for the parent, and for the student.

MATERIAL EQUIPMENT.

The buildings and grounds of the Georgia State College for Women are valued at nearly one and three-fourths million dollars. The college buildings are made of red brick, with white stone trimmings; and the more recent of them are of a uniform style of architecture, being adorned with stately Corinthian columns. Altogether, the architectural effect is imposing and attractive, and contributes a pleasing and educative influence to the entire college community. The present equipment is as follows:

1. *Campus.* The College Campus consists of twenty-three acres in the central part of the City of Milledgeville. Surrounded by well-paved streets and adorned with stately buildings, with well-kept lawns and a luxuriant growth of trees, the campus attracts universal admiration.

2. *Government Square Park.* The campus grounds were greatly enlarged through the purchase by the College of about sixteen acres of land near the present campus. These additional grounds have made possible an extension of playground facilities and a greater future development of the entire institution. The purchase price was \$7,500.00. The first payment was made by the Senior Class of 1919; the balance was secured by the President of the College without cost to the State. In the spring of 1929 a suitable lodge, constructed of logs, was erected for the use and comfort of the students and faculty, and the grounds have been much improved. A fund, donated by the Class of 1920, made these improvements possible in part.

3. *The Mansion.* This magnificent building was erected in 1838, as a residence for the governors of Georgia, when Milledgeville was the capital of the State. For thirty years it was the Executive Mansion of the State of Georgia; and, as such, it served as the home of Governors George R. Gilmer, Charles J. McDonald, George W. Crawford, George W. B. Towns, Howell Cobb, Herschell V. Johnson, Joseph E. Brown, James Johnson, Charles J. Jenkins and General Thomas H. Ruger. The Mansion is now used as a college dormitory and as the residence of the President of the College.

4. *Main College Hall.* This commodious building of four stories, situated near the center of the campus and forming a part of the original equipment of the College, was destroyed by fire, December 8, 1924. The corner stone, still preserved, of the building was laid on November 27, 1890, and it was completed in the following year. It was used exclusively for teaching and classroom purposes and for the administrative offices of the College.

5. *Annex Dormitory.* This building, which was erected in 1892, is connected by a short arcade with the Mansion and is used as a dormitory. It has a dining hall in its basement.

6. *Atkinson Hall.* This large brick building, erected in 1896, is well equipped for the accommodation of nearly two hundred students. The basement of this building contains a dining hall in which daily about nine hundred regular students are accommodated. During August and September, 1930, the structure was remodelled by removing the wooden gables and porches and substituting therefor uniform cornices and a brick portico with fluted Corinthian columns, so that the building is now one of the most beautiful edifices of the front facade of the campus. The cost of this remodelling has been about \$12,500.

7. *Chappell Hall.* This building, which is beautiful in architecture, was named in honor of Dr. Joseph Harris Chappell, the first President of the College. It was completed in May, 1907, and is well-equipped for the purpose for which it is used. The first story affords classrooms for the work in English, Health, Home Economics Education, and in Household Science, while the two remaining stories are occupied by the departments of Household Science and Household Art.

8. *Terrell Hall.* This dormitory, completed in September, 1908, is considered one of the handsomest college dormitories in the South. It is attractive in the interior furnishings, as well as in the exterior architecture. The rooms are well ventilated, well lighted, and furnished in simple and refined taste. In addition to the ordinary furniture, each room contains a small closet and is also supplied with a lavatory, having both hot and cold water. This dormitory accommodates one hundred and thirty-six students, and has also apartments for the matron.

9. *Terrell Hall Annex A.* This building contains on the ground floor a large room which is used as the College Library. On the upper floors are bed rooms, with accommodations for 106 students. There is a connecting bath for each room. The rooms in this Annex are attractive in equipment and offer modern accommodations to students. The Annex was erected at a cost of \$25,000 under the direct supervision of the President of the College. It was erected without cost to the taxpayers of the State, and was completed in August, 1922.

10. *Terrell Hall Annex B.* This building is 120 feet long by 40 feet wide. It contains two large rooms on the ground floor, one being utilized as a pantry and storage room, the other as a portion of the gymnasium. There are accommodations for 120 students in the building. The furniture is attractive, and the equipment is thoroughly modern. There is a connecting bath for each room. The building cost around \$30,000, and was erected under the direct supervision of the President of the College, and without cost to the taxpayers of Georgia. It was completed in June, 1924.

11. *Terrell Hall Annex C.* This building was begun in June, 1924. It cost around \$25,000, and gives accommodations for about 100 students. The rooms have connecting baths and attractive furniture. It was erected under the direct supervision of the President of the College, and without cost to the taxpayers of the State. Its basement serves as a portion of the gymnasium of the college.

12. *Parks Hall.* This hall, completed in 1911 and named after Dr. Marvin McTyeire Parks, the second president of the college, consists of three stories and a basement. Its splendid architectural outlines, its ornaments of stone, and its stately Corinthian columns, combine to make this building an object of attractiveness and admiration. The hall is devoted largely to the study of the sciences, having classrooms, lecture rooms, and laboratories for work in Chemistry, Physics, Geography, Biology, Zoology, Botany, Agriculture, and Psychology, as well as for History, Rural Education, Economics and Sociology. The offices of the President, Bursar and Registrar are on the first floor of this building, while on the second floor is a room for editorial work.

For the erection of this building, the Legislature of the State appropriated \$35,000.00 in August, 1910. The hall was completed for \$34,969.97. The balance of \$30.03 was returned to the State Treasurer, thus disposing of the last cent of the original appropriation. This is one of the few instances in the history of the State when a surplus was returned to the State Treasurer from an appropriation. This building is now worth probably \$100,000.00.

13. *Ennis Hall.* This beautiful dormitory was erected during the first year of the World War, being completed in the fall of 1917. With its attractive architecture, harmonizing with the other buildings on the campus, and with its stately elevation, the building gives a pleasing and imposing appearance. It is located at the rear of the Mansion Annex, and on the south side of the campus, facing the long row of buildings on the north side. In addition to the large and well-lighted basement, and in addition to the roof garden on the top, the building contains about sixty rooms on the first, second and third stories. Adjoining each bed room is a connecting bath room with tile floor, and thoroughly modern equipment.

The money for the erection of this building was appropriated in 1916. The amount was \$50,000.00, and although the building had to be erected in the summer and fall of 1917, during the war time, when labor was scarce and materials were high, nevertheless, the building was completed within the state appropriation of \$50,000.00, and no additional appeal was made to the Legislature for extra funds for the building or for equipment.

14. *The Richard B. Russell Auditorium.* This Auditorium was begun in the Fall of 1925 to replace the Auditorium in the Main Building which had been destroyed by fire on December 8, 1924. It is one of the most beautiful buildings on the campus. The building has four massive stone columns on the front. The interior is very attractive and has hung upon its walls a beautiful

full-length portrait of the late President Marvin McTyeire Parks, painted by William Steene and unveiled in the memorial service at the Commencement of 1927; and also a portrait of Dr. J. Harris Chappell, the first president of the college. It was painted by Burtis Baker of the Corcoran Art Gallery and unveiled at the Commencement of 1930. The seating capacity, including the stage, is nearly eighteen hundred. The building was erected from a part of the money appropriated by the Legislature on July 20, 1925, amounting to \$195,000 for the erection of class room buildings and an auditorium.

15. *The Heating Plant.* The Heating Plant was erected during the summer and Fall of 1925. This serves as a place for the boilers and heating system of the Auditorium, Dormitories, Hospital, and Class Room Buildings. It was erected from a part of the money appropriated by the Legislature on July 20, 1925, amounting to \$195,000 for the erection of an auditorium and class room buildings.

16. *The Arts Building.* The Arts Building was begun in the summer of 1925 to replace the class rooms in the Main Building, which had been destroyed by fire on December 8, 1924. The length is 180 feet and the width is sixty feet. The building is beautiful in architecture with Corinthian columns at the front. The class rooms are well equipped with modern furniture, with charts, maps, pictures, and projecting lanterns. It was erected from a part of the money appropriated by the Legislature on July 20, 1925, amounting to \$195,000 for the erection of class room buildings and an auditorium. The building is occupied by the departments of Latin, French, Spanish, Art, Commerce, Mathematics, Education and Psychology, and English.

17. *The Arts Building Addition No. 1.* This building is used in the Teachers' College as a Practice and Demonstration School in secondary school work. The building is behind the Arts Building, being joined to it by a twenty-foot connecting bridge. It is of the same style of architecture. It was erected from a part of the money appropriated by the Legislature on July 20, 1925, amounting to \$195,000 for the erection of an auditorium and class room buildings.

The building is sixty feet wide, one hundred feet long, and two and one-half stories high. This building is an addition to the Arts Building made possible by the economical use of the money appropriated by the Legislature. The erection of this building was not at first contemplated as it was thought that all of the money would be required for the building of the Auditorium and the Arts Building. However, by careful management, the Building Committee found that it was possible to make the new building larger than was contemplated, and hence the State has gotten this large and beautiful building as an addition to the Arts building without any extra appropriation. This building contains, besides various class rooms, a well-equipped Science laboratory for the Peabody Practice School.

18. *The Arts Building Addition No. 2.* This building is located immediately behind the Arts Building Addition No. 1. It is joined to that building

by a connecting bridge twenty feet long. This second addition to the Arts building was erected from a part of the money appropriated by the Legislature on July 20, 1925, amounting to \$195,000, for the erection of an auditorium and class room buildings. The building is used in the Teachers' College as a Practice and Demonstration School for elementary school work. The building is over one hundred and fifty feet long and sixty feet wide. It contains, besides class rooms, splendidly equipped laboratories in Household Science and Household Art for the use of the Peabody Practice School.

The erection of this building was not originally contemplated, but it was made possible by the economical use of public funds so that the Arts Building, which was intended, according to the original plans, to be one hundred and eighty feet long, was enlarged until the same building now stretches for a distance of four hundred and seventy feet. The Arts Building with its two additions, therefore, is more than one-twelfth of a mile in length and is an illustration of economy in the erection of public buildings, since for a total appropriation of \$195,000, the State has secured the five buildings previously described, including the magnificent Auditorium, the modern Heating Plant, the large Arts Building, and the two large Additions for the Peabody Practice School.

19. *The Parks Memorial Hospital.* The Parks Memorial Hospital, situated on the northeast corner of the Campus, was built, at a cost of \$36,500, from the voluntary contributions of the alumnae with the help of the Faculty, students and friends of the College without cost to the State. The value of this beautiful fire-proof building and its splendid equipment is placed at \$50,000. Its architecture is harmonious with the other edifices of the Campus, and the alumnae have placed at its entrance a bronze memorial tablet bearing a bas-relief portrait of the late President Marvin MacTyeire Parks. The building was dedicated at the Commencement of 1928.

20. *The Miller S. Bell Hall.* The Miller S. Bell Hall, providing housing for 330 students and containing 110 rooms with connecting baths, five parlors, and two offices, has been erected to the east of Terrell Hall under the direction of a committee of the Board of Directors and the President and without special appropriation by the State. It is similar in form and architecture to Terrell Hall and its annexes and completes the splendid row of edifices forming the front facade of the College. Ground was broken in September, 1927, for the structure, which was a year in building, it being ready in part for occupancy in September, 1928. The cost of this fine dormitory was \$115,000.

21. *Library.* The Library is composed of over 26,000 bound volumes, and receives regularly the best of the periodicals of interest to the work of the faculty and students, and also the current magazines and daily newspapers. The reference books are particularly well-chosen for scholarly work in the several departments of the College. The Library is in charge of a librarian and a staff of assistants who help students in every possible way to make the best use of these resources.

22. *Peabody Practice School.* Connected with the Teachers' College is a large, well-organized, well-equipped, training-school of eleven grades, known as the Peabody Practice School. The attendance is made up of children ranging from six to sixteen years of age. This School is much more than a mere adjunct to the Teachers' College. It is a real school, organized for actual work with a faculty of supervisors and critic teachers, who are experienced and highly gifted instructors, thoroughly familiar with the best modern methods of teaching. The School has well-equipped rooms in the two additions to the Arts Building for the work of each grade, and is one of the important centers around which the work of the entire Teachers' College is organized. It is of incalculable value and advantage to the students in the Teachers' College, serving them both as a school of observation and as a school for practice teaching.

23. *Music Equipment.* The equipment for work in music is well up to the standards usually found in the better institutions of learning. The teachers are provided with studios where lessons may be given apart from other college work.

24. *Pipe Organ.* A handsome Pipe Organ was installed in the new Auditorium during March and April, 1927. It was built by the Moller Organ Company. The Organ is not only massive in size but is guaranteed by the makers to be equal in quality to any organ in the United States of its size.

ASSISTANCE TO STUDENTS AND ALUMNAE.

A SCHOLARSHIP.

The Lowe Scholarship. Established by the late Mrs. Bettie Harris Lowe, who by her last will and testament left the bulk of her estate to this purpose. The income from the fund is sufficient to pay all the expenses of one or two students. The beneficiaries must be residents of Pulaski County.

LOAN FUNDS.

A number of funds are available from which loans can be secured.

Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors are given preference in securing these loans. After attending the College for a year, the student has had a better opportunity to prove her worthiness for a loan, as regards scholarship, health, personality, ability and character.

1. *The Faculty Loan Fund.* It is maintained by the members of the Faculty by a voluntary assessment on their salaries. The beneficiaries are elected by the committee of the Faculty Loan Fund from year to year, and are always students whose character and needs are well known to the teachers. Applications should be made to the committee, Professor O. A. Thaxton, Chairman.

2. *A Loan Fund.* Maintained by a friend of the College who does not desire his name published. Application should be made to the Bursar of the College.

3. *The Philo Sherman Bennett Fund.* This fund amounts to five hundred dollars, but only the interest is to be used each year for the aid of some deserving student. This fund was given to the Georgia State College for Women several years ago by Mrs. W. J. Bryan, of Miami, Florida, who acted as a trustee for the late Philo Sherman Bennett, and who selected this College as one of the beneficiaries of the Bennett Fund. Application should be made to the President of the College.

4. *The Chappell Loan Fund.* Established by contributions from the friends of Dr. J. Harris Chappell, who was the president of the College from its foundation until 1905, the year before his death. Applications should be made to Professor Alice Napier, Chairman.

5. *The Anna Brown Small Loan Fund.* In 1909 the fund was established as a memorial to her mother by the lamented Mrs. Clem Steed Hardman, of Macon. Each year this fund is loaned to two students of recognized ability and character who need financial aid, preference being given to young women who have already spent a year in the College. Application should be made to Professor Alice Napier, Chairman.

6. *The Corrie Hoyt Brown Loan Fund.* This fund was established at the Georgia State College for Women in September, 1919, by Mr. George M. Brown, who donated to the College high grade interest-bearing stocks valued at \$3,000.00. Through subsequent donations of Mr. Brown, and through enhancement in the value of the stocks donated, the value of the fund now amounts to more than \$7,000.00. The income is to be loaned each year to worthy students, at a low rate of interest. It is planned that the fund may grow in size and in service as the loans are repaid, and thus extend the usefulness of the fund by increasing the number of beneficiaries. Those desiring to make applications for loans from this fund should communicate directly with the President of the College, giving full information regarding needs and qualifications.

7. *The Frances Clementine Tucker Fund.* In January, 1920, notice was received at the College that a limited number of its students could secure loans from the Frances Clementine Tucker Fund in amounts from \$50.00 to \$250.00, at 4 per cent. interest. Mrs. Frances Clementine Tucker died in Atlanta on November 5th, 1917. She left an estate which, "under the wise provision of her bequest, will bless humanity perpetually, and with the passing years will deepen and widen until it will be felt by thousands of people everywhere." In order to secure the benefits of this fund, an applicant should be at least sixteen years old, of good health and fine moral character, and she should have scholarship equivalent to graduation from a four-year high

school, and be qualified to enter the Freshman class at the College. Applications for this fund should be addressed to Messrs. O. E. and M. C. Horton, Trustees of the Frances Clementine Tucker Fund, 140 Peachtree Street, Atlanta, Georgia.

8. *The Joseph M. Terrell Loan Fund.* In May, 1924, Judge Render Terrell, Executor, deposited with the College \$5,000.00 in bonds, as provided for in the will of the late ex-Governor Joseph M. Terrell. According to the terms of the will of ex-Governor Terrell, \$5,000.00 is donated to the Georgia State College for Women to be kept intact, and the interest from this sum is to be applied each year as a loan fund to worthy students. The income from the bonds will amount to \$250.00 per year. While the fund to be loaned the first year is relatively small, yet the amount will increase each year until in years to come the amount to be loaned will exceed the original donation of \$5,000.00. This donation was officially accepted with thanks by the Board of Directors at the annual meeting on May 31, 1924.

9. *The Alice Walker Shinholser Memorial Fund.* In 1924 Mr. John W. Shinholser of Macon generously indicated his purpose to establish the Alice Walker Shinholser Memorial Fund, beginning with a donation of \$1,000. He designated that this memorial gift should be used as a loan fund for worthy students in the Senior Class. This fund is to be loaned to Seniors in amounts not exceeding \$200 and for a period of years not exceeding two years. It is desired that this fund may grow in size and in service as the loans are repaid, thus extending the usefulness of the gift by increasing the number of beneficiaries.

10. *Thomas E. Mitchell Educational Loan Fund.* Preference given to students who live in Columbus and Muscogee County, next to those that live in that region, finally to students from other sections. The donation was made by Doctor Thomas E. Mitchell of Columbus, Georgia, to the University of Georgia as an educational fund for the students of the various colleges in the University System. Application should be made to the President of the College.

11. *Georgia Home Economics Loan Fund.* The Georgia Home Economics Association is offering a loan fund for students majoring in Home Economics. Applications for the loans from the above fund should be made to Miss Gussie H. Tabb or to the Chairman of the School of Home Economics of this College.

TEACHERS' EXCHANGE.

For the purpose of assisting recipients of diplomas and graduates of the College in securing positions, and school authorities in securing teachers, the College has a permanent appointments committee, known as the *Teachers' Exchange*. This committee keeps the records of all recipients of diplomas and graduates interested in teaching; and it assists, in ways that are fair and just, in opening up communication between these recipients and graduates and such school authorities as are in need of teachers. The ideal is always to serve

both the teacher and the school. The Teachers' Exchange also consults with representatives of Boards of Education and other school officers about their interests, and arranges for them personal conferences with prospective teachers. All correspondence about positions, or teachers, should be directed to this committee, and not to the individual officers and teachers of the College. *Address all communications to*

LEARNED SOCIETIES IN THE COLLEGE.

CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY PROFESSORS.

In 1927 a Chapter was formed in the College of the American Association of University Professors, the objects whereof are "to facilitate a more effective co-operation among teachers and investigators in universities and colleges, and in professional schools of similar grade, for the promotion of the interests of higher education and research, and in general to increase the usefulness and advance the standards and ideals of the profession." The officers for 1930-'31 are: President, Dr. Sidney Lamont McGee; Vice-President, Professor Alice Napier; Secretary, Miss Maggie M. Jenkins; Treasurer, Associate Professor Hallie Claire Smith.

THE DOCTORS' ACADEMY OF THE GEORGIA STATE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN.

On May 5, 1928, the Doctors' Academy of the University of Arizona granted through Dr. Francis Potter Daniels, a Charter to seven Charter Fellows to found the Doctors' Academy of the Georgia State College for Women "for the promotion of a keener spirit of research and a finer love of scholarship in faculty and alumnae, the encouragement of graduate study among the alumnae, and the deepening of the ties of fellowship between faculty and alumnae." The officers for 1929-'31 are: President, Dr. Jasper Luther Beeson; Vice-President, Dr. George Harris Webber; Secretary, Dr. Alice Cushman Hunter; Treasurer, Dr. Thomas Burton Meadows.

GEORGIA BETA CHAPTER OF PI GAMMA MU IN THE GEORGIA STATE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

On January 30, 1929, Pi Gamma Mu, National Honor Society, granted a charter to Georgia Beta Chapter in the Georgia State College for Women. The

purpose of Pi Gamma Mu is the inculcation of the ideals of scholarship, scientific attitude and method, and social service in the study of all social problems. The officers for 1929-'30 are: President, Miss Mary Eunice Moss; Vice-President, Mrs. Marguerite Eugenia Jackson King; Secretary and Treasurer, Dr. George Harris Webber.

STUDENT LIFE AND ACTIVITIES

BIBLE STUDY CLASSES.

For the religious instruction and benefit of the students Bible Study Classes have been established as a permanent institution. The object of these is to give to the students of the College instruction in the Bible. The classification of the students is non-sectarian, and the entire spirit and teaching are undenominational. The instructors are members of the College Faculty, all of whom have had extensive experience. The utmost pains are taken in the selection of text-books, and in making out the course of study, and the Classes are organized and taught on a plan that cannot fail to make them of great benefit to the students. The aim is to make them attractive, instructive, and edifying.

Attendance is entirely voluntary, though the President and Faculty earnestly hope that every student in the College will become a member of some one of these. No student of the College, except those who live in Milledgeville, will be permitted to attend any of the Sunday Schools in the city.

YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

The greatest social bond among the girls in their college life is probably the Young Women's Christian Association. This national organization is an association of girls and women for the purpose of world-wide Christian service. It stands for a three-fold development; physical, mental, and spiritual. A branch of the Association was established quite a number of years ago at this College, and has proved to be a great and vital influence for good. The local organization includes in its membership a large portion of the student

body. The Association carries on its work under the supervision and guidance of a General Secretary employed by the Association, and it receives every encouragement from the Advisory Board of the Faculty.

The aim of the Association is to train young women for intelligent and efficient Christian leadership. This is done by means of four branches of service, including Morning Watch, which is held in every dormitory each morning and which is led at least once by almost every student; Bible Study classes held every Sunday morning for the purpose of systematically studying the Bible; World Fellowship Classes, which are held on each dormitory floor on every Thursday night, and which promote discussions of the vital national and international problems of the day, thus training the students in good citizenship; and Vespers, which are held in the chapel each Sunday evening and which include short programs and congregational singing. At various intervals the Association secures interesting speakers to address the students at the vesper services.

The Young Women's Christian Association is an organization of college girls, conducted by the girls, for the purpose of helping each other. The Blue Triangle is the symbol of a Christian atmosphere; and the fine religious and moral influence of the organization is felt throughout the College.

COLLEGE PUBLICATIONS.

At present the College maintains the following publications:

The Bulletin. This is a monthly publication, issued by the College, and devoted to the special types of educational work and public welfare encouraged by the several colleges, and departments of instruction, within the general

College. Lists of the Bulletins already published, and copies, may be had by addressing the President.

The Spectrum. This is an annual in book form published by the student body and illustrative of student life and its collegiate surroundings. The Editor-in-chief for 1929-'30 was Miss Robertine MacClendon; for 1930-'31, Miss Kathryn Vinson.

The Colonnade. This is a college newspaper published bi-monthly by the students of the College. The Editor-in-chief for 1929-'30 is Miss Caroline Selman; for 1931 Miss Margaret Trapnell.

The Corinthian. This is a literary magazine, sponsored by the *Literary Guild*, which appears twice each semester during the regular college year and once during the Summer Session. The Editor-in-chief for 1929-'30, was Miss Dorcas Rucker, and for 1930-'31, Miss Norma Dunaway.

DEPARTMENTAL CLUBS.

The students of many Departments have associated themselves into clubs for educational and social benefit. Among these are the Classical Guild, the Commerce Club, the English Sophomore Club, the French Club, the Health Club, the History Club, the Home Economics Club, the Literary Guild, the Mathematics Club, the Science Club, and the Spanish Club.

COLLEGE LYCEUM AND OTHER ATTRACTIONS.

Public entertainments, and occasions of cultural instruction, are liberally provided under the auspices of the College for the students within the institution. The following are among the attractions of each college year:

College Lyceum. The College maintains a regular Lyceum course each year. During the last year approximately eleven hundred students joined the course by paying the membership fee of \$1.50, thus availing themselves of many evenings of entertainment, including lectures, impersonations, magic, musical programs, and other attractions.

Special Lectures. During the year public lectures and addresses are occasionally given at the College by ministers, educators, and other visitors.

Moving Pictures. The pleasure and profit to be derived from high class moving pictures are fully recognized by the College. A moving picture machine has been installed in the gallery of the Auditorium, and once or twice a week students are given the privilege of this form of entertainment.

College Glee Club. This club represents organized musical talent from among the young women of the College. The members of this club have special training in the Music Department of the College, and their performances add much to the pleasure of public occasions within the institution. In many other ways also individually and in choruses, the students of music contribute to the pleasures of public entertainment.

College Orchestra. The College Orchestra is composed of students who are proficient in orchestral instruments, all violin students being expected to participate in this work. The Orchestra meets once a week to study the symphonies of the great masters. Valuable training is thus given to the members in ensemble playing. The Orchestra gives occasional public programs.

ORGANIZATION.

The Georgia State College for Women maintains four subordinate units of organization, which pursue definite lines of work in the accomplishment of the several aims and purposes of the institution as a whole. These units are as follows:

1. The College of Arts and Sciences, including also the School of Foreign Languages.
2. The Teachers' College, including the School of Education, the School of Home Economics, and the Peabody Practice School.
3. The Division of Extension.
4. The Summer Session.

STATEMENT OF COURSES OFFERED.

Through the several subordinate organizations of its general work the College offers the following courses of study, leading to college degrees and diplomas, and based on four years of high school work.

1. Four-year College course leading to A.B. degree.
2. Four-year College course leading to B.S. degree in General Science.
3. Four-year College course leading to B.S. degree in Education.
4. Four-year College course leading to B.S. degree in Home Economics.
5. Four-year College course leading to B. S. degree in Vocational Home Economics.
6. Two-year College course leading to Normal Diplomas.
7. One-year College course leading to Certificates.

STANDARDS OF SCHOLARSHIP.

The Georgia State College for Women maintains a high standard of scholarship. Members of the faculty are, in every case, carefully chosen for their superior personal qualifications and training in the best colleges and universities. The entrance requirement for unconditional admission to the Freshman class is graduation from a senior accredited high school with a minimum of fifteen units of standardized high school work, or the equivalent. The courses of study in the several departments of instruction are built upon necessary prerequisite work, which lifts the courses to the level of standard of undergraduate work prevailing throughout the country. Students' schedules are carefully watched, to prevent the taking of more hours of work than are allowed on a standard college assignment. The equipment for every course offered is the best possible within the resources of the institution. These conditions, which make for true standards in higher education, are observed, with care and loyalty to high ideals, in every department of the College.

Admission to the College

GENERAL REGULATIONS AND DEFINITIONS.

1. *Age requirements.* Young women under fifteen (15) years of age are not eligible for admission to the College.

2. *Methods of admission.* Students may be admitted to the College in two ways: (a) By examination; and (b) by the proper certificate from an accredited high school.

3. *Freshman admission.* For admission to the Freshman class a candidate must graduate from an accredited senior high school course with subjects amounting to at least fifteen (15) units, as outlined below.

4. *High school unit.* "A unit represents a year's study in any subject in a secondary school constituting approximately a quarter of a full year's work." (Definition of the United States Commissioner of Education, found on page 43 in *Bureau of Education Bulletin No. 35, 1924*). It is assumed that the length of the school year is at least thirty-six weeks, that a recitation is at least forty minutes in length, and that the study is pursued four or five periods a week.

5. *Double credit not allowed.* Subjects offered for entrance credit whether high school or college work, may not be counted again for college credit. Therefore credit will not be given in a modern foreign language for courses below Sophomore grade whenever two units for entrance credit have been presented.

6. *Deficient students subject to examination.* Students who enter by certificates, and later show marked deficiency in assigned work, may be required to take the entrance examinations.

APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION.

Applications for admission to the College must be made in writing on a special form of application. In accepting applications, preference will be given to the high school graduates, coming from counties in Georgia having the smallest relative representation, and especially to the graduates who send in their applications promptly and in good form with the best records as to the character, health, scholarship, personality, earnestness of purpose and ability of the applicants.

1. *Allotment of places.* The first allotment of places among the various counties in the State is usually made in June; the second, in July; and possibly a third in August, provided there remain any vacancies. Also, if there are vacancies, students may be admitted at the beginning of the second semester in February. Such allotments are made in January.

3. *Waiting list.* Often highly satisfactory applications are received late, and cannot be accepted because of a lack of room. When refused admission, an applicant may ask to have the application kept on the waiting list for a week or a month or a few months, as may be desired. Sometimes vacancies occur; and in such cases the names on the waiting list will be considered. New applications must be written, however, for entrance each first semester.

ADMISSION BY CERTIFICATE FROM AN ACCREDITED HIGH SCHOOL.

Students who have graduated from an officially accredited senior high school may be admitted to the Freshman class, without examination, provided their high school credits are properly made out, and meet the requirements outlined immediately below. In Table I, the subjects required of all students for unconditional entrance to the Freshman class are given. Of the necessary fifteen units of high school credit, it will be seen that nine are required, and six are elective. In Table II, a list of entrance and elective subjects, acceptable to the College, is given, with the maximum units of credits accepted in each subject. From these subjects, students may offer, by proper certificate or by examination, for admission to the Freshman class, subjects amounting to fifteen units, which must include the requirements in Table I.

TABLE I.—REQUIRED UNITS FOR ADMISSION TO FRESHMAN CLASS.

Of the fifteen units for unconditional entrance to the Freshman class nine are required and six are elective, as follows:

Applicants for admission to the College who are not graduates of a standard accredited senior high school must take examinations in English, Mathematics, and two other high school subjects. No student is eligible for admission whose scholarship is below the standard of graduation from one of the officially accredited high schools.

One unit only of a foreign language will not be counted towards the required 15 units required for entrance.

ACCREDITED HIGH SCHOOLS.

Students from accredited high schools will be admitted without examination on the same basis of accredited units as at the University of Georgia. Fifteen units will be required for unconditional admission to the Freshman class. The proper certificate, signed by the principal of the high school, must be presented to the Committee on Entrance Requirements and Admission.

ADMISSION BY EXAMINATION.

All applicants, except graduates of officially accredited high schools who have properly certified credits, will be required to take entrance examinations. These will be given on the day before the College opens in September, and at the opening of the second semester. The examinations, while fair to the student in point of difficulty, will, nevertheless, be a thorough test of the student's fitness to enter the class for which application has been made. Examinations are given in English, Mathematics, History and in either Foreign Language or Science. In all examinations, especial emphasis will be placed upon the student's knowledge and use of English. Students not thorough and accurate in their work should not expect to enter the higher classes, although some studies in these classes have been completed. For Freshman standing the entrance credits attained by examination must satisfy the requirements stated above under Admission by Certificate.

ADMISSION AS SPECIAL STUDENTS.

All students are expected to take a regular course leading to a degree or a diploma, unless there is some good reason to the contrary. Where students cannot remain at the College long enough to take the regular course, and where a special course is agreed upon, admission may be given them as special students. Such students should (1) meet the regular requirements for admission to the Freshman class; or (2), be at least twenty-one years of age; and (3), if less than twenty-one years of age, present the written request of their parents or guardians to take the special course. A special student may become a regular student only by satisfying all the requirements for admission to unconditional Freshman standing, and by completing the work of the regular course up to that point at which the student desires to enter as a regular student.

ADMISSION TO ADVANCED STANDING.

Admission to advanced standing may be in two ways: (1) By *examination* in the subjects or courses in which advanced credit is sought; and (2) By *transfer of credit* from other institutions of recognized collegiate standing. When such transfer of credits is desired, the student must file with the Registrar of the College the following papers from the institution, or from each of the institutions, previously attended: (1) *A statement of honorable dismissal*; (2) *an officially certified statement of the college work already accomplished*, showing the length of time of attendance, and accompanied by a marked catalogue of the institution in which the work was done; and (3) *an officially certified statement of the record of secondary work*, with description of the courses, previously accepted for entrance requirements, and now offered as satisfying the requirements for admission to the courses for which admission is sought.

REGISTRATION AND MATRICULATION.

Matriculation to the College is complete when the student's name has been properly registered with the institution. The student is required to pay a matriculation fee upon entering, and to take out at once assignments in the courses of study to be pursued.

Requirements for Graduation

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE BACCALAUREATE DEGREES.

Degrees Offered.

In the Georgia State College for Women two baccalaureate degrees are conferred; the degree of Bachelor of Arts (or A.B. degree), and the degree of Bachelor of Science (or B. S. degree).

Those working for the degree of Bachelor of Science may, however, stress the work in the general sciences, or in Education, or in Home Economics. For sake of clearness, therefore, the degree of Bachelor of Science will be designated as follows, according as the student has specialized in the one or the other of these several lines of work:

Bachelor of Science (General); or B.S. degree in General Science.

Bachelor of Science (Education); or B.S. degree in Education.

Bachelor of Science (Home Economics); or B.S. degree in Home Economics.

Bachelor of Science (Vocational Home Economics); or B. S. degree in Vocational Home Economics.

Any one of these degrees may be conferred upon candidates who have met the requirements for admission and have satisfied the general and special requirements for baccalaureate degrees, as outlined below. No second degree will be conferred without an additional thirty (30) hours of resident work, which shall fulfill the special requirements of the degree in question.

CREDIT HOURS.

The credit assigned to a course is expressed in semester hours, an hour of credit being given for the satisfactory completion of work requiring one recitation or lecture period a week for one semester, or an equivalent. Two hours of laboratory work count as the equivalent of one hour of recitation or lecture.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

In order to receive a degree from the College, the candidate must complete, in addition to Music 1, 2, and 11, 12 and Physical Education 1, 2 and 11 and 12, one hundred and twenty-four (124) hours of college work, which must both fulfill the requirements for majors and minors and include the specific subjects prescribed for the degree chosen, as outlined below. At least the Senior year should be spent in residence. The College reserves the right to withhold a degree or diploma from any student deficient in her record of conduct, or deportment.

HONOR POINTS.

In addition to the above quantitative requirements, a student must earn a minimum of 124 honor points or quality points for the degree and 64 honor points or quality points for the diploma. Honor points are earned as follows:

A—3 points for each semester hour

B—2 points for each semester hour

C—1 point for each semester hour

D—no point

MAJORS AND MINORS.

The requirements for majors and minors are as follows, and must be satisfied by candidates for the several degrees:

For the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and of Bachelor of Science (General). Candidates for either of these degrees must select one department in which to do major work, and one or two departments in which to do minor work. The requirements for majors and minors may be satisfied in either of two ways: First, a student may offer as a major a minimum of twenty-four (24) hours in one department, and as a minor a minimum of twelve (12) hours in another department. Second, a student may offer as a major a minimum of eighteen (18) hours in one department, and as minors a minimum of twelve (12) hours in each of two other departments.

For the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education). Candidates for this degree must choose work as follows: Twenty-four (24) hours in Education, and a major of twenty-four (24) hours, or a major of eighteen (18) hours from a department other than Education and a minor of twelve (12) hours of work in some other subject.

For the degree of Bachelor of Science (Home Economics). Candidates for this degree, with major in Home Economics, must choose their major and minors as follows: one major of twenty-four (24) hours in one department of Home Economics; a minor of twelve (12) hours from a different Distribution Group (see below); and an additional minor of twelve (12) hours in the other department of Home Economics.

For the degree of Bachelor of Science (Vocational Home Economics). Candidates for this degree, must follow the course of study as indicated under Vocational Degree in Home Economics. This course of study has been worked out in conjunction with the State Supervisor of Vocational Home Economics and approved by the State Board for Vocational Education. The twenty-seven semester hours indicated as electives may be used to strengthen the work in Home Economics or to broaden the contacts of the student with other fields of knowledge.

For all degrees. Except in the foreign languages, one-half of all work counted toward the satisfying of majors and minors must be in courses numbered 20 and upward, that is for a major of twenty-four (24) hours, twelve hours must be in courses numbered 20 and upward and for a major of eighteen (18) hours, nine such hours.

In making out programs of study, candidates for degrees must consult with the head of the department in which major work is being done and all such programs of study must bear the signatures of the Dean of the College in which the degree is taken.

It is desirable that students in the Sophomore, Junior, and Senior Classes report to the proper Dean one month before the close of each semester the courses of study that will be desired in the following semester.

GROUP DISTRIBUTION.

The subjects offered in the College, for convenience in outlining work, are arranged in five distribution groups, the courses given in each subject being described in detail under the Departments and Courses of Study, pages 115 to 184 below.

PRESCRIBED COURSES.

In order to insure a breadth of culture, and an adequate acquaintance with the main divisions of modern scholarship, certain definite courses of study under each of the above groups have been prescribed for the several degrees offered by the College. The prescribed courses for the different groups and degrees are as follows:

Group I.

1. Candidates for all degrees will be required to take twelve (12) hours in English, including English 1 and 2. If English 1 and 2 are not taken during the Freshman year, they should be taken as early thereafter as the student may arrange for the work.

2. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Arts must present a minimum of 24 hours in Foreign Language.

All of this requirement may be taken in one language or twelve hours may be taken in each of two languages.

3. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (General) must offer twelve (12) hours in a modern language, which if in French must include courses 17 and 18.

Group II.

1. Candidates for all degrees must complete eight (8) hours in Science, including Chemistry 1, and Biology 2, in the Freshman year, except that candidates for the Bachelor of Arts degree will substitute a foreign language therefor and take this requirement in Science later in their course.

2. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (General) must present twenty-four (24) hours of college work in Science. However, the student whose major or minor is in Mathematics may count these hours toward satisfying this requirement in Science except for the eight (8) hours in Chemistry 1 and Biology 2.

3. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education) must offer at least twelve (12) hours of college work from Group II, including Chemistry 1 and Biology 2.

4. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Home Economics) must present a minimum of college work in Science as follows: Chemistry thirteen (13) hours, Biology seven (7) hours, and Physics three (3) hours.

5. Candidates for the degree of A. B., B. S. General, or B. S. in Education, may present Mathematics in place of any or all of the Science requirements except in the case of Biology 2 and Chemistry 1.

Group III

1. Candidates for all degrees will be required to complete a minimum of six (6) hours in Education.

2. Candidates for all degrees will be required to complete a minimum of six (6) hours of college work in History; but candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education may substitute work in the Social Sciences for part of the requirement in History; and candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics may substitute work in the Social Sciences or Rural Education, for all or a part of the above requirement in History.

3. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education must complete eighteen (18) hours of additional work in educational subjects, making a total of twenty-four (24) hours of work in Education required for the degree, twelve (12) hours of which must be in courses numbering 20 or above.

4. All students are urged to consider carefully, and to plan in advance for, the professional courses in the teaching of their major subjects. For a view of these professional courses, see the departmental statements. This is especially important for those who may wish to become departmental high school teachers, or specialists in the teaching of particular subjects. When a student begins to specialize in any subject, she should at once make a study of the professional course in which she will be interested, and plan from the beginning to meet all the requirements of that particular course.

Group IV.

1. Candidates for all degrees must complete six (6) hours of college work in Household Science 1 and 2.
2. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Home Economics) are required to complete thirty-six (36) hours in Home Economics (as required under the statement of majors and minors for this degree), and six (6) hours in agricultural subjects.
3. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education) must complete a minimum of three (3) hours in Agriculture.
4. Students who have taken the Two-Year Diploma Course in Commerce, and who may desire to become candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education) with a view to teaching or administering courses in Commerce may be allowed to substitute the work already done in Commerce for the requirement in Science for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education), except for the minimum requirement of 8 hours in Chemistry 1 and Biology 2.

Group V.

1. Candidates for all degrees must offer a minimum of three (3) hours in Art 5, and six (6) hours in Health 2 and 15.
2. Candidates for all degrees will be required to take Physical Education 1-2 and 11-12, and Music 1 and 2 and 11-12, during the Freshman and Sophomore years. In the Department of Physical Education courses numbered 20 and upward, and in the Department of Music courses numbered 3 and upward, will be accepted for a maximum of six (6) hours of elective credit toward any degree.
3. Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education) must offer three (3) hours in Art 25 in addition to Art 5.

To complete the one hundred and twenty-four (124) hours necessary for graduation with a degree, the student must elect courses amounting to the number of hours stated above. Such election must be made in consultation with the head of the department in which the student is doing major work, and with the Dean of the College in which the degree is to be taken, and the first consideration must be given in favor of majors and minors. Students are expected to complete the requirements as early as possible in the course. Larger freedom for elective studies should be reserved for the later years, when reasons for choice are likely to be clearer. In attempting to elect advanced work, students must satisfy the prerequisites.

REGULATIONS FOR THE STUDENT'S WORK.

1. Study carefully the summary of requirements for the degree.
2. Study the list of electives published for the semester.
3. Select first courses that are required; after that select the electives.
4. If a conflict is found in the schedule, make a first choice, leave the second for another semester.
5. Students should consult the Head of the Department in which they are majoring.
6. Courses should receive the approval of the Head of the Department in which the major is taken; also of the Dean of the College in which the degree is to be taken.
7. No student may change her course of study except by special petition.
8. Single-semester courses are usually planned to balance one against the other in the two semesters; and students are urged to observe this fact when electing such courses.
9. Less than a year of work in a foreign language will not be accepted for credit toward a degree. The College will accept only two units in a modern language for entrance credit, in which case no course below Sophomore grade will be credited in a modern language.
10. The normal amount of work to be carried by Freshmen and Sophomores is 16 hours; for Junior and Seniors, 15 hours per week. Deviation from the normal amount will be allowed only by petition after proper consideration of the health and ability of the student, and the maximum permissible increase beyond the normal is 3 hours. No petition for an increase will be granted to a student who does not have, for the last semester completed, a scholastic record of B or better.
11. One-half of all majors and minors, except in Foreign Languages, must be in courses numbered above 20.

13. Twelve hours of work in Education for B.S. in Education must be in courses numbered 20 or above.

14. Students completing the Diploma in Commerce may substitute a part of the work in Commerce for four hours of the Science required in the B.S. degree in Education.

15. Students taking Mathematics may count the hours in Mathematics as a substitute for required Science, except for Chemistry 1 and Biology 2, in the A. B., B. S. General and B. S. in Education.

16. All students should arrange if possible, for practice teaching in their major subject. This work should be done in their Senior year.

17. Only 8 semester hours of Piano, Voice or Violin may be counted towards a degree.

18. Music 1, 2, 11, 12; and Physical Education 1, 2, 11, 12, must be passed by each applicant for a degree. If a student should be excused from Physical Education by a doctor's certificate, then a substitution satisfactory to the Dean of the College concerned must be made at the rate of one semester hour for each course.

19. Approximately 40% of the total number of hours presented for a degree must be numbered 20 or above.

CLASSIFICATION.

In all degree courses, the class to which a student is assigned will depend upon the number of hours of credit shown on the books of the Registrar at the opening of the college year. Students meeting the requirements for admission, will be classified as Freshmen. The requirements in hours of credit for the other classes are as follows:

SYSTEM OF GRADING AND REPORTS.

The grades of students are based upon the complete work of a semester, and are designated by letter, and percentages, as stated below. The schedule adopted is practically the standard American System of marking grades, since it is in use, with slight modifications in some cases, in the majority of the stronger colleges and universities throughout the country.

- A. Signifies superior work, 90-100 per cent.
- B. Signifies excellent work, 80-89 per cent.
- C. Signifies good work, 70-79 per cent.
- D. Signifies fair work, 60-69 per cent.
- E. Signifies conditioned work, 55-59 per cent.
- F. Signifies failure in work, or below 55 per cent.
- X. Signifies incomplete work.

Examinations to remove conditions in work should be taken within nine (9) months from the time such conditions have been made. Two additional examinations are the maximum allowed to any student, the second to be given only after additional work by the student in preparation. Official reports of students' grades are sent to parents and guardians for the work of each semester. Deduction from grades will be made for a student's absences, unless for illness on a physician's certificate, and the deduction will be doubled for unexcused absences.

AWARDS AND HONORS.

Material rewards and prizes and distinctions have not been encouraged in the College. There is, however, a constant emphasis upon the just recognition of that merit which comes naturally into evidence in the records of those whose attendance, conduct, and scholarship have been of a superior character.

REQUIREMENTS ARRANGED BY YEARS.

The requirements for the several degrees, arranged by years and in full detail, are shown below. The requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Arts and of Bachelor of Science (General) are given under the College of Arts and Sciences; and the requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Science in Education and of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics are given under the Teachers' College. In the several courses, the outline is logical, and so arranged as to prevent conflicts of schedule, and should therefore be taken in the order given as far as possible.

GENERAL STATEMENT OF PURPOSE.

The College of Arts and Sciences is organized primarily to offer a liberal, well-rounded education to those who desire to become high school teachers; to enter graduate schools or professional schools, such as law, medicine, journalism, etc., or to receive such training as will fit them for leadership in community and home life. Two well-defined curricula are provided. One leads to the degree of Bachelor of Arts; and the other, to the degree of Bachelor of Science. Ample opportunities are given for specialization, and students are urged to choose major and minor subjects in which they are most interested. Courses in Education are offered to meet the state requirements for teachers' certificates; yet the elective work is so full that students have the privilege of much choice in the selection of their subjects.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION.

The general requirements for admission to the Freshman class in the College of Arts and Sciences, and for advanced standing therein, are the same as those required by the College of all students for admission thereto.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

Candidates who will be recommended for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, or for the degree of Bachelor of Science (General), must satisfy all the requirements for these degrees as outlined above. In completing the one hundred and twenty-four (124) hours required for graduation, including the prescribed courses for each degree, and 124 honor points, candidates must offer majors and minors according to one of the following schemes:

Scheme I.—For one major and one minor:

1. One major of 24 hours in one department of instruction.
2. One minor of 12 hours from some other department of instruction.

Scheme II.—For one major and two minors:

1. One major of 18 hours in one department of instruction.
2. One minor of 12 hours from some other department of instruction.
3. One minor of 12 hours from some other department of instruction.

One-half of all work, except in the foreign languages, that counts toward the satisfying of majors and minors must be in courses numbered 20 and upward.

REQUIRED COURSES ARRANGED BY YEARS.

The work for the two degrees is largely prescribed in the first two years, and differs only in the particulars necessary to the respective degrees. Beginning with the Junior year, however, there is a freer election of work; and the system of majors and minors is designed, with the help of the student-advisers, to assist students in specializing in the direction of their preferences.

GENERAL STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The Teachers' College, through the School of Education and other related departments of instruction, endeavors to prepare teachers in the theory and practice of their profession, and to represent the growing cultural and practical values in the study of education as a social science. On the side of its professional work, the College aims to provide adequate professional knowledge and skill in the practice of teaching for all students going out as teachers from any course of study offered by the College. Through its advanced courses, the College offers a higher degree of specialization for those who wish to become highly proficient in the work of elementary education, as teachers, departmental supervisors, and principals of town and city schools. Through the School of Home Economics and through affiliation with other departments of instruction, the Teachers' College seeks to help prepare students for high school work, as departmental instructors, principals, and superintendents; and for special work, as teachers of Home Economics and Health, as county demonstrators and extension workers in these and other subjects, and as leaders in all the activities of home and community life where knowledge of educational thought and practice may be involved.

SCHOOL OF EDUCATION AND PEABODY PRACTICE SCHOOL

DEPARTMENTS OF INSTRUCTION.

While the Teachers' College, through its own and the affiliated departments in the College of Arts and Sciences, may command the entire resources of the College, the distinctly professional work in Education is given by the School of Education in two departments of instruction: the Department of Education and Psychology; and the Department of Rural Education and School Administration—all working in conjunction with the Peabody Practice School of the College.

THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION

The Department of Education and Psychology is supported, in the pedagogical section of the College Library, by the best educational journals and a well selected collection of standard books on the history and theory of education and in general and special methods of pedagogy. New books are procured as they appear.

The Department of Rural Education and School Administration has also strong library support in good books and periodicals. It is also well favored in having facilities for supervised experience in real rural community work through the affiliation that exists between this Department and the rural schools of Baldwin County, whereby the students visit them and are allowed to teach in them from time to time.

THE PEABODY PRACTICE SCHOOL.

The Peabody Practice School, housed in two new buildings that form additions to the new Class Room Building, is composed of eleven well organized grades, having supervisors in charge of the Primary, Intermediate, Grammar, and High School Departments, and a critic teacher in charge of each grade. Opportunity is thus afforded students to observe the working of a well organized school, and provision is made for practice teaching, under trained critic teachers, in all the grades maintained in the Peabody Practice School. Supervision of the lunch period, and care in the gymnasium and on the playground, afford additional opportunity to students-in-training for valuable practice and observation. There are splendidly equipped laboratories in Science, in Household Art, and in Household Science.

OBSERVATION AND PRACTICE TEACHING.

Students doing practice teaching in the Peabody Practice School are required to teach under the supervision and in accordance with the instructions of the Director, the departmental supervisors, and the critic teachers in the several grades. Model lessons are given for the benefit of the students, after which round table discussions are held. The work of teaching is supplemented by individual conferences wherein the organization of subject matter and points of methods are discussed and lesson plans are criticized. General weekly conferences with students-in-training are conducted by the departmental supervisors and the critic teachers, who discuss general points of method and give constructive as well as adverse criticism on the lessons taught.

COURSES OF STUDY.

The College offers three different courses of study in Education and related subjects: the four-year course, leading to the Bachelor of Science in Education; the two-year Collegiate-Normal course, leading to a normal diploma, either in general or in a definite subject (Commerce, English, Home Econo-

mics); and the one-year course leading to a Certificate of Proficiency in certain subjects such as Commerce and Music. The work for the several courses is outlined in the following statement, except that for English, which, being based on the requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, is outlined following the courses of the College of Arts and Sciences.

**THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN EDUCATION.
REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION.**

The requirements for admission to the B.S. degree course in Education are the same as the general requirements for admission to the College.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The requirements for graduation with the degree of B.S. in Education are both general and special.

1. *General requirements for the degree.* Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education) must satisfy all the requirements for graduation, offering one hundred and twenty-four (124) hours of college work, including the courses prescribed for this degree, and 124 honor points.

2. *Special Requirements for the degree.* Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education) must complete work in the major and minor as follows:

1. Twenty-four (24) hours in the School of Education (including the Departments of Education and Psychology, and Rural Education and School Administration).

2. One major of twenty-four (24) hours from a department other than those in 1 above or one major of eighteen hours and one minor of twelve (12) hours from a department other than those of 1 above or of the major.

One-half of all work counted in the twenty-four (24) hours in Education as also in the major or major and minor must be in courses numbered 20 and upward, except in the School of Foreign Languages.

CERTIFICATES OFFERED.

For the completion of the work indicated below the College offers the following certificates:

1. *Certificate of Proficiency in Commerce.*—This course includes Accounting, Stenography, Stenotypy and Typewriting, English in some of the college classes, Commercial Arithmetic, Business Forms and Correspondence, and such other courses as are approved by the advisors and by the Dean of the Teachers' College. Students may specialize in Accounting or Stenography, or they may take both. Students who complete this course satisfactorily should be not less than sixteen years of age. Those finishing these special courses will be given a Certificate of Proficiency.

2. *Certificate of Proficiency in Music.*—Regular students of good health and good scholarship may be allowed to take Music in addition to the regular work; however, a few students of sufficient maturity and advancement in music may be admitted as special music students and give most of their time to musical studies. It should be clearly understood, however, that students are admitted as Special Music Students only upon special agreement and when satisfactory reasons are given. The course of study must be approved by the Head of the Department of Music and by the Dean of the Teachers' College.

THE SCHOOL OF HOME ECONOMICS

The purpose of the School of Home Economics is to prepare students for the following lines of work now open to women:

1. *Home-making and cultural study.* In preparing for home-making as the primary interest of women, and in securing the cultural values in the study of Home Economics, the best results are obtained when students take the full college course leading to the degree of B.S. in Home Economics, as described below. There are, however, three courses open to the student: the full four-year course leading to the degree of B.S. in Home Economics, the degree of B.S. in Vocational Home Economics, or the Two-year Collegiate Normal course leading to the diploma in Home Economics.

2. *Teaching of Home Economics.* Those who desire to prepare for teaching Home Economics and agricultural subjects should take the full four-year course leading to one of the degrees offered in Home Economics.

3. *Supervision and demonstration.* Ample preparation will be given in the degree course for county demonstration agents, for specialists in supervisory and extension work, and for those who may wish to enter upon the work of institutional management.

4. *Industrial work.* In many of those industries which apply the principles of agricultural science and home economics, women, in all parts of the country, have had excellent success. The interest of women in such enterprises as horticulture, the care and marketing of food, poultry husbandry, dairying, and even farming, has rapidly grown within recent years. For such practical work, a student, by a careful arrangement of the course, may make preparation in Home Economics, Agriculture, and the related sciences.

DEPARTMENTS OF INSTRUCTION.

The work in Home Economics proper is arranged under three main divisions, called Home Economics Education, Household Art and Household Science, in the latter two of which opportunity is afforded the student for doing major work. The departments of instruction in this subject, with the correlation in other subjects of science and culture, are as follows:

The Department of Economics Education, wherein instruction is given to meet the need of those who are striving to fit themselves in the field of Home Economics as teachers.

The Department of Household Art, wherein the work is planned to meet three distinct needs of young women: first, to give training in textiles and clothing to those students who will go back to their own communities to make homes; second, to give technical training and efficiency to those who will choose some phase of this subject for a vocation; and third, to prepare teachers of Household Art, technically and scientifically trained, to meet the increasing demand of the schools of to-day.

The Department of Household Science, which, in the larger outlines, has a two-fold aim in its work: first, to give those young women who expect to make homes of their own the scientific and practical instruction and training that will help them to become wise and efficient housekeepers and homemakers; and second, to give those young women, who wish to specialize in Household Science, the thorough knowledge of the technical subjects and related sciences, enabling them to teach household science in public or private schools, or to become matrons and housekeepers in private or public institutions, or otherwise to use this knowledge for general culture.

Correlated departments. In each of the above departments, a close correlation is maintained with other departments of the College, such as Agriculture, Art, Biology, Chemistry, Economics and Sociology, Education, English, Foreign Languages, Geography, Health, History and Political Science, Physics, etc., to give the necessary scientific support to the work in Home Economics, and to provide a more general culture for the students specializing in this particular line of work.

EQUIPMENT FOR WORK IN HOME ECONOMICS.

The Georgia State College for Women, being a pioneer in this field, began early to provide an equipment for this important line of modern education. As a result, the equipment for work in Home Economics is probably the oldest, as well as among the very best, since it is kept up to date, for this line of work in the entire South. The Departments of Home Economics occupy (the main part of) three floors of Chappell Hall, where there are well-equipped laboratories for cooking, sewing, dress-making, and millinery, lecture rooms, demonstration dining rooms, a school lunch room, and offices for the departments. Besides this central equipment, the laboratories of the departments of Biology, Agriculture, and Chemistry, are used for certain phases of the work.

A well-equipped Tea Room with laboratory and dining room has been provided in Bell Dormitory for the use of the Department of Household Science.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS IN HOME ECONOMICS. REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION.

The requirements for admission to the School of Home Economics are the same as the general requirements for admission to the College.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

I. THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN HOME ECONOMICS.

The requirements for graduation with the degree of Bachelor of Science (Home Economics) are general and special, as outlined below:

1. *General requirements for the degree.* Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Home Economics) must complete all the general requirements for graduation, including the one hundred and twenty-four (124) hours of college work.

2. *Special requirements for the degree.* Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Home Economics) must complete the following major and minor work:

1. A major of 24 hours in one department of Home Economics.
2. A minor of 12 hours in that department of Home Economics not chosen for the major.
3. A minor of 12 hours in a different distribution group.

One-half of all work counted on the major and the two minors must, except in a foreign language, be in courses numbered 20 and upward.

An appropriation has been made since 1918 for Extension work by the Georgia State College for Women. Fine results have been obtained in the promoting of home economics, in health, and in the construction of healthful and sanitary schools, throughout all sections of the State.

Also, complying with the request of the State Superintendent and with each of the State Supervisors of Education, the Extension Workers of the College have given much practical co-operation in the work of the Supervisors in holding regional summer schools in all sections of the State. Words of appreciation from these state leaders have been hearty and strong in regard to the good work thus done for the Georgia schools, and especially for the rural schools.

The Extension Workers have also given very practical co-operation in the regional summer schools, and in the illiteracy campaign carried on by the State Department of Education.

Through these influences of the Extension Workers of the Georgia State College for Women, many school houses have been remodeled, or newly constructed, along more modern lines, with special attention to convenience, appearance, lighting, sanitation and health.

Physical fitness of school children, or physical preparedness, has been the ideal of the Extension Workers, who are working for better food, better lighting, better sanitation, better school houses, better exercise, and better instruction for the children throughout the State of Georgia.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT.

In 1917, for the first time in the history of the institution, the Georgia State College for Women opened its doors to Summer School students. This action came in response to a popular demand on the part of teachers, graduates, and citizens of the State. It was recognized that the magnificent college buildings, instead of remaining closed throughout the summer, should be opened and of service to the teachers of the State. For this reason the buildings, the good boarding accommodations, and the modern laboratories, and equipment, instead of being idle, were made available for the use of Georgia teachers.

In 1920 the Summer School was organized on a six weeks' basis with regular college credits for work completed in regular college courses in a fully standardized Summer School. Regular sessions with increasing attendance and efficiency of work have been held annually since 1920. Many of the regular faculty members have remained and many strong teachers and lecturers have been brought to the College from other institutions. Good standards of college work have been maintained, and immature students desiring to make up some high school work have been advised to go to other institutions offering such courses.

The preference for admission to the Summer Session has been given to those prepared to do regular college work and to teachers with experience. The Summer School is now well established, and it is working to promote the best things in education and is well recognized throughout the State.

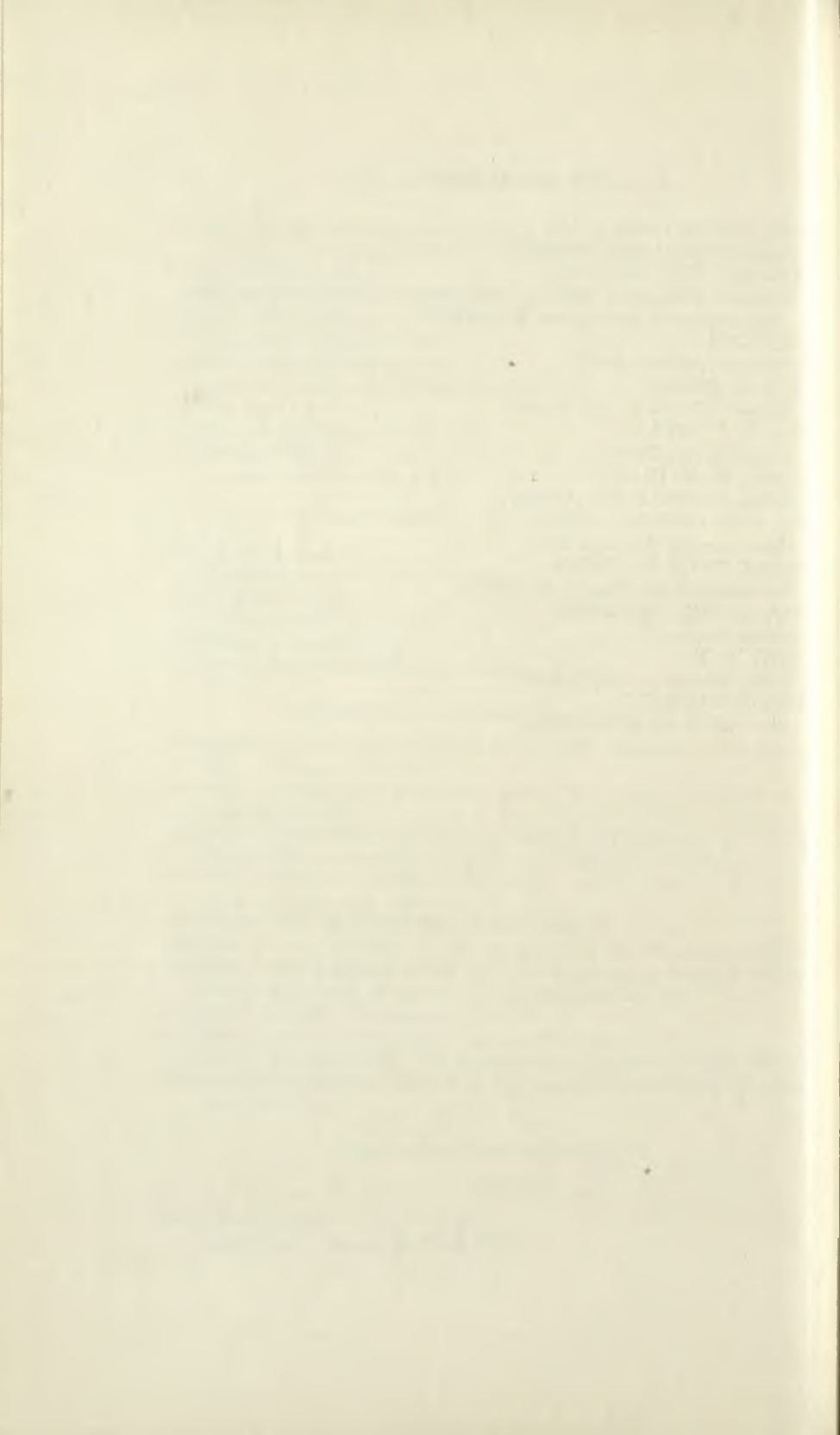

DEPARTMENTS AND COURSES OF STUDY.

Ordinarily courses numbered 1 to 9 are those of the Freshman class; those numbered 10-19 are Sophomore; and those numbered 20 and above are Junior and Senior. All lecture periods are 60 minutes and all laboratory periods are 120 minutes in duration.

ACCOUNTING.

(See Department of Commerce.)

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND BIOLOGY.

PROFESSOR SCOTT; PROFESSOR ROGERS; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR NIXON; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR NEVINS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR PYLE; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR TAIT; MISS BIGHAM. Rooms 10 and 24 Parks Hall; Laboratories Rooms 6, 8, 11, 23, Parks Hall.

*AGRICULTURE***AGRICULTURE 12—AGRICULTURE AND GARDENING.**

Sophomore Required for B.S. (Ed.) and B.S. (H.E.) and for Normal Diploma
Either semester Three hours

A general course in Agriculture given with the teachers' problem in mind. Discussion of the fundamental principles of Agriculture and the questions involved in successful rural life. Lectures, reference, and laboratory work required.

AGRICULTURE 15—NATURE STUDY.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

This course includes a study of plants and animals, their habits of growth, adaptation to environment, and relation to man. Special attention is given to methods of study and manner of presentation. The students will work out courses in Nature Study with special attention to methods of correlating

it with other school work. Lectures, field trips, note-books, and laboratory work required.

AGRICULTURE 24—POULTRY HUSBANDRY.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Two hours

This course includes a study of breeds, housing, feeding, and the management of poultry, grading and marketing of poultry products; diseases and parasites. Practical work in incubation, brooding, raising of chicks, and control of yards, will be required.

AGRICULTURE 25—TEACHING OF AGRICULTURE AND BIOLOGY.

Senior Elective First semester Two hours

Prerequisite: Agriculture 12. A study of materials, methods, and courses of study suited to the upper grades and high school. Also the making of charts and apparatus, and the working out of various problems of importance to the teaching of Agriculture. Stress will be given to the place of Agriculture in the curriculum, its correlation with other subjects, and the importance of experiments, trips, and project work.

AGRICULTURE 26—HORTICULTURE.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Growing of vegetables for home use. A study of the various garden and orchard crops, their requirements for successful growth. The control of insects and diseases. The planning and management of school and home gardens. A review of the work suggested by the United States Department of Agriculture and the Federal Bureau of Education will be given. Practical garden work required.

AGRICULTURE 27—HOME FLORICULTURE.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Devoted to the study of flowers, bulbs and flowering shrubs and the use of them in the improvement of home and school grounds, as well as the problem of potted plants for interior and porch decoration. The course involves study of annuals, herbaceous perennials and woody perennials used for their flower production; their propagation, culture, time of blooming, colors, values as ornamental plants and cut flowers, arrangement of flower gardens, care of window and porch boxes, forcing and outdoor culture of bulbs, diseases and enemies of these plants and their control. Actual garden work is provided, and practical work in propagation and care of plants. Reference reading is required.

AGRICULTURE 28—LANDSCAPE GARDENING.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

A survey of the principles and practice of Landscape Gardening, directed principally toward development and beautification of home and school grounds.

Study is made of forms, colors, values, suitability and desirability of the materials which the landscape gardener may use. Methods and principles in design and combination, and actual work in landscaping, are included.

BIOLOGY

BIOLOGY 2—BIOLOGY.

Freshman	Required	Second semester	Four hours
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Designed primarily as a basis for the courses in Health, Nature Study, Psychology, and Agriculture. Emphasis will be given to the broader principles of growth, with special attention to micro-organisms and their relation to human welfare; environment and its effect on plants and animals; development of plants and animals; interdependence of plants and animals; the laws of heredity and a careful study of life-history; injury and remedy of commonest insects. Collections, note-books, reference and laboratory work required.

BIOLOGY 11—PHYSIOLOGY.

Sophomore	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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This course includes a study of the general principles of physiology and a consideration of their special application in the human body. Special attention will be given to motion, circulation, respiration, digestion, the central nervous system, and the special senses.

BIOLOGY 20—MICROBIOLOGY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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This course is planned as a basis for the courses in Domestic Science, Agriculture, and Health. Its purpose is to give the student a knowledge of Micro-organisms and their relation to human welfare. It will include a study of molds, bacteria, yeast, food of micro-organisms, their distribution, use in manufacturing, their relation to diseases of plants and animals and their control, and the making of permanent slides. Collections, note-books, library readings, lectures, and laboratory work required.

BIOLOGY 21—GENERAL BIOLOGY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Biology 2. Study of the principal branches of the plant and animal kingdoms, with special reference to their relation to man. Also a study of the general biological theory, and the planning of courses of study in biology. Collections, note-books, lectures, library references, and laboratory work required.

BIOLOGY 22—BOTANY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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This course is planned to give the student a working knowledge of plant forms and structures, forest botany, and plant physiology. It will include

a study of seeds, flowers, crossing, stems, leaves, roots, and a comparative study of plants. Also a study of absorption, nutrition, photosynthesis, environment, growth, reproduction, and propagation. Field trips, collections, note-books, and laboratory work required.

BIOLOGY 28—ORNITHOLOGY.

Junior	Elective	Second semester	One hour
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Open to Juniors and Seniors, and to others by special permission. This course takes up the beginning of bird identification. Two hours of laboratory or field work are devoted to the study of the markings and notes of our most common birds. It is of service in the teaching of Nature Study. ROGERS.

BIOLOGY 29—ORNITHOLOGY.

Junior	Elective	Second semester	One hour
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Prerequisite: Biology 28, or equivalent. This is a continuation of Biology 28. The work in bird identification is further carried on to include some of our migratory birds. Besides this, some study is made of their nesting and feeding habits and the methods of attracting birds. ROGERS.

BIOLOGY 30—ECONOMIC BIOLOGY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Junior or Senior standing. Protozoa and their relation to human and domestic animal diseases. The relationship of insects as intermediate carriers of disease, with careful study of flies, mosquitoes, fleas, lice, bedbugs, etc. The economic importance of the different animal groups with special emphasis on the parasitic members. Survey of the economic relations of plants, including the study and control of fungus diseases, the commercial, medicinal and aesthetic value of plants.

BIOLOGY 31—GENERAL ZOOLOGY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Either semester	Three hours
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This course consists of a study of the fundamental properties of living matter, classification, anatomy, physiology, reproduction, genetics, and other properties of animal life. Field trips are taken to study the animals in their natural environment and the students are taught how to collect and care for the animals. The recitations and laboratory work aim to equip the student to teach Zoology in the secondary schools. Two hours of recitation; two hours of laboratory periods a week.

BIOLOGY 34—LABORATORY TECHNIC.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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A course designed to help the teacher to prepare materials for the laboratory. It includes the making of herbaria, the making of lantern slides, prepara-

tion of microscopic mounts and sections, making models, preparation of aquaria and terraria, making wall charts, preserving museum specimens, preparing preservative solutions, preparing and setting up skeletons, seed analysis, soil analysis, testing ground foods, etc. Two laboratory periods a week.

BIOLOGY 38—WILD FLOWER STUDY.

Junior-Senior Elective Second Semester One hour

Prerequisite: Biology 2. This course comprises the study of the native flora, including the teaching of the common names of the flowers, and the grouping them in families as an aid to their recognition. The opportunity to collect and preserve wild flowers is also furnished. Field trips are taken to study the flowers in their native habitats. Two hours of laboratory once a week.

DEPARTMENT OF ART.

PROFESSOR PADGETT; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR MEADOWS; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR MOORE; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR BANCROFT; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR SUTTON; MRS. WILLIAMS (on leave). Rooms 7-12 Arts Building; Shop in Terrell Basement.

The aim of the Department of Art is threefold; first, to give thorough instruction in the principles of drawing, painting, and design; second, to enlarge the student's acquaintance with the best in art; third, to offer courses adapted to the needs of the public school teacher.

ART 5—DRAWING AND APPRECIATION OF ART

Freshman Required of all Freshmen Either semester Three hours

This course comprises the subjects of Mechanical Drawing, the principles of Interior Decoration, Home Planning and the appreciation of Art. The former includes lettering, simple projection and working drawings; the latter, color and design as applied to the home. Lectures are given two hours weekly for the purpose of increasing the student's appreciation of art.

ART 15—NORMAL ART.

Sophomore Elective Summer Session Two hours

Methods of teaching Public School Art.

ART 16—DRAWING AND MODELING.

Freshman-Sophomore Elective Either semester Two hours

A course planned to train the student in the principles of perspective, and the development of a knowledge of form through the use of clay, charcoal and water color.

ART 17—WOODWORK.

Sophomore	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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Prerequisite: Art 5. Application of the principles of design to problems involving simple joints. Designing and construction of toys and small objects in thin wood. Study and application of appropriate design and color to boxes. Wood finishing and care of furniture. Not given, 1930-'31.

ART 18—CABINET WORK.

Sophomore	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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Prerequisite: Art 17. Constructions of furniture, such as cedar chests, screens, swings, writing desks and tea carts. Class discussions of the common furniture woods from the standpoint of structure and uses. Study of modern Machine-made furniture. Courses of study and shop equipment. Not given 1930-'31.

ART 19—MANUAL ARTS.

Sophomore-Junior	Elective	Either semester	Two hours
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This is an advanced course in weaving, modeling, toy construction, and book-binding.

ART 21—PENCIL SKETCHING AND WATER COLOR.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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Drawing and painting from still life, landscape, and flowers. Principles of perspective.

ART 22—APPLIED DESIGN.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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Prerequisites: Art 5 and 21. Principles of design applied to problems in both constructive and decorative design. Lineoleum block printing and leather work.

ART 25—TEACHING OF ART IN THE GRADES.

Sophomore	Required for B. S. and for Normal Diploma (Edu.)	Either semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Art 5. Methods of teaching Art in the grades. It includes the media of paper, pencil, crayon, and water color; problems in simple toy-making, weaving, clay, and simplex book-binding.

ART 27—COMMERCIAL DESIGN.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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Prerequisites: Art 5 and 21. A study of commercial advertising, applied in various media, such as pen and ink, water-color, and tempera.

ART 28—COMMERCIAL DESIGN.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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Prerequisite: Art 27. Continuation of Art 27.

ART 29—ART APPRECIATION.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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This course consists of an appreciative and analytic study of the world's masterpieces in painting, sculpture, and architecture.

ART 31—ARTS AND CRAFTS.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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Prerequisite: Art 5. A study of design and the decoration of household furnishings, and dress accessories. The application is made by block printing, batiking, tie dyeing.

ART 32—ADVANCED ARTS AND CRAFTS.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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Prerequisite: Art 31. A further development of the previous course in this subject.

ART 33—FREEHAND DRAWING AND PAINTING.

Senior	Elective	Either semester	Two hours
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Drawing and painting from still life, landscapes, and the human figure; media, charcoal, water color, and oil.

ART 34—ADVANCED PAINTING.

Senior	Elective	Either Semester	Two hours
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Prerequisite: Art 33. Continuation of Art 33. The work being done mainly in charcoal and oil.

ART 35—THE TEACHING OF ART IN THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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This is an advanced course in Design and the subjects suitable for teaching in the high school, together with a study of methods, observation, and practice teaching, under careful supervision.

BOOKKEEPING.

(See Department of Commerce.)

DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY.

PROFESSOR LINDSLEY; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR MYRICK; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR MARTIN; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR TRAWICK; MISS TEAVER. Office Room 29 Parks Hall; Rooms 30-33 Parks Hall.

CHEMISTRY 1. GENERAL CHEMISTRY.

Freshman	Required for all courses	First or second semester
		Four hours

Three lectures and one laboratory period a week are given on the fundamentals of general chemistry. Emphasis is laid upon the relation of chemistry to every day life.

CHEMISTRY 9. GENERAL CHEMISTRY.

Freshman	Elective	First or second semester
		Four hours

This is a continuation of Chemistry 1, and is designed for those who are planning to continue work in chemistry. Three lectures and one laboratory period per week.

CHEMISTRY—HOUSEHOLD CHEMISTRY.

Sophomore	Required for B.S. in Home Economics and Home Economics Diploma	First or second semester	Three hours
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This course has two lecture periods and one laboratory period, each week. Emphasis is laid upon the chemistry of foods, fabrics and other chemical problems of the home.

CHEMISTRY 17—QUALITATIVE ANALYSIS.

Sophomore	Elective	First or second semester	Two hours
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This course has two laboratory periods per week. The reactions of the common elements and acid radicals are studied and many analyses made. Equilibrium, solubility product and colloids are emphasized.

CHEMISTRY 18—QUANTITATIVE ANALYSIS.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First or Second semester	Two hours
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Prerequisites: Chemistry 1 and 17. Two laboratory periods are given, with emphasis placed on the quantitative determination of those elements found in the ash of foods.

CHEMISTRY 20—ADVANCED QUALITATIVE.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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This course is elective. It involves the detection of small amounts of materials and their identification by means of the microscope, spectroscope and colorimeter. It deals also with the analysis of many raw materials,—papers, textiles, drugs, foods, and many of the rarer elements.

CHEMISTRY 21—ADVANCED INORGANIC LABORATORY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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This course covers the determination of atomic and molecular weights; colloids and their application; alloys and their preparation; and a study of the reactions of the rarer elements and methods for preparing their compounds.

CHEMISTRY 22—ADVANCED QUANTITATIVE.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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This course is a continuation of Chemistry 18 and involves both volumetric and gravimetric methods.

CHEMISTRY 24—ORGANIC CHEMISTRY.

Sophomore	Elective	Both semesters	Three hours
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A brief study of the chief classes of organic compounds of the aliphatics and aromatics, and is designed for students majoring in other science departments who are not able to spend a year in the study of organic chemistry.

CHEMISTRY 25—TEACHING OF CHEMISTRY.

Senior	Elective	Both semesters	Two hours
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The classroom work consists of a study of the methods of teaching chemistry and of the construction equipment, and use of a laboratory. The students assist in the direction of laboratory sections.

CHEMISTRY 26—ORGANIC CHEMISTRY.

Sophomore	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Two lecture periods and one laboratory period are assigned to this work. It is an intensive study of the aliphatic compounds from the standpoint of structure, synthesis and reactions.

CHEMISTRY 27—ORGANIC CHEMISTRY.

Sophomore	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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This is a continuation of Chemistry 26 and comprises a like study of the aromatic compounds.

CHEMISTRY 31—FOOD CHEMISTRY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Chemistry 1 and 24. It is the chemistry of the carbohydrates, fats, proteins and their metabolism.

CHEMISTRY 32—FOOD CHEMISTRY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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This course has one lecture and two laboratory periods, and is a continuation of Chemistry 31, with the emphasis placed on physiological chemistry.

CHEMISTRY 33—HISTORY OF CHEMISTRY.

Elective	Junior-Senior	First semester	One hour
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This course covers the development of chemistry from the ancient civilizations to the present and emphasizes the contributions made by the leading chemists of all time.

CHEMISTRY 41—ADVANCED INORGANIC.

Junior-Senior	Second semester	Two hours
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This course covers the determination of atomic and molecular weights, the isolation of elements and the preparation of pure compounds from raw materials, and the preparation of alloys. It consists of two periods of laboratory work.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE.

PROFESSOR THRASH: ASSISTANT PROFESSOR BARNETT. Rooms 3-6 Arts Building.

ACCOUNTING.

ACCOUNTING 1—ELEMENTS OF ACCOUNTING.

Freshman	Required in Commerce Course	First semester	Three hours
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Beginning Course: This course is planned to give the student an understanding of the fundamental principles of the subject.

ACCOUNTING 2—INTERMEDIATE ACCOUNTING.

Freshman	Required in Commerce Course	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Accounting 1. A study is made of the accounting methods used in representative wholesale business conducted under the partnership form of organization. A standard set of books adapted to meet the requirements of wholesale and mercantile enterprises is used.

ACCOUNTING 3—HOUSEHOLD ACCOUNTING.

Freshman	General Elective	Both semesters	Two hours
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Open to all students: This course is offered both semesters, as an elective, to all students who desire an elementary course in Household Accounting.

ACCOUNTING 4—GENERAL PRINCIPLES OF ACCOUNTING.

Freshman	General Elective	Both semesters	Three hours
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Open to all students: This course is offered both semesters as an elective subject. Some of the special features of the course will include the prepara-

tion of various business forms, statements, and reports. Upon completion of this work the student should have a thorough working knowledge of fundamental accounting principles.

ACCOUNTING 11—ACCOUNTING PROBLEMS.

Sophomore Required in Commerce Course First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Accounting 1 and 2. Miscellaneous accounting problems. Classification of Accounts. Theories of the balance sheet. Working sheets. Depreciation. Partnership problems.

ACCOUNTING 22—CORPORATION AND VOUCHER ACCOUNTING.

Junior Required in Commerce Course Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Accounting 1, 2 and 11. This course includes more advanced principles of accounting, emphasizing special corporation accounts and the use of the voucher system.

ACCOUNTING 25—COST ACCOUNTING.

Senior Elective Both semesters Three hours

Open to all students who have had courses 1, 2, 11 and 22.

COMMERCE

COMMERCE 17—COMMERCIAL ARITHMETIC.

Sophomore Required for Commerce Course First semester Three hours

This course includes the arithmetic that is necessary to success in business, stressing the types of problems likely in every-day business life.

COMMERCE 24—COMMERCIAL LAW.

Sophomore Elective Second semester Two hours

Prerequisite: Sophomore standing. Law relating to contracts and negotiable instruments.

COMMERCE 25—THE TEACHING OF COMMERCIAL SUBJECTS.

Junior-Senior Required in Normal Course in Commerce Second semester
Three hours

Prerequisites: Accounting 12, Stenography 12, or their equivalent. This course provides a comprehensive study in the materials, methods, and problems of teaching commercial subjects in secondary schools. This course includes text work, discussions, references, readings and reports, and lectures in Accounting, Commercial Arithmetic, Stenography, Typewriting, and Spelling.

STENOGRAPHY

STENOGRAPHY 1—FIRST COURSE.

Freshman Required in Commerce Course First semester Three hours

Beginning Course: This course covers the principles of Gregg Shorthand, with frequent exercises and dictations based on these principles.

STENOGRAPHY 2—SECOND COURSE.

Freshman Required in Commerce Course Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Stenography 1. This is a continuation of the work in the preceding course, taking up contractions, phrasing and easy dictation.

STENOGRAPHY 11—ADVANCED COURSE.

Sophomore Required in Commerce Course First semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Stenography 2. In this course special emphasis is given to daily dictation in business correspondence, editorial and general literary work, and to facility in reading and writing notes.

STENOGRAPHY 20—SECRETARIAL TRAINING.

Junior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Stenography 11. This course is planned to give the student the technical equipment needed by a secretary. In addition to a careful presentation of the principles of stenography and typewriting instruction is given in the following subjects: secretarial and stenographic duties; taking dictation; effective arrangement and display of typewriting; various forms and different parts of a letter; preparation of outgoing and incoming mail; telegrams and cablegrams; various types of filing systems; different parts of the typewriter and its care; stencil cutting and the operation of the mimeograph. The class-room work is made as nearly as possible like that of the office.

STENOTYPY

STENOTYPY 1—FIRST COURSE.

Freshman Elective First semester Three hours

Stenotypy is a system for recording dictation in which words and phrases are printed in ordinary alphabetical characters by means of a machine called the stenotype. The course is planned for beginners who intend to become operators or teachers, and includes the theory of stenotypy, the development of skill in the operation of the machine, and dictation and reading practice. Stenotype machines are provided for classroom work.

STENOTYPY 2—SECOND COURSE.

Freshman Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Stenotypy 1. This course continues the work begun in Stenotypy 1. Special emphasis is laid on developing speed and accuracy in writing and reading notes.

TYPEWRITING

TYPEWRITING 1—FIRST COURSE.

Freshman Elective First semester One hour

Beginning Course: In this course the Touch System is taught. Graded exercises are designed to aid the student in learning the keyboard. The student is early taught the proper care of the machine.

TYPEWRITING 2—SECOND COURSE.

Freshman Required in Commerce Course Second semester One hour

Prerequisite: Typewriting 1. This course continues the work begun in either Typewriting 1 or 3, taking up transcript work from notes.

TYPEWRITING 3—ELEMENTARY COURSE.

Freshman Required in Commerce Course First semester Two hours

This work is open also to students in other courses than Commerce who desire to take Typewriting as an extra or elective subject. Typewriting 1 and Typewriting 3 will not both be credited.

TYPEWRITING 4—ELECTIVE SECOND COURSE.

Freshman Elective Second semester Two hours

This course continues the work of Typewriting 3.

TYPEWRITING 11—ADVANCED COURSE.

Sophomore Required in Commerce Course First semester Two hours

Prerequisite: Typewriting 1, or the equivalent. In this course special emphasis is placed on accuracy and speed. The use of the mimeograph, and other modes of manifolding are studied.

TYPEWRITING 12—ADVANCED COURSE.

Sophomore Required in Commerce Course Second semester Two hours

Prerequisite: Typewriting 11. This course is a continuation of the preceding course.

DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS AND SOCIOLOGY.

PROFESSOR WHITE. Room 20 Parks Hall.

*ECONOMICS***ECONOMICS 1—ELEMENTARY PRINCIPLES OF ECONOMICS.**

Freshman Elective First semester Three hours

Wealth and welfare; pleasant and unpleasant labor; land, labor, and capital as factors in production; the division of labor; large-scale production; factors affecting productiveness; value; prices; demand and supply; speculation; money; banking; credit; panics; crises; depressions; tariff. The distribution of wealth; interest, overproduction, monopolies, wages, social stratification, profits, great fortunes, population and the supply of labor, inequality and its causes. Problems of labor: wages, strikes, labor unions, labor legislation, industrial peace, workmen's insurance, cooperation. Railways; public ownership; trusts; socialism. Taxation. Several field trips will be made.

ECONOMICS 12—THE CONSUMER IN EVERY-DAY LIFE.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

The income of the consuming classes. Changes in price levels. The cost of living and its effects upon real income. Protection of the consumer from exploitation. Purchasing habits. Habits of consumption. Budgets, records, and accounts, checking expenditures. Tests of proper expenditures: food, clothing, shelter. Insurance and investment. Problems of purchasing. Social problems of consumption: the population problem, modification of consumption by the government, sumptuary laws, taxation as a check on consumption, the consumers' cooperative movement, prospects of consumers' cooperation. Leisure and its uses. Field trips will be made.

ECONOMICS 22—MODERN ECONOMIC PROBLEMS.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

This course deals with the practical operations of such economic problems as money and prices, banking and insurance, stocks and bonds, tariff and taxation, wages and labor, public policy toward private industry, public ownership, and methods of distribution of property. The practicality of this course will be emphasized by visits to selected places of interest.

ECONOMICS 26—LABOR PROBLEMS.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

The course emphasizes the social aspects of industry. Such subjects as the following will be studied: social unrest and the new ideals of industry, immigration and the supply of labor, productivity of labor, the problem of equality of opportunity, poverty and subnormal standards of living, women

and children in industry, the long work-day, industrial hazards and social insurance, unemployment, collection bargaining, the cooperative movement, socialism, industrial and social progress. Field trips will enliven the interest in the course.

ECONOMICS 27—AGRICULTURAL ECONOMICS.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Agriculture as a world industry. The organization and management of the farm. Marketing. The cooperative organization of agriculture. Taxation problems. The tariff and the farmer. Recent agrarian movements in the South and West. Rural credits. Agricultural insurance. Railway transportation and the farmer. Good roads. Community economic organizations. Rural progress. Field trips.

ECONOMICS 31—MODERN INDUSTRIALISM.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Characteristics of modern industry: specialization, division of labor, interdependence, cooperation, organization. The human factor in industry. Nature as a factor in industry: land, water, mineral resources. Extractive and genetic industries: fishing, mining, lumbering, livestock growing, cereals, cotton, tobacco. Man's conquest of the material world: the machine process, inventions, power, large-scale production, chemistry and modern industries. Manufacturing industries: meat packing, paper, automobiles. The process of exchange: transportation and communication, money and credit, the middleman, the guidance of modern industry. Field trips.

ECONOMICS 37—MONEY AND BANKING.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

The course deals with the history of money and banking from the earliest times until the present day. A study is made of the mutual giving of gifts, barter economy, money, banking, credit, financial accomplishments, and possibilities growing out of the system of money and banking we confront in the economic world to-day. Special study will be made of the present system of money and banking as it exists in the Southeast.

ECONOMICS 41—ECONOMIC AND FINANCIAL HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES.

Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Resources and the people; industry and commerce; economic crises; economic interpretation of the Constitution; protection and free trade; internal improvements; industrial expansion; currency and banking; panics, crises, and depressions; speculation; large-scale production, mergers, combines; prices and wages; labor organization and labor troubles; money; government regulation; economic progress; economic aspects of the World War.

SOCIOLOGY

SOCIOLOGY 1—ELEMENTARY SOCIOLOGY.

Freshman Elective First semester Three hours

A study of the development of the various groups in society as the family, play, occupational, educational, religious, rural, urban, and racial groups; the geographic, psychologic, and other factors underlying their development; their relation to each other; and various group activities. The community, state, nation, and world as social groups. Religion, language, and other forces, in their national and international aspects, visits to state institutions.

SOCIOLOGY 2—COMMUNITY PROBLEMS.

Freshman Elective Second semester Three hours

The community and its problems. Housing: housing conditions and consequences, housing legislation, aids to housing through philanthropy and other sources, aids to housing by the State and Federal governments. Health: vital statistics, local community health organization, public health activities of State and Federal governments, the role of private agencies. Play and recreation: parks and playgrounds, theatres, commercialized recreation. Americanization: process of Americanization, literacy, citizenship, adjustment of race relations. Field trips.

SOCIOLOGY 21—EDUCATIONAL SOCIOLOGY.

Freshman-Sophomore Elective Second semester Three hours

Societies and social groups. Social forces, processes, and values. The sociological foundations of education: education as a means of social efficiency; sociological foundations of physical, vocational, social, and cultural education. The sociological foundations of the school subjects. The schools and social progress.

SOCIOLOGY 22—MODERN SOCIAL PROBLEMS.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Historical background of modern social problems. Juvenile delinquency. Crime and penal reform. Mental defects. Modern conditions influencing family life. Divorce and family responsibility. Settlements and city neighborhoods. Public health. Immigration. The race problems in America. Rural and city social problems. Public opinion. Social unrest. Socialism. Solutions for the various forms of social maladjustment. Visits to state institutions.

SOCIOLOGY 24—DELINQUENCY AND CRIME

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

The extent and cost of crime. The physiognomy of crime. The making of the criminal; the physical, mental, hereditary, economic, and social factors.

History of punishment: changes in methods of punishment, theories of punishment. Modern penal institutions: capital punishment, prison labor, jails, workhouses, houses of correction, juvenile reformation, men's and women's reformatories, parole and indeterminate sentence. The machinery of justice: the police, the courts, juvenile courts, probation. A program of treatment and prevention. Visits to state institutions.

SOCIOLOGY 27—RURAL SOCIOLOGY.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

The rural people: physical, mental, and social characteristics. Cultural conditions. The rural mind. Psychological attitudes. Rural social institutions: the home, school, Church, club, and lodge. Play and recreation. Sanitation and health. Rural changes. Incomes and standards of living in their relation to rural social life. Racial elements. The present-day rural community. The country village. Rural organization, principles and problems. Suggestions for rural progress. Field trips.

SOCIOLOGY 28—THE FAMILY AS A SOCIAL AND EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

This course deals with the family as a broad social and educational institution from the earliest times until to-day. Such subjects are discussed as marriage, divorce, food supply, kinship systems, duties of members of the household, influence of Christianity upon the family, the seventeenth, eighteenth, and nineteenth century ideals of woman, influence of the Industrial Revolution upon the family, the family in the American colonies, women in industry, the influences of the World War upon the family, the present situation, including the new woman's rights' movement. Visits to state institutions.

THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION.

DEAN SCOTT, CHAIRMAN: PROFESSOR WEBBER; PROFESSOR THAXTON; DIRECTOR BURFITT; PROFESSOR BOLTON; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR MEADOWS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR BROOKS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR STONE.

Besides the Peabody Practice School, presided over by Director Burfitt, the work of the School of Education falls within the following two departments, the courses of which are grouped under the general term of Education:

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND PSYCHOLOGY.

PROFESSOR WEBBER; PROFESSOR BOLTON; DIRECTOR BURFITT; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR MEADOWS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR BROOKS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR STONE. Office Room 28 Arts Building; Rooms 16, 19, 26-27 Arts Building; Laboratory Room 38 Parks Hall.

*DEPARTMENT OF RURAL EDUCATION AND SCHOOL
ADMINISTRATION*.*

PROFESSOR THAXTON. Room 27 Parks Hall.

EDUCATION 1—GENERAL PSYCHOLOGY.

Freshman	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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The work in this course deals chiefly with the normal adult mind. The aim is to give a basis for the specific courses in educational theory and practice. The chief aim is placed upon: (a) habit-formation; (b) attention; (c) sensation; (d) perception; (e) instinctive tendencies; (f) memory; (g) association and economy of learning; (h) the affective life; and (i) the thought processes. In addition to the text-book work, there are class-room demonstrations, lectures and parallel readings. The course is planned to meet the needs of those who wish only an introductory course in Psychology, as well as of those who expect to do advanced work in the subject. Not offered 1928-31.

EDUCATION 2—HISTORY OF EDUCATION.

Freshman	Required of all students	Second semester	Three hours
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After a rapid survey of ancient and medieval education, this course undertakes a more thorough study of the progress in education from the time of the Renaissance to the present. The following topics are emphasized: the influence of the Reformation and of the Counter-Reformation upon the development of modern social forces; the gradual secularization of social life and education; educational reformers, including LaSalle, Lancaster, Comenius, Rousseau, Pestalozzi, Froebel, Herbart, Spencer and Horace Mann; modern educational movements and their significance. The aim of this course is to develop such a historical background that there may be an intelligent appreciation of the purposes of modern democratic tendencies in education, and the social demands upon the school; and finally to arouse the interest of the student in the study of our social needs, and in the educational readjustments to meet them. BOLTON; STONE.

NOTE—This course may sometimes be taken in the First Semester by those students whose schedules in the Second Semester will require this adjustment.

EDUCATION 5—PSYCHOLOGY FOR TEACHERS.

Freshman	Required of all students	First semester	Three hours
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This is an introductory course for the study of the laws governing pupils' learning; throughout, the practical application of the laws of psychology as they affect teaching will be made; psychology will be considered as a useful and practical agent; in addition to the textbook there will be lectures, demonstrations, symposia, parallel readings, practice. WEBBER; MEADOWS.

Courses marked with an asterisk () are given in the Department of Rural Education.

EDUCATION 9—TECHNIQUE OF TEACHING.

Elective	Second semester	Three hours credit
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Open to Sophomores and Freshmen: This course will build on the principles of psychology studied in Education 5. The course undertakes the study of the most important problems that underlie the science of education. The chief contributions to education made by biology, physiology, and the social sciences will be considered, and their application indicated. The relations of teacher, pupil, and curriculum are studied, and the idea emphasized that the child is the center around which all school interests revolve. WEBBER.

*EDUCATION 11—SCHOOL AND CLASS-ROOM MANAGEMENT.

Sophomore	Required for Normal Diploma	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5.

This course is required for the two year normal diploma and also as prerequisite for Education 18, 31, and 32. It aims (1) to prepare for leadership in the educational and social affairs of the community, (2) to give a grounding in the principles and technique of class organization; and (3) to establish the principles and technique of class management. Particular attention paid to recent legislation, both state and national, affecting education and to the new problems arising in our educational system. The Georgia School code is studied as a part of the course and an acquaintance with the organization of the schools in this state is secured, as well as with the powers and duties of the boards of the various units of organization. The selection and duties of teachers, compulsory school law and its enforcement, school libraries and the school as a community center, are also discussed. THAXTON.

EDUCATION 14—THE PSYCHOLOGY OF PERSONALITY.

Sophomore	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Education 5. The analysis of personality and social adjustment will be emphasized in this course. The following problems will be considered: personality types; the measurement of personality traits; motivation factors in behavior; emotional, temperamental and character traits; typical maladjusted personalities; essential factors in a well-integrated personality.

EDUCATION 15—GENERAL METHODS.

Sophomore	Required for B.S. (Edu.)	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5. This course deals with the methods of teaching in the primary, intermediate, and grammar grades, under such topics as the following: Principles of primary practice; phonics; primary reading; literature, and how to select it; the art of story-telling; correlation contributive to language; the game element in primary arithmetic; textbooks and courses of study; the pedagogical scope of intermediate work, and

its relations to the primary and grammar grades; methods in geography, history and civics; the five elements of the English group, and mathematics; content and courses of study for the older grades; the place of drill; examinations; teaching children how to study; educational tests and measurements, and how to give them; the value of mental tests and measurements; the daily schedule; wasted energy of children; and the Americanization and humanization of educational institutions. BURFITT.

EDUCATION 17—THE MODERN SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester One hour

This course aims to prepare for teaching in the Bible School. A brief review of the chief periods of Biblical history is followed by a study of the organization of the modern Sunday School and the best methods of teaching and management.

*EDUCATION 18—THE RURAL SCHOOL AND THE COMMUNITY.

Sophomore Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Ed. 11. This course is designed to give an acquaintance with the rural school and its place in the community. It aims to present plans for the practical solution of problems arising in organizing, managing, and teaching a rural school, including the adaptation of the course of study to the needs of the community and the introduction of the practical rural life subjects. Problems dealing with the organization of the community for social and economic betterment, community surveys, consolidation of schools, the organization and conduct of parent-teachers association, community clubs, school fairs, etc., will be worked out in class. THAXTON.

EDUCATION 19—VISUAL INSTRUCTION.

Sophomore Elective First semester Three hours

Purposes and values of visual education, pictures in education, the stereograph, lantern slides, pictures and diagrams, motion pictures, excursions, experiments, dramatization as a visual aid, and the use of visual aids in the various subjects. The technique of visual instruction. WEBBER.

EDUCATION 20. ELEMENTARY EXPERIMENTAL PSYCHOLOGY.

Sophomore Elective First semester Three hours

One laboratory and two lecture periods are required each week.

Prerequisite: Psychology 5. This course should precede all advanced courses in psychology requiring laboratory work. Experiments will form the basis for a study of the following problems: the function of reaction in adjustment; the physiological basis of behavior; the original tendencies to reaction and their modification; learning and habit formation; attention and purposive behavior; memory and reasoning in learning; intelligence and learning. BOLTON.

EDUCATION 21—EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES.

Sophomore-Junior Elective Three hours

The extra-curricular activities of the school have grown out of the educational principle that the school is a laboratory for citizenship. This course will consider ways and means and the *modus operandi* for conducting these out of class activities so as to develop desirable social ideals and habits. WEBBER.

EDUCATION 22—PRINCIPLES OF EDUCATION.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5. This course undertakes the study of the most important problems that underlie the science of education. The chief contributions to education made by biology, physiology, and the social sciences will be considered, and their applications indicated. The relations of teacher, pupil, and curriculum are studied, and the idea is emphasized that the child is the center around which all school interests revolve. WEBBER.

EDUCATION 23—PSYCHOLOGY OF CHILDHOOD AND ADOLESCENCE.

Junior-Senior Elective Both semesters Three hours

Prerequisite: Education 5. The purpose of this course is to give the teachers, the social worker and the parent an understanding of the characteristics and the problems of growth of the child from birth to maturity. The following problems will be considered: the factors of heredity and environment which influence the learning of children; the learning of desirable habits, skills, attitudes or traits of character and of interests through the development of innate dispositions; the importance of sensory experience and motor activity in gaining accurate perceptive knowledge of people and their needs and of their relationships to each other and to nature; personality traits and problems of adjustment of the pre-school, the pre-adolescent and the adolescent child. BOLTON.

EDUCATION 24—STATISTICAL METHODS APPLIED TO EDUCATIONAL PROBLEMS.

Prerequisites: Education 37 and Junior or Senior standing. This course considers elementary methods for dealing quantitatively with educational data. Topics treated: graphical and tabular representation, averages, percentiles and variability, correlation coefficients, measures of reliability, standard deviation, etc.

EDUCATION 25—PRACTICE TEACHING AND OBSERVATION.

Sophomore Required for Normal Diploma First semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5, and observation in the Practice School. This course, with the next following, provides for sixteen weeks of teaching

in the grades of the Practice School under experienced critic teachers; for general conferences once a week; and for individual conferences not less than twice a week. In estimating the quality of the teaching done, the Supervisor will consider the student's ability to prepare, organize, and present subject matter, and to interest and manage children in the class; her skill in conducting the recitation; her personal fitness for teaching; and her professional attitude. Students-in-training will be required to reserve periods for practice teaching, for observation, and for conferences, the last to be arranged, with the Supervisor in charge of the work.

EDUCATION 26—PRACTICE TEACHING AND OBSERVATION.

Sophomore Required for Normal Diploma Second semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Same as for Education 25. This is a continuation of the preceding work in the Practice School, requiring the second teaching assignment of eight weeks.

EDUCATION 27—EDUCATIONAL TESTS AND MEASUREMENTS.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

One laboratory and two lecture periods are required each week.

Prerequisite: Education 5. This course deals with the use of standard tests for diagnosis of class and of individual abilities in the various school subjects in relation to intelligence and school training. A brief study of the most satisfactory intelligence tests will be followed by a study of educational tests for the following school subjects: arithmetic, spelling, writing, reading, language, history, civics, geography, health and those high school subjects in which members of the class are especially interested. The elementary principles of statistics necessary for the interpretation of the results of the tests will be studied. Special difficulties and remedial measures in the various school subjects will be emphasized. BOLTON.

EDUCATION 28—THE PRIMARY SCHOOL.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

This course is a general methods course for primary grades, designed to give a practical knowledge of principles, methods, and subject matter. The course includes a discussion of the Project Method as applied in the primary grades to the following subjects: Number and Industrial Arts, Nature Study, Language, History, and Health. MOORE.

EDUCATION 29—MODERN PROBLEMS IN EDUCATION.

Sophomore Junior Elective Three hours

This course deals with four major problems in the field of education, namely, (1) the underprivileged child in school, (2) the place of moral education in the school program, (3) Nationalism in education, and (4) contrasting viewpoints in education. Specific cases are studied and case histories are written. STONE.

EDUCATION 30—PROBLEMS IN EDUCATIONAL HYGIENE.

Sophomore	Junior	Elective	Three hours
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The mental adjustment of the child. The normal and abnormal aspects of the pupil's adjustment to his environment. Control of the environment to promote the welfare of the child. The situations arising from the group controls will be the major problems considered.

*EDUCATION 31—RURAL SCHOOL CURRICULUM.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 5; Education 11. This course will consider the principles, underlying curriculum making. A basis, also, for criteria will be sought from psychological and social conditions. The need, if any, for a distinctly rural school curriculum, will be considered; its content, its arrangement, the claim of each subject to a place in the curriculum, and the subject matter of the course. Each student will be expected to select and arrange some portion of work in the curricula and to justify the selection and arrangement so made. THAXTON.

*EDUCATION 32—TEACHING AND SUPERVISION OF THE RURAL HIGH SCHOOL.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 2, 5; Education 11 and 31 recommended. Since many of our students secure positions in consolidated schools, both town and rural, and positions of supervisors and superintendents are being opened to women, this course is designed to meet the needs of these two classes of teachers. The course will discuss the principles of organization and administration of these schools, the school as a community institution, its function in the life of the people, rural school curriculum, methods of teaching and management, consolidation, county unit administration, selection of teachers, tenure of office, class room supervision, teachers' meetings, school fairs, field days and other school activities. THAXTON.

EDUCATION 33—PSYCHOLOGY OF LEARNING.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Education 5. The purpose of this course is to study the principles of learning which should be applied in the direction of the learning of the child through the activities prescribed by the elementary school curriculum. A brief review of the physiology of the nervous system will be followed by a study of: the acquirement of motor skills with applications to the teaching of writing, drawing, sewing and physical training; the best methods of rational learning as applied to the memorization of poetry; the development of ability to read understandingly and the acquirements of habits of study; incentives to learning; the effects of fatigue and abnormal physical conditions upon learning; the acquirement of perceptive knowledge with applications to the project method of teaching. All work to be based upon

experiments in the laboratory and observations in the Peabody Practice School. Two lecture periods and one laboratory period weekly. **BOLTON.**

EDUCATION 34—THE INTERMEDIATE GRADES

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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This course is a general methods course for intermediate grades, designed to give a practical knowledge of principles, methods, and subject matter. Problems relative to organization of subject matter, pupil control, and class management in relation to pupils of this age are discussed. All subjects taught in these grades will be discussed. **BROOKS.**

EDUCATION 35—PRACTICE TEACHING IN THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Senior	Elective	Both semesters	One hour
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Prerequisites: See under Education 25. Provision will be made in the Practice School for the practice teaching of advanced students in connection with their professional work in the teaching of their major subjects. A series of teaching assignments will be made and one credit hour in practice teaching will be expected of those preparing for departmental teaching in high school work.

EDUCATION 36—ASSEMBLY AND AUDITORIUM ACTIVITIES.

Sophomore	Junior	Elective	Three hours
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This course is planned to interpret the newer idea and ideal of education by the use of the assembly. The assembly as a means to develop esprit de corps, unity of thought and action, and good citizenship through cooperative effort will be the dominant theme in this course. **STONE.**

EDUCATION 37—EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5. This course makes a practical application of the principles of child psychology, of the psychology of adolescence, and of general psychology to the problems which confront the teacher. The course considers in a special manner the following topics: association, memory, imagination, perception, and apperception, conception, and reasoning. **MEADOWS.**

EDUCATION 39—THE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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This course considers both Principles and Methodology. Due consideration will be given to fundamental purposes, organization, special activities, the home-room, the pre-adolescent, the place in the school organization, types of schools. The curriculum and the presentation of special subjects. **WEBBER.**

EDUCATION 41—PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Both semesters	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5. This course considers the changing conception of educational goals, how these conceptions developed and changed, the present basis of such conceptions, and the sources of corrective data. Following a careful emphasis upon the relation of education to the other human efforts to better the conditions of mankind, and the need of a well-defined and effective co-operation with all these other efforts, this course considers what to teach, and why; the relative values of certain types of subject matter in attaining the different goals; and how to lead to social efficiency; (a) by a carefully selected course of study, (b) by improving the organization and administration of schools, and (c) by improving the methods of teaching and study, so as to give insight into the social and economical problems which confront the community and its citizens. WEBBER.

EDUCATION 42—MENTAL HYGIENE OF ADOLESCENCE.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Both semesters	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5. This course is planned primarily for those who expect to teach in the upper grades and in the high school. The course considers especially the interests, enthusiasms, and activities of boys and girls from twelve to eighteen years of age, giving careful attention to their physical, mental, and moral health and development, to the nature and meaning of their awakening interests and enthusiasms, and to the methods of directing these awakening forces to the highest and best ends. WEBBER; MEADOWS.

EDUCATION 43—HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Both semesters	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5. This course, planned for prospective high school teachers, seeks to discover and apply the most important principles of psychology and education to the problems which confront the high school teacher. Special attention is given to the subjects taught, and to justifying their places in the curriculum, to the guiding principles for comparing values in subject matter, to the questions of required and elective courses, to the kinds of subject matter suited and not suited to the various classes of pupils, and to the methods of teaching high school subjects to adolescent pupils. WEBBER.

EDUCATION 44—INTELLIGENCE AND MENTAL TESTS.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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One laboratory and two lecture periods are required each week.

Prerequisites: Six hours in psychology. This course deals with the use of intelligence and mental tests in the study of individual differences in native abilities and personality traits. A study of the early conceptions of intelligence

tests and their application to problems of mental growth. Principles underlying curricular and classroom adjustments to meet the individual needs of pupils will be studied. BOLTON.

EDUCATION 45—PRACTICE TEACHING IN SECONDARY SUBJECTS.

Senior	Elective	Either semester	Two hours
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Provision is made in the Peabody Practice School for practice teaching in the field of the major subject of the advanced student electing the course. Upon the proper performance of the teaching assignments given to the pupil two hours' credit will be granted.

EDUCATION 46—PRINCIPLES OF SECONDARY EDUCATION.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Education 2 and 5. The meaning of secondary education; the interrelation of primary, secondary, and college education; the historical and social background; principles governing reorganization; psychological aspects of the secondary pupil; the organization of curricula in relation to the individuality of the pupil in the light of the cardinal principles; educational and vocational guidance. WEBBER.

EDUCATION 47—THE PSYCHOLOGY AND TREATMENT OF EXCEPTIONAL CHILDREN.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Six hours in psychology. This course deals with the diagnosis and treatment of children who have physical or mental defects, unstable emotional and personality traits or very superior intelligence. The major problems studied are: defective auditory and visual acuity; abnormal nervous and mental types; emotional, temperamental and character traits of the subnormal and of the superior child and methods of investigating them; pathological disturbances of character and problems of delinquency; speech defects and the relation of language to intelligence; the play and reading interests of the subnormal and of the superior child. Curricular and environmental adjustments necessary for directing the development of exceptional children will be considered. BOLTON.

EDUCATION 48—ABNORMAL PSYCHOLOGY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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A brief history of insanity, the psychological aspects of insanity, the symptoms of dissociation, complexes, conflicts, repressions. Maladjustments—how avoided, how corrected. Case history method. Clinics. WEBBER.

EDUCATION 50—THE GRAMMAR GRADES.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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This course includes discussions of problems of organization, subject matter, curriculum for sixth and seventh grades, with emphasis on the seventh

grade, methods of teaching the subjects common to the prescribed course, and the interrelation of the grammar grades to the general school structure with the advantages and disadvantages of each plan. Standardization, individual differences, homogeneous grouping of students, matters of guidance, extra-curricular activities, and student control will be given. GILES.

EDUCATION 51—THE PSYCHOLOGY OF SCHOOL SUBJECTS.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Education 2, 5. This course is designed for those who expect to teach in elementary and secondary schools. The course attempts a psychological analysis of the various subjects of the elementary and high school curriculum. Special attention is given to the psychological experiments relating to school subjects. Special assignments will be adjusted to the interests of both elementary and high school teachers.

EDUCATION 52—SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

A study of the mental reactions and behavior of the individual when thrown with others. The problem of the congregate, the aggregate, the assembly, the audience. The "Mob Mind". Applications of psychological principles to the class, the laboratory, and the club group. Principles of audience control. The mind in cooperative sports and other school activities. WEBBER; BOLTON.

*EDUCATION 59—VOCATIONAL EDUCATION.

Junior Required for Vocational H. E. Degree First semester Three hours

This course is designed to furnish the theoretical basis for teaching Home Economics. Principles of Education are studied with reference to their application to Vocational subjects. Methods of organization of subject matter, teaching and management will be discussed. THAXTON.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH.

PROFESSOR WYNN; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR CROWELL; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR SCOTT; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR HUNTER; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR STEELE; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR SMITH; MISS LEGG. Office Room 24 Arts Building; Rooms 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, Arts Building; and Room 8, Chappell Hall.

ENGLISH 1—GENERAL COLLEGE COMPOSITION.

Freshman Required for all degrees Each semester Three hours

This is the fundamental course in college composition. The course aims to develop in students the ability to think in a clear, definite, and orderly manner and to express in oral and written form their thoughts and feelings correctly

and elegantly. This course is required also for the diplomas in Commerce and in English.

ENGLISH 2—GENERAL COLLEGE COMPOSITION.

Freshman Required for all degrees Each semester Three hours

Prerequisite: English 1. A continuation of English 1, with increasing practical application of the principles already learned. This course is required also for the diplomas in Commerce and in English.

ENGLISH 5—TYPE STUDY IN ENGLISH LITERATURE.

Freshman Elective Each semester Three hours

The outlines of English and American literary history will be studied, with illustrative readings. Special attention will be given to the types of literature, the elements and qualities of poetry, and the principles of literary criticism and appreciation.

ENGLISH 8—VOCAL CULTURE AND EXPRESSION.

Freshman and Sophomore Elective First semester Two hours

A course intended primarily as an aid in developing the speaking voice, its improvement and effective control, its use in ordinary conversation and in interpretative reading. Emphasis is placed upon enunciation, tone, quality, modulation and variation. Individual attention is given to correction of defects of speech.

ENGLISH 11—SURVEY OF ENGLISH LITERATURE.

Sophomore Required for Diploma in English First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: English 1 and 2, or 5. A survey of the periods in English literature from its beginning to 1660. The work is based on a study of masterpieces and includes lectures, reports, and extensive supplementary reference work.

ENGLISH 12—SURVEY OF ENGLISH LITERATURE.

Sophomore Elective Second semester Three hours

A continuation of the preceding course from 1660 to the present time.

ENGLISH 15—THE TEACHING OF ENGLISH IN THE GRADES.

Sophomore Required in Normal Courses except Commerce First semester
Three hours

Prerequisites: English 5, or 1 and 2. Applying the principles considered in the earlier work, this course makes a study of the materials and methods of English taught in the grades of the common schools. Much reading of choice literary selections will be required. The aim of this course is to prepare the student for the intelligent and successful teaching of elementary school English.

ENGLISH 17—BUSINESS ENGLISH.

Sophomore Required in Commerce Course Second semester Three hours

In this course a study is made of correct and effective English in correspondence and general business usage. Extensive reading is also required in literature, and especially in the current periodicals that reflect the interests of the commercial world.

ENGLISH 18—LITERARY APPRECIATION.

Elective Each semester One hour

The aim of this course is to give the student a survey of such outstanding features of English literature, through its various epochs, as will instill or foster an appreciative taste.

ENGLISH 20—AMERICAN LITERATURE AFTER 1800.

Elective Each semester Three hours

The Colonial literature: The New England Group. A study of the major New England poets, essayists, novelists, and their immediate followers.

ENGLISH 21—SHAKESPEARE.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

The aim of this course is to give students a broad acquaintance with the poet, and a general knowledge of his contemporaries and of the growth of his art. Selected plays will be studied. Lectures also will be given, and papers drawn from the plays will be required.

ENGLISH 22—SHAKESPEARE.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Plays not studied in English 21 will be used for study and discussion. The subject will be treated in a manner similar to the outline for English 21.

ENGLISH 23—PLAY PRODUCTION.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

A study of Voice placement and delivery, impersonation, interpretation, play selection, staging drama, the Little Theatre. Present day one-act plays will chiefly be considered. A practical course for teachers who wish training in lesson dramatization, school, and church play production.

ENGLISH 24—ADVANCED COMPOSITION.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: English 1 and 2. This course is designed for students who desire to give special attention to any type of writing—the drama, the essay, the short story, or even the longer forms.

ENGLISH 25—THE TEACHING OF HIGH SCHOOL ENGLISH.

Junior-Senior	Required in Normal Course in English	Each semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Two advanced courses in English and one advanced course in Education. This course provides an extensive study in the materials, methods and problems of teaching English in secondary schools. The course will include text work, discussions, references, reading, and reports, lectures, and a re-reading of the materials taught in high schools.

ENGLISH 26—THE SCHOOL NEWSPAPER.

Elective	Second semester and Summer Session	Two hours
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This course is planned primarily for those who may need to assist students in the publication of school newspapers; or for those who may desire to learn methods of school publicity.

ENGLISH 27—ENGLISH GRAMMAR.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Each semester	Three hours
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A comprehensive study will be made of the indispensable features of present-day English grammar. The language will be considered in its functional aspect, or service in thinking. Analysis, sentence-structure, punctuation, practical sentence improvement will be studied.

ENGLISH 28—DEBATING.

Elective	Junior-Senior	Second semester	Three hours
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A practical course in public argument. This course is based upon English 1 and 2. Questions of present-day interest, public problems, and deliberate issues and methods of meeting them will be studied. Lectures. Recitations. Practical exercises.

ENGLISH 29—MAGAZINE AND NEWSPAPER WRITING.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Each semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: English 1 and 2. This course is a general survey of the fundamental principles of news gathering and news writing, the interview, and editorial writing. Local newspaper plants will be used for laboratory practice in editing and correcting copy, proof reading and other details of newspaper work.

ENGLISH 30—AMERICAN LITERATURE BEFORE 1800.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: English 1 and 2. A study of the spread of literary activity in the Middle States, the South, and the West since the War between the States.

ENGLISH 31—THE SHORT STORY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: English 1 and 2. A study will be made of the technical methods of modern story writers, with extensive reading and analysis of stories and story materials. Some attention will also be given to the writing of the short story. A manual may be used, reference work and reports will be expected.

ENGLISH 32—THE NOVEL.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: English 1 and 2. Representative novels will be considered, and the development of the novel as a type of literature will be studied. The course will include class discussions, individual readings, lectures, reference work, and papers on related topics.

ENGLISH 33—FEATURE WRITING.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: English 1 and 2. In this course special attention will be given to feature writing, the human interest story, and the personality sketch.

ENGLISH 34—EDITORIALS.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: English 1, 2 and 29. In this course there will be made a careful study of editorial policies of representative newspapers, both in America and England; various types of editorials will be written; and some attention will be given to the ethics of newspapers.

ENGLISH 36—BIOGRAPHY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Three hours
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A study of biographical literature, in English and in translations, will be made. Attention will be given to form and style.

ENGLISH 37—EARLY NINETEENTH CENTURY LITERATURE.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: English 11 and 12. The Romantic Period—the literature of the early nineteenth century to 1832. The authors studied are Wordsworth, Coleridge, Scott, Byron, Shelley, and Keats in poetry; Coleridge, Lamb, Hazlitt, Landor, and DeQuincey in prose. Each author is treated in relation to what is new and distinctive in his work, and in relation to the current thoughts of the time.

ENGLISH 38—LATER NINETEENTH CENTURY LITERATURE.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: English 37. The Victorian Period—the literature from 1832 to 1892. The work centers around Tennyson and Browning in poetry; and around Arnold, Carlyle and Ruskin in prose. Other writers are considered briefly. The general method of treatment follows that outlined above under English 37. The novel is not considered in this course.

ENGLISH 39—CHAUCER.

Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: English 11. An intensive study of the Prologue and three tales from "Canterbury Tales". Other tales and poems will be read more rapidly in Modern English translation.

ENGLISH 40—OLD ENGLISH.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: English 1, 2 and 11. In this course a study is made of Old English, with special reference to its bearing upon the problems of modern English grammar. Attention is also given to the literature of this early period.

ENGLISH 41—SOUTHERN LITERATURE.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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This course presupposes a general knowledge of American literature, and will deal with the poets, essayists, novelists, and orators of the South from colonial days to the present. It will be conducted somewhat on the seminar plan; students will report regularly on the results of their reading and research in the field of Southern literature.

ENGLISH 42—LITERATURE OF THE OLD TESTAMENT.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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The literature of the Old Testament is studied to gain an appreciation and understanding of the great movements as recorded. Special emphasis will be given to the narrative and poetic books.

ENGLISH 43—LITERATURE OF THE NEW TESTAMENT.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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The historical background for the study of the life of Jesus will first be considered. Then the Gospels, the Acts of the Apostles, and the Letters will be taken up in order. Special attention will be given to the life of St. Paul and his influence on modern civilization.

ENGLISH 44—CONTEMPORARY LITERATURE.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: English 12 and 20. A somewhat intensive study of the chief writers in British and American literature since 1900 in the fields of poetry, fiction, and drama.

ENGLISH 46—THE MODERN DRAMA.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

The best plays of the modern period will be studied in order to appreciate the growth, development, and prevailing tendencies of European and American Drama.

ENGLISH 47—MAGAZINE LITERATURE.

Elective Junior-Senior Three hours

A survey of the contemporary magazine field with especial attention to the function of the magazine in modern life and education. A wide area of the field is viewed. Lectures and reading.

THE SCHOOL OF FOREIGN LANGUAGES.

PROFESSOR DANIELS, *Chairman*: PROFESSOR FLOYD; PROFESSOR MCGEE; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR TURNER; MISS HALL. Office Room 14, Arts Building; Rooms 1 and 15 Arts Building.

To secure administrative unity the several Departments in the foreign languages are regarded as a unit under the direction of the Chairman of the School of Foreign Languages, but the interior workings of each Department is left to the proper Head thereof.

DEPARTMENT OF FRENCH.

PROFESSOR MCGEE; PROFESSOR DANIELS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR TURNER.

FRENCH 1—ELEMENTARY FRENCH.

All Classes Required or Elective Either semester Four hours

In this course the student is carefully trained in the pronunciation of French, in the acquisition of a vocabulary and the employment thereof in conversation and composition, in the grammatical constructions of the language, and in translation and reading at sight. MCGEE. TURNER.

FRENCH 2—ELEMENTARY FRENCH.

All Classes Required or Elective Second semester Four hours

Prerequisite: French 1 or one year of high school French. Continuation of French 1, but with more attention to reading. Textbooks as in French 1, supplemented by simple stories or plays. MCGEE. TURNER.

FRENCH 11—ADVANCED FRENCH.

Sophomore Required or Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: French 1 and 2 or two years of high school French. Reading and translation of French prose, together with a rapid review of the grammar, with drill in conversation and composition. TURNER.

FRENCH 12—ADVANCED FRENCH.

Sophomore Required or Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: French 11 or the equivalent. Continuation of French 11. TURNER.

FRENCH 17—SCIENTIFIC FRENCH.

Sophomore Required for B.S. (G.Sc.) First semester Three hours

Prerequisite: As for French 11. Reading and translation of scientific articles in French. Textbook: Daniels' "French Scientific Reader". Elective, but designed especially to meet the needs of students seeking the B.S. degree, who will elect this course instead of French 11. DANIELS.

FRENCH 18—SCIENTIFIC FRENCH.

Sophomore Required for B.S. (G.Sc.) Second semester Three hours

Continuation of French 17. Textbook as for French 17. Elective, but designed to meet the needs of students seeking the B.S. degree, who will elect this course instead of French 12. DANIELS.

FRENCH 21—FRENCH LITERATURE OF THE SEVENTEENTH CENTURY.

Junior Required or Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: French 11 and 12 or an equivalent, but students who are carrying French 11 may be admitted at the discretion of the instructor. Study of the history of French literature during the seventeenth century and reading and translation of texts illustrative of the period. McGEE.

FRENCH 22—FRENCH LITERATURE OF THE EIGHTEENTH CENTURY.

Junior Required or Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: French 21, but students, who are carrying French 12 may be admitted at the discretion of the instructor. Study of the history of French literature during the eighteenth century and reading and translation of texts illustrative of the period. McGEE.

FRENCH 25—ADVANCED TEACHERS' COURSE.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: 1, 2 and either 11, 12 or 17, 18. Study of methods of teaching French, together with work in phonetics, conversation, grammar and translation. McGEE.

FRENCH 26—FRENCH POETRY OF THE NINETEENTH CENTURY.

Junior-Senior Elective Summer Session Three hours

Prerequisites: French 11 and 12 or the equivalent. Study of the lyric poetry of Lamartine, Hugo, Vigny, Musset, Leconte de Lisle, Sully Prudhomme, Heredia, Verlaine, etc. Textbook: "Henning's French Lyrics of the Nineteenth Century." Not offered in Summer Session of 1931.

FRENCH 27—EARLY MODERN FRENCH POETRY.

Junior-Senior Elective Summer Session Three hours.

Prerequisites: French 11 and 12 or the equivalent. Study of French poetry preceding the nineteenth century, especially of the poems of Ronsard, LaFontaine, Boileau and Chenier. Not offered in Summer Session of 1931.

FRENCH 28—SPOKEN FRENCH FOR TEACHERS.

Junior-Senior Elective or required Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Twelve hours of college French beyond French 1 and 2; oral French for class-room and practical use, emphasis on the development of conversational facility. McGEE.

FRENCH 29—CONTEMPORARY FRENCH POETRY.

Junior-Senior Elective Summer Session Three hours

Prerequisites: French 11 and 12 or the equivalent. Study of French poetry of the present day or of the immediate past, such as the poems of Verlaine, Laforgue, Regnier, Fort, Jammes, and Duhamel. Offered in the Summer Session of 1931. DANIELS.

FRENCH 31—FRENCH LITERATURE OF THE NINETEENTH CENTURY.

Senior Required or Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: French 21 and 22 or may accompany French 21. Study of the history of French literature during the nineteenth century until the contemporary period; reading and translation of texts illustrative of the period. McGEE.

FRENCH 32—CONTEMPORARY FRENCH LITERATURE.

Senior Required or Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: French 21 or may accompany French 22. Study of French literature during the contemporary period; reading and translation of illustrative texts. McGEE.

FRENCH 33—PRESENT-DAY LITERARY ACTIVITY IN FRANCE.

Junior-Senior Elective Summer Session Three hours

The course deals with the post-war movements in fiction, drama, poetry and journalism. Not offered in the summer session of 1931. McGEE.

FRENCH 34—THE FRENCH NOVEL.

Junior-Senior Elective Summer Session Three hours
 Study of the genre from the earliest manifestation to the present day. Mc-
 GEE.

FRENCH 36—RECENT FRENCH DRAMA.

Junior-Senior Elective Summer Session Three hours
 A study of the French theatre during the last half century. McGEE.

DEPARTMENT OF LATIN.

PROFESSOR DANIELS; MISS HALL.

LATIN 1—CICERO.

Freshman Required or Elective First semester Four hours
Prerequisite: Three units of High School Latin. This course contem-
 plates a careful study of the thought and syntax of the "*De Senectute*"; a
 careful reading of the "*De Amicitia*". DANIELS.

LATIN 2—LIVY AND SALLUST.

Freshman Required or Elective Second semester Four hours
Prerequisite: Latin 1. Careful reading of selections from Livy's "His-
 tories" and from the works of Sallust. DANIELS.

LATIN 11—HORACE.

Sophomore Required or Elective First semester Three hours
Prerequisite: Latin 2. This course includes a careful study of the "*Odes*"
 and "*Epodes*" of Horace; a study of Latin meters; Roman mythology; prac-
 tice in sight reading; and a consideration of the author's personality, style
 and influence upon literature. DANIELS.

LATIN 12—CATULLUS.

Sophomore Required or Elective Second semester Three hours
Prerequisite: Latin 11. Careful reading of the poems of Catullus. DANIELS.

LATIN 21—JUVENAL.

Junior Required or Elective First semester Three hours
Prerequisite: Latin 12. The reading of the Satires of Juvenal; a study
 of the origin and development of Roman satire; a study of Rome and the
 private life of the Romans. DANIELS.

LATIN 22—LATIN DRAMA AND OVID.

Junior Required or Elective Second semester Three hours
Prerequisite: Latin 12. The reading of Plays by Terence, and by Plautus;
 a study of the origin, development, and characteristics of Latin Comedy; a

consideration of the early forms and constructions of Latin; selections from the works of Ovid. DANIELS.

LATIN 25—TEACHERS' COURSE.

Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Latin 1, 2, 11, 12, 21 and 22. The course will include a consideration of methods of teaching; a study of syntax; pronunciation of Latin; prosody; practice in translating; and an extensive review of Latin literature taught in the secondary schools. HALL.

LATIN 26—SURVEY OF LATIN POETRY.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Summer Session	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Latin 11 and 12; a course in Roman history will be highly desirable. This is a general course in the history of Latin poetry, with illustrative selections. Not offered in Summer Session of 1931.

LATIN 27—LATIN MASTERPIECES.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Summer Session	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Latin 11 and 12; a course in Roman History will be highly desirable. An intensive study of Latin masterpieces not studied in the other Latin courses. DANIELS.

LATIN 28—MARTIAL.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Summer Session	Three hours
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A careful study of the Epigrams of Martial. Not offered in the summer session of 1931.

LATIN 31—VERGIL.

Senior	Required or Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Latin 21 and 22. Careful reading of the Eclogues and Georgics of Vergil. DANIELS.

LATIN 32—LUCRETIVS.

Senior	Required or Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Latin 31. Careful study of selections from the "De Rerum Natura" of Lucretius with lectures on the relations of his scientific theories with those of the present day. DANIELS.

DEPARTMENT OF SPANISH.

PROFESSOR FLOYD.

SPANISH 1—ELEMENTARY SPANISH.

Freshman	Required or Elective	First semester	Four hours
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Careful drill in pronunciation, conversation, fundamentals of Spanish grammar, irregular verbs and composition. FLOYD.

SPANISH 2—ELEMENTARY SPANISH.

Freshman Required or Elective Second semester Four hours

Prerequisite: Spanish 1 or the equivalent. Continuation of Spanish 1 with the reading of easy Spanish stories and plays. FLOYD.

SPANISH 11—INTERMEDIATE SPANISH.

Freshman-Sophomore Required or Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Spanish 2 or the equivalent. Reading of modern novels and plays; review of Spanish grammar; composition; conversation. FLOYD.

SPANISH 12—INTERMEDIATE SPANISH.

Freshman-Sophomore Required or Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Spanish 11 or the equivalent. Continuation of Spanish 11. FLOYD.

SPANISH 21—SPANISH DRAMA IN THE NINETEENTH CENTURY.

Required or Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Spanish 11 and 12 or the equivalent. Study of the development of the drama from the latter part of the 18th century; lectures on the various literary movements; representative plays read and analyzed; parallel readings. FLOYD.

SPANISH 22—SPANISH NOVEL IN THE NINETEENTH CENTURY.

Required or Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Spanish 21 or the equivalent. Study of the development and structure of the 19th century novel; reading of representative works of the leading authors; parallel readings; lectures. FLOYD.

SPANISH 25—TEACHERS' COURSE IN SPANISH.

Junior Senior Elective Either semester Two hours

Prerequisite: At least 12 hours of Spanish above Spanish 12 or the equivalent. Review of Spanish grammar; composition; conversation and study of methods of teaching Spanish. FLOYD.

SPANISH 26—SPANISH POETRY.

Elective Summer session 1931 Three hours

Prerequisites: Spanish 11 and 12 or the equivalent. Study of the leading poets of Spain and Spanish America; lectures; parallel readings. McGEE.

SPANISH 27—SPANISH AMERICAN LITERATURE.

Elective Summer session 1932 Three hours

Prerequisites: Spanish 11 and 12 or the equivalent. Study of representative works of the leading writers of Spanish America; lectures; parallel readings.

SPANISH 29—CONTEMPORARY SPANISH NOVEL.

Required or Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Spanish 11 and 12 or the equivalent. Study of the leading contemporary novelists; lectures; parallel readings. FLOYD.

SPANISH 30—CONTEMPORARY SPANISH DRAMA.

Required or Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Spanish 29 or the equivalent. Study of the leading dramatists of today; lectures; parallel readings. FLOYD.

SPANISH 31—GOLDEN AGE LITERATURE.

Required or Elective First semester Two hours

Prerequisite: At least 6 hours of Spanish above Spanish 12 or the equivalent. Study of the most representative classical prose; lectures; parallel readings. FLOYD.

SPANISH 32—GOLDEN AGE LITERATURE.

Required or Elective Second semester Two hours

Prerequisite: Spanish 31. Study of the most important authors of the classical drama; lectures; parallel readings. FLOYD.

SPANISH 34—SURVEY OF SPANISH LITERATURE.

Junior-Senior Required or Elective Summer Session 1933 Three hours

Prerequisite: At least 12 hours of Spanish above Spanish 12 or the equivalent. Brief survey of Spanish literature with the reading of a few outstanding works.

DEPARTMENT OF FRENCH.

(See School of Foreign Languages.)

DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY.

PROFESSOR DORRIS. Room 18 and Laboratory Room 26 Parks Hall.

GEOGRAPHY 1—PRINCIPLES OF GEOGRAPHY.

Freshman Elective Either semester Three hours

An introductory study of relations between man and the conditions and resources of his earth environment. The course is intended to develop a clear conception of various elements of the natural environment, including climate, land forms, soils, surface and underground waters, mineral deposits and natural vegetation, and to point out ways in which these factors influence human life.

GEOGRAPHY 15—METHODS OF TEACHING GEOGRAPHY IN THE GRADES.

Sophomore Elective or required in Normal Course Either semester
Two hours.

A course for teachers in methods of teaching Geography in the grades. Methods and devices discussed, including a general review of the main features of the continents together with a detailed study of North America.

GEOGRAPHY 17—GEOGRAPHY OF NORTH AMERICA.

Sophomore Elective First semester Three hours

A regional study of the continent, emphasizing the principal economic activities of the inhabitants of distinctive human use regions, such as the Cotton Belt, the Corn Belt, the Northeastern Urban Region, and the Sub-tropic Coast Region, in relation to the earth-environment of each area.

GEOGRAPHY 20—COMMERCIAL AND ECONOMIC GEOGRAPHY.

Junior Elective Second semester Three hours

The course treats of man's utilization of the earth's resources in his effort to make a living. It is a study of the chief industries by which people exploit the farm, range, forest, mine, and sea, and of the leading routes by which commodities move from producing to consuming areas. Emphasis upon the basic industries of the United States.

GEOGRAPHY 21—GEOGRAPHY OF SOUTH AMERICA.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

A study of the natural regions of the continent, climate and human use, and the reactions of man to the conditions of environment in each region.

GEOGRAPHY 22—POLITICAL GEOGRAPHY.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Selected problems in economics, social, and political geography which arise from the expansion of great powers, the existence of colonial empires, the rivalry of nations in trade and industry, and their competition in exploiting the resources and populations of the "backward" countries of the world.

GEOGRAPHY 23—ADVANCED PHYSIOGRAPHY.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Two hours

The origin and physiographic history of various types of land forms; processes by which geologic agents modify the surface of the earth, and the influence of physiographic features upon human activities.

GEOGRAPHY 24—GEOGRAPHY OF EUROPE.

Junior Elective First semester Two hours

The economic activities, and consequent political and social attitudes, of the inhabitants of the several European countries. Special emphasis is given

to the important manufacturing districts and chief urban centers in Great Britain, Germany and France.

GEOGRAPHY 26—ECONOMIC GEOGRAPHY OF FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

A survey of selected countries and groups of countries, in which the essential character and outstanding industries of each area are discussed, and an effort is made to point out the contribution of each land to world economy.

GEOGRAPHY 27—GEOGRAPHY OF THE SOUTH.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

A course dealing in the special problems of the south. Type regions are discussed, and the natural resources are dealt with in a comprehensive way, with an emphasis upon the future development.

GEOGRAPHY 32—HISTORICAL GEOGRAPHY OF NORTH AMERICA

Senior Elective Either semester Three hours

The major adjustments of American society to those earth conditions and resources which have helped shape the economic, social, and political development of the nation; relations between the rising American people and its environment at selected periods of time.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

PROFESSOR WOOTTEN: ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR PERKINS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR SMITH; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR THAXTON. Office Room 1 Chappell Hall; Rooms 2, 3 and 5 Chappell Hall.

In accordance with the general plan of the College administration to give "more health in education and more education in health", direct instruction in hygiene was started in 1911, under the supervision of the Department of Physical Education. In 1917 a distinct and well equipped Department of Health was established. Since the beginning of this Department two courses in Health of three credit hours each have been required for all degrees and diplomas, and additional elective courses have been offered to students wishing to specialize in health education.

The Department of Health has a fourfold aim; first, to promote the general health, efficiency, and happiness of each student through the encouragement of healthful attitudes and behavior; second, to develop in the student a fine civic consciousness through a thorough study of the principles of public health, school hygiene, school health supervision, etc.; third, to train the student to meet her individual responsibility for health education in the home and in the school; fourth, to train special teachers of health. The B. S. degree in Education majoring in Health is now open to those students who wish to specialize in health education.

Since the good physical tone of every student is an accepted fundamental aim of the College, individual attention is given each student through the painstaking cooperation of the Department of Health, the Department of Physical Education, the College Physician and College Nurse. Two thorough physical examinations are made of each student during the college sessions. Careful follow-up work is done by the College Physician and Nurse in the college clinic, by the Professors of Health and Physical Education in small corrective classes and private conferences, and by specialists if the case demands it.

HEALTH 2—PERSONAL HYGIENE APPLIED.

Freshman	Required	Either semester	Three hours
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This course is concerned chiefly with the healthful behavior—mentally, physically, socially and emotionally—of each student taking same. The content is selected with a view of awakening the interest in and meeting the felt needs of each student and the procedure gives them many opportunities to practice specific corrections of health habits and to check their individual progress in habits and remediable defects. The content of the course includes basic facts in physiology, applied personal hygiene, brief history of scientific contributions and contributors to modern health, (health heroes) exposure of common nostrums and quackery, introduction to first aid and home nursing. Procedure includes demonstrations, a wide range of parallel reading, projects, class discussions, group and individual conferences with instructors.

HEALTH 15—PRINCIPLES OF HEALTH EDUCATION.

Sophomore	Required	Either semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Health 2 or equivalent. This course is an orientation course in health education. It is planned to meet the fundamental needs of the classroom teacher, both in content and procedure. Topics: health education defined; principles of public health, of school hygiene, and of health supervision of the school child; the parent's part on the health program; introduction to materials and methods of teaching health in elementary and secondary schools. Procedure: lectures, recitations, class work, parallel reading, reports, projects, field trips for the study of school plants; observation and practice in making a teacher's health survey of school children; observation of health work and practice teaching in the College Practice School; individual assignments for annual health exhibit, notebooks, posters.

HEALTH 20—MOTHERCRAFT.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Either semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Health 2 and 15. This course consists of the study of (1) embryonic development, (2) pre-natal care, (3) infant care, (4) the pre-school child, (5) an introduction to the problem of child guidance and the nursery school, (6) social and industrial problems affecting the family, and (7) a short course on eugenics. The aim of the course is to give a practical survey of the Mothercraft field by use of lectures, demonstrations, extensive parallel

reading with reports and discussions by the class individual conferences. Material assistance with the annual Health Exhibit is expected of students taking this course. Required of all majors in health.

HEALTH 21—APPLIED ANATOMY.

Sophomore-Junior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Health 2 and 15. Biology 11. This is a course of lectures with laboratory work on the anatomy of the skeleton, muscular and nervous systems, on the anatomy of viscera, with emphasis on the circulatory, and digestive systems. Attention is given to growth and development. Note books required of all majors in health.

HEALTH 24—EVERY DAY PROBLEMS IN HEALTH CONSERVATION.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

This is an advanced course in personal hygiene and in individual responsibility for personal, family, industrial and community health. Conservation of human life (1) by applied personal hygiene with emphasis on the degenerative disease—predisposing causes, danger signals and prevention; and on conservation of nervous energy through care of sense organs, mental hygiene, hygiene of speech and hygienic program of living; (2) by prevention and control of infectious disease; and (3) by prevention of accidents.

HEALTH 25—THE TEACHING OF HEALTH IN THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Senior Elective First semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Health 2, 15. The central purpose of this course is to prepare students to teach health in elementary schools. The work includes lectures, discussions, reading, reports, projects, the study of and the making of courses of study. The course is open only to advanced students who are expected to have practice teaching in elementary grades of the College Practice School.

HEALTH 27—HYGIENE OF SPEECH.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Two hours

Prerequisite: Health 2 or its equivalent. This course is fundamentally a course for development of personality, conversational speaking, voice needs of teachers and public speakers. Methods of approach and practice include exercises for defects of speech, posture, and movement, simple reading, extemporaneous speaking, story telling, pantomime, dramatization, current event reports, debates.

HEALTH 28—MENTAL HYGIENE.

Senior Elective Second semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Health 2 and 15, Psychology 5. This course presents the relation of individual and social psychology to the problems of mental hy-

giene. Special attention is given to the following subjects; habit formation; emotions; sleep; exercise; a brief discussion of mental health and disorders of the mind. Procedure includes lectures, discussions, wide range of parallel reading, reports, diaries kept on practice of mental, emotional or social habits selected by each student; individual conferences whenever wished, individual progress cards worked up and kept by students. Lectures by various mental specialists from State Sanitarium. Field trips to State Sanitarium, Georgia Training School for Boys, the State Prison Farm-Women's section. Offered every other year.

HEALTH 29—ADVANCED FIRST AID AND HOME NURSING.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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Prerequisite: Health 21 or Biology 11. This course includes simple nursing procedure and first aid for common emergencies. Topics discussed are surroundings of the sick, recognition of early symptoms of disease, prevention and care of common illnesses as colds, sore throats, etc., food for the sick, entertainment of patients, proper care of emergency illnesses and injuries, with emphasis on prevention and treatment of accidents common to playground and gymnasium. Methods of bandaging and first principles of massage used in athletic training. Advised for all majors.

HEALTH 30—SCHOOL HEALTH SUPERVISION.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Either semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Health 2 and 15. This course will consider health and medical inspection; anthropometry; methods of making general health examination including special methods for ears, eyes, circulatory and respiratory systems, spine and feet; follow-up work and the correction of remediable defects. Students will also be given the opportunity of observing and assisting in physical examinations of students in the College Practice School. The course also considers common communicable diseases, school sanitation, the hygiene of instruction, the health of teachers and other school employees. Advised for all majors in health.

HEALTH 37—SCHOOL HYGIENE.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Health 2 and 15. This course consists of lectures, demonstrations, recitations, and field trips on the following topics: the selection of a location for a school and playground; school-house planning; the lighting, heating, ventilating and cleaning of a school house; the care of a school plant, desks and other equipment as toilets and lavatories; special schools for the handicapped; fatigue and hygiene of instruction; the work and qualifications of a janitor and many other topics of practical importance to healthful schools of city and country. Offered every other school year.

HEALTH 40—PUBLIC HEALTH AND SANITATION.

Junior-Senior Elective First and second semesters Three hours

Prerequisites: Health 2, Health 15, and Biology 20. The purpose of this course is to present the history, development, and practice of modern public health work. Lectures, demonstrations, parallel reading, individual reports, projects, laboratory activity, field trips and surveys are used to vitalize scientific facts and procedures. Advised for all majors.

HEALTH 42—CLUBCRAFT.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Health 2 and 15. Helpful parallel courses, Health 29 and 35, Biology 28, Science 15. Clubcraft discusses and gives practical experience in a variety of extra-curricular activities. This presents an intensive study of the best known organizations for girls and training for leadership in them. The course includes lectures by class teacher and specialists in each of the club fields. Library work, notebooks, field trips and practical experience with local groups are required. Excellent parallel course for Health 45.

HEALTH 43—ANIMAL PARASITES AND HUMAN DISEASES.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

This course consists of lectures, recitations and reports on the more important parasites of man and domestic animals. Some of the topics are mosquitoes, hook-worms, whip-worms, pen-worms, tape-worms, "chiggers", amoebic dysentery, tick fever and other parasites of man. The laboratory work consists of field surveys, life history work, dissections, and experiments. Offered every third year.

HEALTH 45—STANDARDS FOR EVALUATION OF HEALTH MATERIALS, PROGRAMS AND PROGRESS.

Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

This course is concerned with the evaluation (1) of health materials, (2) health programs, (3) courses of study, and (4) various forms of health questionnaires, health tests and health surveys.

DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY AND POLITICAL SCIENCE.

PROFESSOR JOHNSON: ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR O'KELLEY; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR GREENE. Rooms 20, 21 and 22 Parks Hall.

*HISTORY***HISTORY 8—ORIENTATION COURSE IN WORLD HISTORY.**

Freshman Elective Both semesters Three hours

This is an orientation course in history. It is a rapid survey of the story of the epochs of progress in human civilization to serve as a background for

HISTORY 22—AMERICAN HISTORY TO 1820.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

A study of the Colonial Era, the Revolutionary Period, the Period of the Confederation and the Constitution, the organization of the New Government and the development of nationality, the westward movement, the War of 1812, to the Period of Sectionalism.

HISTORY 23—AMERICAN HISTORY FROM 1820 TO PRESENT TIME

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours.

A continuation of the survey course, History 22, a study of the period of the rise of slavery issue, the Civil War and Reconstruction, and the post-war period with its new problems, the Spanish American War, the era of American imperialism up to the World War, and post-war problems.

HISTORY 24—HISTORY OF ENGLAND OF THE 19TH AND 20TH CENTURIES.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours.

A study of nineteenth and twentieth century England, showing her growth in democracy and liberalism, her colonial expansion, her part in the World War, and the conditions in present-day England. WHITE.

HISTORY 25—METHODS OF TEACHING HISTORY IN THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Recommended for a major in history.
 Junior-Senior Second semester Two hours

Methods of teaching history or civics in the High School. A study of the different types of history recitation, use of supplementary material, kind of source material to be used and how to handle it, map work, note-book work, current history, and history tests.

HISTORY 27—THE RENAISSANCE AND THE REFORMATION.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisite: History 11. A study of the forces leading to the rise, the spread and the influence of the Renaissance and the Reformation.

HISTORY 28—THE FRENCH REVOLUTION.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: History 11. This course treats of the history of France and Europe in the eighteenth century to the Congress of Vienna. Its aim is to show the rise of the revolutionary spirit in its intellectual and economic as well as in its political aspects and to emphasize the importance of the era not only in France, but also in the history of modern civilization and the growth of democracy.

HISTORY 29—RECENT EUROPEAN HISTORY.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: History 11. A study of those forces in European history which led to the World War; the World War, its results, and the reconstruction period following.

HISTORY 30—EUROPEAN HISTORY—1648-1789.

Junior-Senior Elective Either semester Three hours

A study of the rise of Russia; of Central Europe during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries; and of the development of absolutism in France and the age of Louis XIV.

HISTORY 32—HISTORY AND GOVERNMENT OF GEORGIA.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

A study of the economic, social, political, and constitutional history of the State with emphasis on her part in national affairs. In connection with the supplementary reading each student will be required to do research work on some particular phase of the State's history and to embody the same in a term paper.

HISTORY 33—THE UNITED STATES AND LATIN AMERICA.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

A general course in the study of Central and South American countries, their political, economic and social development with special reference to the political and economic relations of the United States with Latin America.

HISTORY 43—AMERICAN HISTORY FROM 1870 TO THE PRESENT TIME.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

A more detailed study of Recent United States History covering the issues following the reconstruction period from 1870 to the present time. It is the story of how the United States expanded into a world power. Special emphasis will be placed upon her share in the world war and her post-war problems.

HISTORY 44—THE COLONIAL ERA.

Junior and Senior Elective First semester Two hours

This is an intensive study of the history of the American Colonies.

POLITICAL SCIENCE

POLITICAL SCIENCE 16—THE CONSTITUTION AND AMERICAN IDEALS.

Freshman-Sophomore Elective Both semesters One hour

A study of the Constitution of the United States and of the Constitution of Georgia. O'KELLEY.

POLITICAL SCIENCE 21—POLITICAL THOUGHT AND POLITICAL PARTIES.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

A rapid survey of the development of political thought as to the contribution of the Ancient, Medieval, and the Modern world thereto. A more detailed study of the origin, growth, and development of political thought in the United States; the origin, character, development of major and minor parties, their platforms, nominations, and campaign methods.

POLITICAL SCIENCE 22—AMERICAN DIPLOMACY.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

An historical study of the foreign relations of the United States, of diplomatic personalities and events, and of the American contribution to international law.

POLITICAL SCIENCE 24—THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

A detailed study of the Federal Constitution, its historical background, the main features of government provided, modifications through historical development, by interpretations, amendments, etc., the problems arisen under it, and a comparison of its provisions with those found in the constitution of Georgia.

POLITICAL SCIENCE 26—AMERICAN GOVERNMENT—STATE AND LOCAL.

Required of those majoring or minoring in History.

Freshman-Sophomore-Junior Second semester Three hours

A study of the government of state, county, township, and city; political parties, party machinery, courts, and judicial procedure.

THE SCHOOL OF HOME ECONOMICS.

PROFESSOR HASSLOCK, *Chairman*: PROFESSOR HARPER; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR RIDDELL; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR TABB; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR STEELE; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR MORRIS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OWENS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR HALL; MISS BURCH; MISS CHAPPELL.

To secure administrative unity the several Departments in Home Economics are regarded as a unit under the direction of the Chairman of the School of Home Economics, but the interior workings of each Department is left to the proper Head thereof.

DEPARTMENT OF HOME ECONOMICS EDUCATION.

PROFESSOR HASSLOCK, Chairman: ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR RIDDELL. Room 9, Chappell Hall.

HOME ECONOMICS 11—PROBLEMS IN HOMEMAKING.

Sophomore Elective Either semester Three hours

This course will include a general study of foods, food preparation and serving, nutrition, home decoration and management, clothing selection and care, child care and family relations. Not open to students who have taken Household Science 1 and 2.

HOME ECONOMICS 15—HOME ECONOMICS METHODS IN ELEMENTARY AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS.

Required for H. E. two year diploma and Degree in Vocational Home Economics.

Sophomore-Junior Either semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Household Art 11, Household Science 14, Household Science 17 at least concurrent. This course deals with the principles underlying the setting up of objectives, selection of subject matter, methods, standards for judging instruction, curricula construction, and teacher rating in the grades, with especial attention given to the field of Home Economics; opportunity is afforded in the Peabody High School for actual experience in these problems.

HOME ECONOMICS 20—DEMONSTRATION IN HOME ECONOMICS.

Junior-Senior Elective Either semester Two hours

This course is intended to give the student experience in demonstrating to the class different phases of Home Economics work. It will be especially valuable to those preparing for Home Demonstration and Home Economics in business as well as teaching.

HOME ECONOMICS 25—HOME ECONOMICS STUDENT TEACHING IN ELEMENTARY AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS.

Required for Home Economics, two year diploma, and Degree in Vocational Home Economics.

Sophomore-Junior Either semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Household Art 11, Household Science 14, Household Science 17 at least concurrent. This course parallels Home Economics 15. It provides for eighteen weeks in teaching and observation of Home Economics in the Peabody High School under the direction of a supervisor; for general conferences once a week. Students-in-training will be required to reserve periods for practice teaching, for observation, and for conferences. The last is to be arranged with the supervisor in charge of this work.

HOME ECONOMICS 34—HOME ECONOMICS METHODS IN SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL.

Required for Degree in Vocational Home Economics

Senior First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Home Economics 15 and 25 or the equivalent. This course is for students preparing to teach Home Economics in Senior High Schools. It provides for experience in the following: Setting up objectives, the selection of subject matter, examination, and evaluation of texts, working out definite standards for judging instruction, studying problems in classroom management, and consideration of the relative value of methods in teaching.

HOME ECONOMICS 35—HOME ECONOMICS STUDENT TEACHING IN SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL.

Required for Degree in Vocational Home Economics

Senior Either semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Home Economics 15 and 25 or the equivalent. This course may either parallel or follow Home Economics 34. It provides for eighteen weeks in teaching and observation of Home Economics in the Peabody High School under the direction of a supervisor; for general conference once a week; and for individual conferences not less than twice a week. Students-in-training will be required to reserve periods for practice teaching, for teaching, for observation, and for conferences, the last to be arranged with the supervisor in charge of the work.

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSEHOLD ART.

PROFESSOR HARPER: ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR STEELE; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OWENS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR HALL. Office Room 16 Chappell Hall; Rooms 15, 17, 18 Chappell Hall.

The courses outlined in this Department are designed to meet the practical needs of homemakers, and to present thoroughly standardized training for Vocational Home Economics. All materials used in technical courses are provided by students, subject to approval of instructor.

HOUSEHOLD ART 1—DRESSMAKING—FIRST COURSE.

Freshman Elective Both semesters Two hours

This course includes lectures, discussions, and laboratory work; the use and adaptation of commercial patterns and designs to meet individual needs; the selection of inexpensive and appropriate materials; and the correct cutting, fitting and making of simple dresses of cotton and linen.

HOUSEHOLD ART 2—DRESSMAKING—SECOND COURSE.

Freshman Elective Both semesters Two hours

Prerequisite: Household Art 1 or equivalent. This course consists of lectures, discussions, and laboratory work. The use of original patterns and designs is encouraged in the making of dresses of wool and silk.

HOUSEHOLD ART 3—FALL MILLINERY.

Freshman	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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This course includes discussions, demonstrations, and laboratory work in the study of line, color and materials in relation to head dress; and the making and trimming of hats according to the prevailing mode.

HOUSEHOLD ART 4—SPRING MILLINERY.

Freshman	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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This course includes discussions and laboratory work based on same principles as work in Household Art 3. Hats are worked out in materials suited to the season.

HOUSEHOLD ART 5—SEWING.

Freshman	Elective	Both semesters	Two hours
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A short course which aims to help students who have inadequate knowledge of fundamentals in sewing. The course includes the making and upkeep of simple articles of clothing; the use of the sewing machine; simple embroidery and hand work; and a brief practical study of textiles.

HOUSEHOLD ART 7—SELECTION OF CLOTHING.

Freshman	Required for Vocational H. E.	Both semesters	Three hours
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When a three hour course is desired this credit may be obtained by taking, together with Household Art 1, 2, or 5, an extra hour of Selection of Clothing. The aim of the Work in Selection of Clothing is to present to the student her responsibility as a consumer and to aid her in applying the principles of art, hygiene, and economics to the problems of personal clothing. Lectures, readings and discussions are given. One hour only of credit may be obtained by taking lecture for one hour per week without either Household Art 1, 2 or 5.

HOUSEHOLD ART 11—CLOTHING PROBLEMS.

Sophomore	Required H. E. Dipl. and Vocational H. E.	First semester	Three hours
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The aims of this course are to teach the principles of clothing construction essential to the home maker and teacher of Home Economics; to develop technical skill; and to present the basis of subject matter for practice teaching.

HOUSEHOLD ART 12—HOME DECORATION

Sophomore	Required H. E. Dipl. and Vocational H. E.	First semester	Three hours
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A study of the principles of interior decoration with special emphasis on the selection and making of textile furnishings. The course is also planned to present subject matter for the student teacher of Home Economics.

HOUSEHOLD ART 14—CLOTHING APPRECIATION.

Sophomore Elective Both semesters Two hours

This course is planned especially for those students not majoring in Home Economics and may be taken without any prerequisite course or previous training. Its aims are to meet the practical needs of the average girl in solving the problems of choice, care, and cost of personal clothing. Two lectures, discussion, or demonstration hours per week are given.

HOUSEHOLD ART 17—TEXTILES.

Sophomore Required for Vocational H. E. First semester Three hours

This lecture course, with its laboratory experiments, considers the history of the textile industry, as an aid to the better understanding of modern developments in this art. A study is made of cotton, wool, silk, rayon, and linen, and of their properties and values in relation to use in the personal wardrobe, and in the home. Fabrics are studied in respect to fiber, weave, quality, approximate cost, and in relation to practical tests.

HOUSEHOLD ART 20—DRAFTING AND DRAPING.

Sophomore Elective Second semester Three hours

This course gives practice in the drafting, cutting, fitting, and designing of patterns; and a study of fundamental lines in dress, with their variations and adaptations. Its aim is to give freedom and originality in the use of patterns and materials in all phases of clothing.

HOUSEHOLD ART 21—DRESSMAKING—INTERMEDIATE.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Household Art 1 and 2, or their equivalents. This course includes lectures and discussions and the designing and making of more elaborate garments than in the elementary courses. Dresses for various occasions are constructed of suitable materials.

HOUSEHOLD ART 22—MILLINERY—INTERMEDIATE.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Two hours

Prerequisite: Household Art 3 or 4. This course includes discussions and laboratory work, and is designed especially to produce originality, creative power, skill and speed in manipulation.

HOUSEHOLD ART 23—CLOTHING FOR CHILDREN.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Household Art 11 at least concurrent. This course deals with the hygiene, economic selection, making, and care of clothing for children. Four ages are taken as types, baby layettes, one-year, five years, and twelve years old.

HOUSEHOLD ART 24—CLOTHING ECONOMICS.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Household Art 1 and 11. This course considers the problem of clothing, in its social significance: its cost for the home and the individual, from the standpoint of economy of time, money, and energy; budgets to be worked and submitted; and special emphasis on thrift, renovation and conservation.

HOUSEHOLD ART 27—TEXTILES—ADVANCED.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Household Art 1 and 15. This course presents a further study of the history of the textile industry, and an intensive study of fibres as to quality and cost. Fabrics are tested for adulteration, for dyes, and for standardization for general use.

HOUSEHOLD ART 29—COSTUME DESIGN.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Household Art 2, and some training in Art. In this course is included a brief outline of the history of costume and its development into modern dress; a study of design and color in relation to clothing and to the wearer. Problems are worked out through various mediums.

HOUSEHOLD ART 31—DRESSMAKING—ADVANCED.

Senior Elective Second semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Household Art 1, 2, and 21 or their equivalent. This course provides for instruction and advanced practice in the planning and making of various types of dresses involving good design, technique, and finish.

HOUSEHOLD ART 32—MILLINERY—ADVANCED.

Senior Elective Second semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Household Art 3 or 4, and 22. This course gives intensive work in designing and making hats. Emphasis is placed on the originality, technique, and artistic ability of the student.

HOUSEHOLD ART 33—ANALYSIS OF FASHION.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

In this course the causes and motives that contribute to fashion movements in dress are studied in relation to characteristics of costume of the past and present.

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE.

PROFESSOR HASSLOCK; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR TABB; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR STEELE; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR MORRIS; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR SMITH; MISS BURCH, MISS CHAPPELL. Office Room 0 Chappell Hall, Rooms 4-7, 10-14 Chappell Hall; Tea Room in Bell Dormitory; Lunch Room, Chappell Hall.

The courses outlined in this Department are designed with equal care to meet the practical needs of those specializing in this subject, and to provide fully standardized work for the Bachelor of Science Degree, majoring in this general division of Home Economics. The courses marked *required* are prescribed for all students desiring to do their major work in Household Science, and must be taken in the order indicated. The courses are open for election by students majoring in other departments who may desire certain courses in this department. In all cases, however, students electing this work for credit toward any degree must observe the prerequisite requirements for each course.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 1—FOODS AND THEIR PREPARATION.

Freshman Required of all Freshmen First semester Three hours

This general foundation course in Household Science deals with the source and use of foods, and with their preservation and digestion. The course includes also laboratory work in the principles of cooking, canning, table service.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 2—FOODS AND THEIR PREPARATION.

Freshman Required of all Freshmen Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Household Science 1. This course, which continues the work of Course 1, will also correlate lessons in the care of the home.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 14—FOOD STUDY-ADVANCED COURSE.

Sophomore Required for H. E. Diploma First semester Three hours.

Prerequisites: Household Science 1 and 2. This course deals with the more elaborate processes of cooking, the cost of foods, the serving of meals, the invalid's tray, the school lunch, and production, geographical and commercial distribution of foods.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 17—TECHNIQUE IN FOOD PREPARATION AND HOUSEHOLD MANAGEMENT.

Sophomore Required for H. E. Diploma Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Household Science 1 and 2. This course deals with the technique of food preparation and serving; laboratory care; and a detailed study of the managerial problems relating to the home. As an important part of this course students will give demonstrations before the class in the several kinds of cooking taught in the course.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 20—FOODS.

Sophomore-Junior-Senior Elective Each semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Household Science 1 and 2 or the equivalent. This course is for students whose majors are not in the field of Household Science. It treats of various types of foods, their geographical and commercial distribution, nutritive and fuel value; family nutrition, meal planning, preparation and serving to family sized groups. Housewifery problems of the teacher and young housewife will be discussed.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 21—DIETETICS.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 1 and 2, 14 and Chemistry 11 at least concurrent. This course deals with the principles of digestion, metabolism, and nutrition, and includes a study of the foods needed by a person under varied conditions of living, and the planning and preparation of dietaries to meet these needs.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 22—HOME COOKING AND SERVING.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 14, 17 at least concurrent. This course deals with the study of cookery, the preparation and serving of meals for the family, luncheons, teas, and other forms of entertaining.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 23—EXPERIMENTAL COOKING.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 14 and 17 at least concurrent or its equivalent. This course aims to introduce the student into research work in the problems of cookery through quantitative experimental work. Various processes of cookery are studied with a view to give the student a basis for forming independent conclusions as to the value of the methods commonly used in cooking.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 24—HOME MANAGEMENT.

Junior-Senior	Required for Vocational H. E. Degree	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 1 and 2. This course deals with a study of the business affairs of the household, including selecting and purchasing or renting a home, furnishing, home finances and investments, accounts and budgets, and scientific organization of the household.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 28—ECONOMICS OF THE HOUSEHOLD.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First or second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 17 and 24. This course deals with the economic problems of the household in its various relations with the outside world, and aims to help the homemaker solve her problems with regard to society in general.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 29—HOME TRAINING.

Senior	Elective	Either semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 14, 17, 24 and Household Art 12. In this course the student will make practical application of her knowledge of Foods, Household Decoration, and Household management while living for several weeks in the Home Management House.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 31—INSTITUTIONAL COOKING AND MANAGEMENT.

Senior	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 14, 17, and 21. This course includes a study of the institutional kitchen, practical work in institutional cooking, serving and management, and a course in catering and cafeteria management.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 32—NUTRITION.

Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 14, 17, and 21 and Chemistry 31, at least concurrent. This course includes a study of the body cell and its physiological and food needs in health and disease; and the study of problems in the adaption of diet to these needs.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 34—A SURVEY OF HOME ECONOMICS.

Senior	Elective	First semester	One hour
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Prerequisites: Household Science 1 and 2. This course is intended for advanced students not specializing in Home Economics. It will include a survey of the Home Economics Movement, its aims, ideals, and place in general education, and in the school curriculum and the community.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 37—SCHOOL LUNCH AND CAFETERIA MANAGEMENT.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 14 and 17 or equivalent at least concurrent. This course deals with the planning, preparation, and serving of the school lunch. It also includes the serving of milk to the children of the Practice School.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 38—SCHOOL LUNCH AND CAFETERIA MANAGEMENT.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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This course is a continuation of Household Science 37. It deals with the managerial phase.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 39—CHILD NUTRITION.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Either semester	Three hours
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Prerequisite: Household Science 21. This course deals with the problems of the nutrition of children from birth to late adolescence.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 42—NUTRITION.

Senior	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 21, 32, Chemistry 31. This course consists entirely of the managerial aspect of the School Lunch.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 44—TEA ROOM MANAGEMENT.

Junior-Senior	Election	First semester	Two hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 14 and 17 at least concurrent. This course includes a study of the Tea Room from the standpoint of its location, equipment, decoration, organization of work, keeping and settling accounts, managing help, preparation and serving of foods, and group psychology.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE 46—CATERING AND TEA ROOM MANAGEMENT.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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Prerequisites: Household Science 14, 17 and 44. This course is a continuation of course 44, but deals more fully with the managerial phase of tea-rooms and with catering for clubs, private homes, receptions, etc.

DEPARTMENT OF LATIN.

(See School of Foreign Languages.)

DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS.

PROFESSOR NAPIER: MISS NELSON. Room 29 Arts Building.

MATHEMATICS 1—SOLID AND SPHERICAL GEOMETRY.

Freshman	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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This is the first college course in Mathematics. The work is designed especially for those young women who have not had this subject, but who are expecting to teach Mathematics.

MATHEMATICS 2—TRIGONOMETRY.

Freshman	Elective	Second semester	Three hours
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This course is planned for young women who have not had this subject, but are planning to continue work in the Department of Mathematics.

MATHEMATICS 15—METHODS IN ARITHMETIC.

Freshman-Sophomore	Required in Normal Course	First semester	Two hours
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This course is intended to give a clear insight into the content of arithmetic by reviewing and vitalizing the subject, and at the same time stressing the principles involved in the presentation of its topics to the elementary grades.

MATHEMATICS 21—ANALYTIC GEOMETRY.

Sophomore	Elective	First semester	Three hours
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Prerequisites: Mathematics 23 and 24. This course will cover the straight line, circle, parabola, ellipse, hyperbola, tangents and normals and the general equation of the second degree.

MATHEMATICS 22—ANALYTIC GEOMETRY.

Sophomore Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Mathematics 21. This is a continuation of Mathematics 21.

MATHEMATICS 23—COLLEGE ALGEBRA.

Freshman-Sophomore Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Mathematics 2, or an equivalent. This course includes the progressions, permutations and combinations, binomial theorem, series, logarithms, general theory of equations.

MATHEMATICS 24—COLLEGE ALGEBRA.

Freshman-Sophomore Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: This is a continuation of Mathematics 23.

MATHEMATICS 25—METHODS OF TEACHING HIGH SCHOOL MATHEMATICS.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Mathematics 11, 12, 21, and 22. This course treats of the content of secondary mathematics, and the problems of teaching the subject.

MATHEMATICS 26—HISTORY OF MATHEMATICS.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Mathematics 11, 12, 21, and 22. This course will give an historical survey of the science, thus furnishing the student an intelligent appreciation of the subject from a knowledge of its sources and of its development.

MATHEMATICS 27—COLLEGE GEOMETRY.

Junior-Senior Elective Three hours

This course is for high school teachers of plane geometry to give them a background of subject matter. This course relates to the triangle and circle and includes the nine-point circle, the Simson line, and Ceva's theorem.

MATHEMATICS 31—DIFFERENTIAL CALCULUS.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Mathematics 21 and 22. This course will include all the common forms in differential calculus. Methods of differentiation, expansion of functions into series, with a brief study of maxima, with practical problems.

MATHEMATICS 32—DIFFERENTIAL CALCULUS.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Mathematics 31. This course is a continuation of Mathematics 31.

MATHEMATICS 33—INTEGRAL CALCULUS.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Mathematics 31 and 32. This course will cover derivation and the application of the fundamental formulas of integration, also applications to lengths of curves, areas, volumes, etc.

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC.

PROFESSOR TUCKER; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR ALLEN; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR HINES; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR HORSBRUGH; ASSISTANT PROFESSOR JENKINS; MISS McCLURE, MISS KLOMBURG. Studios in the Auditorium; Room 172 High School Building.

The College offers regular courses in Piano, Voice, Violin, and Public School Music. Music may be taken by students of any regular college course, provided the music is within the limit of the maximum hours allowed.

No College credit is given for any work in Elementary Music. (Courses A, B, C, D, E, and F.)

Students who desire to continue their study in music primarily for technics or skills but do not wish a credit course may elect a non-credit practice course, as in Music X, Y, or Z.

MUSIC A—PIANOFORTE—ELEMENTARY.

Technical exercises which give control of the muscles of the fingers, hands, and arms. Studies: "New England Conservatory," Book 1. Pieces: "Thirty-five Easy Pieces," New England Conservatory Edition. No credit.

MUSIC B—PIANOFORTE—ELEMENTARY.

Continuation of Music A. No credit.

MUSIC C—VOICE—ELEMENTARY.

Technical exercises which are intended to give breath control, voice placing, and articulation. Studies: Panofka, ABC, Book 1. Songs appropriate for the first year. No credit.

MUSIC D—VOICE—ELEMENTARY.

Continuation of Music C. No credit.

MUSIC E—VIOLIN—ELEMENTARY.

Modern methods of tone production and technique and relationship to proper position of violin and grasp of bow, theoretical and applied. Technical studies from Fischel and Sevcik. Solos in First Position. No credit.

MUSIC F—VIOLIN—ELEMENTARY.

Continuation of Music E. No credit.

MUSIC X—PIANOFORTE.

A non-credit course open to any student.

MUSIC Y—VOICE.

A non-credit course open to any student.

MUSIC Z—VIOLIN.

A non-credit course open to any student.

MUSIC 1 AND 2—SIGHT SINGING.

Freshman	Required of all Freshman	Both semesters	No credit
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Beginning Course. This course deals with the major scales up to five sharps and five flats, easy intervals and exercises, ear training and staff notation. The work is divided into three parts as follows:

1. Music Education Series: Introductory Music, and Elementary Music.
2. Supplementary Work in the following subjects: (a) Sacred Songs; (b) College Songs; (c) Folk Songs; (d) National Songs; (e) Cantatas, Light Operas, Operas and Oratorios.
3. Chorus singing.

MUSIC 3—PIANOFORTE—FIRST YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Prerequisite: Music B or its equivalent. Major scales. Technical studies—Kohler, Biebl, Duvernoy. Sonatinas. Selected pieces according to grade and ability. Two hours credit. Practice one hour daily.

MUSIC 4—PIANOFORTE—FIRST YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Continuation of Music 3. Two hours credit.

MUSIC 5—VOICE—FIRST YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Prerequisite: Music D or its equivalent. Technical exercises suitable for extending the compass of the voice. Studies: Panofka, Opus 85, Concone, Opus 9; easy English and Italian songs. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 6—VOICE—FIRST YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Continuation of Music 5. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 7—VIOLIN—FIRST YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Prerequisite: Music F or its equivalent. Continued study of technique as found in Sevcik, Opus 2 and Fischel, Opus 9, Book 2. Double Stop studies, and solos by Bohm, Papini, and others. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 8—VIOLIN—FIRST YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Continuation of Music 7. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 11 AND 12—SIGHT SINGING—TEACHERS' COURSE.

Sophomore	Required of all Sophomores	Both semesters	No credit
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Prerequisite: Music 1. This course deals with all the major scales, more difficult intervals and exercises, ear training, etc. The work of the first semester has two parts:

1. Music Education Series: The Teacher's Book.

2. Supplementary work, including: (a) Sacred Songs, (b) College Songs, (c) Folk Songs, (d) National Songs, (e) Cantatas, Operas, and Oratorios.

MUSIC 13—PIANOFORTE—SECOND YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Prerequisite: Music 4 or its equivalent. Major and minor scales. Technical Studies, Czerny Op. 636, Heller, Hanan, etc. Bach for beginners. Sonatas and the easier sonatas. Selected pieces according to grade and ability. Two hours credit. Practice one hour daily.

MUSIC 14—PIANOFORTE—SECOND YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Continuation of Music 13.

MUSIC 15—VOICE—SECOND YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Prerequisite: Music 6 or its equivalent. Technical exercises of increased difficulty. Studies: Seiber, Opus 42. Vaccai, Opus 241 to Page 10. Pieces of moderate difficulty. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 16—VOICE—SECOND YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Continuation of Music 15. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 17—VIOLIN—SECOND YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Prerequisite: Music 8 or its equivalent. Trill studies, double stop and etudes. Solos by Martini, Corti, Kreisler, Severn. Concertos by Ortman, Viotti, and others. (Three hours practice daily.) Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 18—VIOLIN—SECOND YEAR INTERMEDIATE.

Continuation of Music 17. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 21—MUSIC IN THE PRIMARY GRADES.

All students	Elective	Either semester	One hour
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This course begins with the sight reading of the Latin syllables, and considers methods of teaching music from the First to the Fifth Grades. Rote songs, and how to teach them, the care of the child voice, and the training of the "tone deaf" child.

MUSIC 22—MUSIC IN THE INTERMEDIATE GRADES.

All students	Elective	Either semester	One hour
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Prerequisite: Music 21 or its equivalent. This course continues the work of Music 21. Methods of teaching Music in the Fifth to the Ninth Grades are discussed. Two and three part singing at sight is taken up; and general practice in the use of the baton is given. Students in this course will be given an opportunity to teach and observe in the Peabody Practice School.

MUSIC 23—PIANOFORTE—FIRST YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisite: Music 14 or its equivalent. Major and minor scales, parallel and contrary motion. Technical exercises, Hanan, Wolff, Bereus, Braner, Czerny Op. 299, Heller. Elementary Bach, two and three part inventions. Mozart Sonatas. Selected pieces according to grade and ability of student. Two hours credit. Practice two hours daily.

MUSIC 24—PIANOFORTE—FIRST YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 23. Two hours credit.

MUSIC 25—VOICE—FIRST YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisites: Technical exercises, minor scales. Studies: Vaccai, Opus 241, pages 10 to 22. Lutgen, Opus 654, pages 1 to 7. Pieces according to the voice and ability of students. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 26—VOICE—FIRST YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 25. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 27—VIOLIN—FIRST YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisite: Music 18 or its equivalent. More advanced Technical exercises, and Double Stop Studies. Etudes-Mazas. Opus 36, Book I. Solos by Dancla, Wienawski, Corti, Brahms, and others. (Four hours practice daily.) Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 28—VIOLIN—FIRST YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 27. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 29—MUSIC IN THE GRAMMAR GRADES.

All students	Elective	Either semester	Two hours
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This course covers the work of the Grammar Grades. Two and three part singing is taken up. Common and compound time discussed and practiced in the song material for these grades. Music appreciation methods will be continued. Through the use of descriptive and imaginative music this will lead into the study of rhythms, forms, and orchestral instruments.

MUSIC 33—PIANOFORTE—SECOND YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisite: Music 24 or its equivalent. Major and minor scales, dominant and diminished sevenths, thirds, sixths, and tenths, contrary motion, etc. Technical exercises, Pischua, Phillip, Cramer, Czerny Op. 740, etc. Bach, Well Tempered Clavichord. Beethoven Sonatas. Selected pieces according to grade and ability of student. Two hours credit. Practice two hours daily.

MUSIC 34—PIANOFORTE—SECOND YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 33. Two hours credit.

MUSIC 35—VOICE—SECOND YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisite: Music 26 or its equivalent. Technical exercises. Rapid scale passages and trills. Studies: Lutgen, 664, pages 16 to 27. Bordogni,

Opus 432. English, Italian and French Ballads and Arias. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 36—VOICE—SECOND YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 35. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 37—VIOLIN—SECOND YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisite: Music, 28 or its equivalent. Technical exercises of increased difficulty. Etudes from "Kreutzer Forty Etudes." Solos by Alard, Vieuxtemps, Kreisler, Auer. Sonatas by Mozart, Handel, Beethoven and Grieg. (Five hours practice daily.) Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 38—VIOLIN—SECOND YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 37. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 41—PRINCIPLES OF MUSIC TEACHING.

All students Elective Either semester Two hours

This is a course especially designed for the student desiring to become a Supervisor of Music. *Prerequisites:* Music 21 and 22, or their equivalent. Two years of Harmony. At least one year's study of Voice. Ability to play easy hymn tunes at sight. In this course all problems of the school room are discussed, and a very thorough training in all subject matter pertaining to public school music is given.

MUSIC 42—MUSIC SUPERVISION.

Elective Two hours class work—18 weeks Two hours

A course designed for students desiring to become Supervisors of Music.

Prerequisites: Music 21, 22, 29.

Special work in chorus conducting and practice teaching given.

MUSIC 50—MUSIC APPRECIATION FOR THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

All students Elective Either semester One hour

Course open to all students interested in music, especially those desiring to become music teachers and supervisors. The work is divided into four parts: Fundamentals, Vocal Music, Orchestra, Music History.

MUSIC 51—COMMUNITY SINGING LEADERSHIP.

Elective All students Summer Session Two hours

Lecture, demonstration and practice.

MUSIC 53—PIANOFORTE—THIRD YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisite: Music 34 or its equivalent. Review of scales in all forms. Technical studies, Noscheles, Joseffy, Chopin studies. Beethoven Sonatas. Concertos of different composers. Bach, Well Tempered Clavichord. Selected according to grade and ability of student. Two hours credit.

MUSIC 54—PIANOFORTE—THIRD YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 53. Two hours credit.

MUSIC 55—VOICE—THIRD YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisite: Music 36 or its equivalent. Technical exercises continued. Studies: Nava, Opus 437. Songs of increased difficulty and one role from one opera according to the voice of student. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 56—VOICE—THIRD YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 55, and a general review. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 57—VIOLIN—THIRD YEAR ADVANCED.

Prerequisite: Music 38 or its equivalent. Double Stop Studies. Sevcik, Opus 1, Book 4. Review of Kreutzer Etudes. Etudes by Fiorillo. Solos by Correlli, Ernst, Veracini, Corti, and Kreisler. Concertos by Rode, Wienawski, or Mendelssohn. (Five hours practice daily.) Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 58—VIOLIN—THIRD YEAR ADVANCED.

Continuation of Music 57. Two hours of credit.

MUSIC 67—HARMONY—FIRST YEAR.

All students	Elective	First semester	One hour
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Major and minor scales. Intervals. Principal triads of the major scales. Principal triads of the minor scales. Chords of the Sixth, and chords of the Sixth and Fourth. Harmonize melodies using chords above. Harmonize basses using chords above.

MUSIC 68—HARMONY—FIRST YEAR.

All students	Elective	Second semester	One hour
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Chords of the Dominant Seventh. First inversion of Dominant Seventh chords. Second inversion of Dominant Seventh chords. Third inversion of Dominant Seventh chords. Harmonize melodies using chords above. Harmonize basses using chords above.

MUSIC 69—HARMONY—SECOND YEAR.

All students	Elective	First semester	One hour
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Prerequisites: Music 67 and 68. Supertonic Triads, Submediant Triads and Mediant Triads with inversions of same. Other Secondary Triads. Harmonize melodies using chords above. Harmonize basses using chords above.

MUSIC 70—HARMONY—SECOND YEAR.

All students	Elective	Second year	One hour
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Prerequisite: Music 70. Open position—Dispersed Harmony. Chords of major ninths. Chords of minor ninths. Inversions of chords of major and minor ninths. Diminished Seventh chord. Inversions of Diminished Seventh chord. Harmonize melodies using chords above. Harmonize basses using chords above.

PHILOSOPHY.

(See School of Education.)

DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

PROFESSOR MILLER: ASSISTANT PROFESSOR IRELAND (in charge); ASSISTANT PROFESSOR JONES; MISS SMITH; MISS CANDLER; MISS MOYE. Basement Terrell Hall Annexes B and C; basement of the New Dormitory.

The work of this Department is closely related to that in the Department of Health. The aims of the work in Physical Education are, to keep every student up to her best physical condition; to correct faulty posture and to encourage the formation of habits of hygienic living, thereby securing bodily vigor and a healthy and symmetrical development.

Careful records of each student are kept by the Department. During the first week of each semester and the last week of the college year, the Fall and Spring measurements of all students are taken. A test is made of the strength, lung capacity, vision, and general health of every student. The results of these tests are recorded on special health cards, which are kept on file for inspection and reference.

The work of the Department includes class instruction and drill, out-of-door sports, and walks, all under careful instruction and supervision as the case may require. The amount of work required in Physical Education is as follows: All students in the Freshman and Sophomore years are required to take a minimum of three periods of Physical Education each week. During the Junior and Senior years the work is elective. No exceptions are made during the first two years of college, except in the case of students who, for good reasons, have secured a physician's certificate recommending that they be excused from this work. Such students must substitute other work of equivalent amount to these courses (Courses 1-2 and 11-12.)

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 1—GYMNASTICS, ATHLETICS AND MEASUREMENTS.

Freshman	Required of all students	First semester	No credit
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The activities of Physical Education are motivated through plays and games, principally, and consist of group games, rhythms, marching, folk-dancing, clogging, games of skill, corrective exercises, hiking, and athletics. Three hours a week.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 2—GYMNASTICS, ATHLETICS AND MEASUREMENTS.

Freshman	Required of all students	Second semester	No credit
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This is a continuation of Course 1: The selection and adaptation of games of low organization, leading to highly specialized and organized forms will be presented. The progression to baseball and basket ball is indicated. Three hours a week.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 4—SELF TESTING ACTIVITIES.

Freshman	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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This course is especially designed for majors in order to give them a workable knowledge of testing activities suitable for grammar grades and high school.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 11—GYMNASTICS, ATHLETICS AND FOLK-GAMES.

Sophomore	Required of all students	First semester	No credit
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Work of the preceding year continued and, in addition, the classification of plays and games according to the group-age periods of the child; physical educational activities for the primary, elementary, and secondary schools are carefully considered in detail in order to help the students conduct intelligently the playground work of the public schools. Three hours a week.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 12—GYMNASTICS, ATHLETICS AND FOLK-GAMES.

Sophomore	Required of all students	Second semester	No credit
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Continuation of Course 11, and considering in addition the school athletic festival promoted with a purpose. Three hours a week.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 18—TECHNIQUE OF BASKETBALL AND SOCCER.

Sophomore	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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The fundamentals of both games are given, skill and technique acquired, and practice in coaching and refereeing obtained.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 19—COACHING OF BASEBALL, TENNIS, VOLLEY BALL AND MINOR SPORTS.

Sophomore	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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This course includes lead up games to baseball and volley ball, and technique of playing baseball, tennis, volley ball, deck tennis, hand ball and other minor sports.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 21—ADVANCED FOLK-GAMES AND NATIONAL DANCES.

Junior-Senior	Elective	First semester	Two hours
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A course which deals with folk-games and dances of different nationalities and a study of the life of the people as portrayed by dance forms. Typical dances of Denmark, Sweden, England, Ireland, Scotland, Holland, Russia, France and America will be studied.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 22—ADVANCED FOLK-GAMES AND NATIONAL DANCES.

Junior-Senior	Elective	Second semester	Two hours
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A continuation of Physical Education 21.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 24—THE PRINCIPLES OF CORRECTIVE PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

Junior-Senior Elective First semester Three hours

This course aims to give the student a working knowledge of the variations of the normal types of the human organism. It also presents in a practical way faults of posture commonly found in growing children. Lateral curvature of the spine, round shoulders, and weak flat feet will be studied. Students will practice individual corrective work with small groups under supervision. Through massage is sought the scientific manipulation of the tissues of the body in striking, friction, kneading, percussion, and vibration.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 28—THE ORGANIZATION OF PLAY-GROUNDS AND COMMUNITY RECREATION.

Senior Elective First semester Two hours

This course is planned for girls who are interested in leadership of indoor social activities and the direction of plays and games on the playground.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 30—HISTORY AND PRINCIPLES OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

Senior Required First semester Three hours

This course begins with the study of primitive man and traces the development of Physical Education from that time to the present. The basic principles of Physical Education are sought out and applied particularly to life and need of American peoples.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 31—KINESIOLOGY.

Senior Elective First semester Two hours

This course deals with the principles and mechanisms of bodily movements and also presents a study of posture in relation to a number of environmental influences. Influence of posture in relation to the health of the body and the efficiency of various movements stressed through motivation and attitudes; effects of various rhythmical exercises, and various plays and games and athletics on posture, with reference to the physical, mental, and social expression of the individual.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 32—PAGEANTS AND FESTIVALS.

Senior Elective Second semester Two hours

In this course stories are studied which lend themselves to dramatization. Fundamentals of pageants and festivals are considered and practical experience is given in producing festivals.

DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICS.

PROFESSOR ROGERS. Office Room 38 Parks Hall; Laboratory Room 38A Parks Hall.

PHYSICS.

PHYSICS 3—GENERAL PHYSICS.

Freshman Elective First or second semester Three hours

In this course a rapid survey is made of the subject, stressing the more important laws and principles. It is adapted primarily for those who wish to review the subject quickly, or to provide for the prerequisite to Physics 21 and Physics 22. The course consists of three lecture periods a week.

PHYSICS 4—HOUSEHOLD PHYSICS.

Freshman Elective First or second semester Three hours

This course is designed for those who wish the household applications of Physics, especially adapted to students in Household Science. Emphasis is given to the subjects of heat, electricity, and light. The course consists of two lecture periods and one two-hour laboratory period a week.

PHYSICS 21—PRINCIPLES OF PHYSICS.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

This course is a study of the Science of Physics, especially designed for those who plan to teach this science in high schools; a thorough study will be made of the principles of mechanics, light, and sound along with their problems and applications. It includes two lecture periods and one two-hour laboratory period a week.

PHYSICS 22—PRINCIPLES OF PHYSICS.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisite: Physics 3. This course continues the work of the preceding course, especially in the subjects of electricity and heat.

PHYSICS 24—PROBLEMS AND APPLICATIONS OF PHYSICS.

Junior-Senior Elective Second semester Three hours

Prerequisites: Physics 21 and 22, one of which may be concurrent. Great emphasis is placed on the problems illustrative of the principles of Physics. Trips are made in the locality for the purpose of studying the modern applications of the subject. The course consists of three lecture periods a week.

PHYSICS 25—THE TEACHING OF PHYSICS.

Senior Elective First semester Two hours

Prerequisites: Physics 21 and 22; Chemistry I. This is a training course for those who expect to teach Physics in secondary schools. Students prepare demonstrations, assemble laboratory apparatus, and assist in the oversight and direction of laboratory sections assigned them. One hour per week is devoted to the pedagogy of the subject, and to equipment, texts, etc.

SCIENCE.

PROFESSOR ROGERS: ASSISTANT PROFESSOR TAIT. Room 38 Parks Hall.

SCIENCE 15—THE TEACHING OF SCIENCE IN THE GRADES.

Sophomore Elective or required in Normal Course Either semester Two hours

This course is offered because of the increasing demand for teachers who are competent to teach nature study and science in the grades. It includes both subject matter and methods as well as the discussion of suitable texts and reference works.

GENERAL COLLEGE REGULATIONS**PRINCIPLES OF GOVERNMENT.**

It is unnecessary to give here all the rules and regulations by which the College is governed. It suffices to say, in a general way, that the government is the very best that experienced, intelligent, conscientious officials can make it. The splendid discipline heretofore maintained is a guarantee that the laws, written and unwritten, by which the student body is governed, have been wisely ordained and are discreetly, but firmly, enforced.

STUDENT SELF-CONTROL.

As far as possible the government will appeal to the highest and noblest incentives. Self-control on the part of the student will be expected. Students will be placed on their honor and trusted to do what is right unless they prove themselves unworthy. Whenever it is considered best for a student, or for the institution, that the student should be withdrawn from the College, the parents will be notified and the request must be complied with. Such notices are very rarely given, but this right must be clearly understood.

REGULATIONS OF THE COLLEGE.

To prevent possible misunderstanding on some points, it is perhaps best to state explicitly the following regulations:

1. *Place of boarding.* Students from a distance are not allowed to board out of the dormitories except by special permission of the President, and then only with near relatives.

2. *Visits Home.* In addition to the usual Christmas holiday vacation students are allowed one week-end visit home during the month of November and another week-end visit during the month of March. On such visits students are expected to go directly to the home of their parents or guardians and not to visit class mates or friends. However, students may be permitted to visit near relatives upon the request of the parents or guardians. Students are not allowed at other times to absent themselves from the College, or from any recitation, in order to pay visits home or elsewhere, except in special cases when approved by the President of the College.

3. *Attendance upon religious services.* Attendance upon the Sunday morning church service is required of every student except in case of sickness, or for other valid reason. Students are expected to attend the church of their parents' choice, and, unless Seniors, are forbidden to change from church to church except for good reason. Students have the opportunity of attending the College Bible Study Classes on Sunday mornings, and the College Y. W. C. A. services on Sunday evenings. Attendance upon these student services is most earnestly advised, but is not required. All students are required to attend the morning exercises in the College Chapel.

4. *Visitors not allowed in students' apartments.* Visitors are not admitted to the private apartments of students, unless by special permission from the matron.

5. *Sending boxes of edibles.* Parents are advised not to send boxes of edibles.

6. *Wearing the College Uniform.* The college uniform must be worn, as required, on all occasions; the wearing of the uniform, however, is optional in the case of Seniors. On all trips to and from home students must be dressed in the college uniform.

7. *Card playing and smoking prohibited.* Card playing and smoking are absolutely prohibited.

8. *Prompt return after visits home.* Students who go home for week-end visits and the Christmas holidays, must return on the appointed day. Any student violating this rule will be liable to forfeit her place, both in the dormitory and in the College.

9. *Remaining at College for Commencement.* Every student must remain at the College through the Commencement exercises, unless called away by some providential cause, or excused by the President for some good and valid reason. Any student wilfully violating this rule will thereby forfeit her place

in the College. All students upon whom a degree is to be conferred or who are to receive a diploma or certificate, must be present at the Commencement exercises unless excused by the President.

10. *Lingering in Milledgeville prohibited.* Students will not be allowed to linger in Milledgeville after any college vacation begins unless their parents address to the President a written request to that effect.

11. *College regulations after the College closes.* The college regulations regarding the conduct of students continue after the close of the College until the students reach home.

12. *Cheating on Examination.* Students cheating on examination will be liable to punishment by expulsion from the College.

13. *Jurisdiction over local and boarding students.* Local students and those boarding in private families are subject to special rules and regulations.

14. *Responsibility for reading regulations.* Parents and students are requested to read all the articles in the Catalogue on General Information about the College and its Government, on Business and other regulations to which students must conform, on the Courses of Study and the Degrees and Diplomas offered by the College, on Supervision of the College, and on the subject of the College Uniform Dress. In no case should a student come to the College until she has received a formal certificate of admission in reply to her application

ATTENDANCE UPON CLASSES.

Students will be held responsible for attendance upon all regular and special class exercises in the courses to which assignment has been made. Absences, which will be carefully registered, will constitute a part of the student's total college record, and may, if multiplied, lead to a failure in the courses assigned, since a percentage therefor is deducted from the grades.

ABSENCES AND EXCUSES.

In cases of enforced absence from the College on account of sickness, either personal or of relatives, the student will be expected to present, upon return to the College, a certificate from the attending physician, certifying to the sickness, which shall be filed as a part of the student's college record.

COLLEGE ATHLETICS.

The interest in athletics is made an integral part of education in the College. The ideal is to have out-of-door games in moderation for all students, and especially for those who need them most. Ample provision is made for such games as are suited to young women; and athletics, under competent supervision and direction, receive an enthusiastic interest as a vital part of college life. No intercollegiate games are played.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND HEALTH.

Certain fundamental courses in Physical Education and in Health are required of all students, as may be seen by reference to the Courses of Study, and the departments, dealing with these subjects. Advanced instruction may be had in either subject. The College insists upon making the cares of health and physical well-being a matter of primary concern in education.

CARE OF THE SICK.

Every effort will be made to care for those who are ill. In case of serious illness, parents or guardians will be notified. Patients will be taken to the Parks Memorial Hospital, where they will have the care of the trained nurses and attention of a physician.

GENERAL STATEMENT.

The Department of Business Administration is maintained, with offices in Parks Hall, for convenience, efficiency, and economy in handling the business interests of the College. Through this Department are administered funds received and disbursed by the institution; including receipts from the students, and from other sources, the payment of college bills, the distribution of faculty salaries when received from the Treasurer of the College, the custody of students' personal funds when deposited with the College, the handling of textbooks and certain college supplies, and other matters involving money transactions.

BUSINESS REGULATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC.

No part of the music tuition money will be refunded to a student on account of her withdrawal in the midst of a month. Three months of four weeks each constitute the scholastic term in the Department of Music.

Full deduction will be allowed for the loss of music lessons for the one week of Christmas holidays.

Students taking double lessons must pay double fees. Students using piano for practice more than the specified number of periods must pay extra fees according to overtime.

TERMS OF BOARD.

Board in the dormitories, including fuel, light, etc., costs \$18.00 per month. Besides this, there is an additional fee of \$2.00 monthly for laundry. The payments for board should be made as follows:

- September—First payment.
- November—Second payment.
- January—Third payment.
- March—Fourth payment.
- May—Fifth payment.

These are the regular charges for all the dormitories except Terrell Hall, and its annexes, Ennis Hall, and Bell Hall where there is an extra charge of \$4.00 room rent each month.

Students leaving the dormitory for any cause will be charged board until the expiration of the school month in which they leave. Under no circumstances will deductions from board be made for an absence of less than one month. No deductions from board will be made for the Christmas holidays.

Special notice. Students must not engage board in the dormitory unless they are able and willing to comply with all the above requirements.

TEXTBOOKS AND STATIONERY.

As a matter of economy and convenience, textbooks and certain stationery supplies are handled through the Bursar's Office of the College, whence students may usually buy all that is needed in the work of the College.

BUSINESS REGULATIONS.

1. *Matriculation fee.* The matriculation fee of ten dollars must be paid, in every instance at the beginning of each semester. No deduction from this fee will be made on account of late entrance, nor will any part of it be refunded under any circumstances. This payment is required by the state law.

2. *Tuition.* Tuition is free to young women from the State of Georgia. Students from other States than Georgia are charged a tuition fee of \$50.00 per year, payable \$25.00 at the beginning of each semester.

3. *Board.* Board in the dormitories is payable in advance every two months.
4. *Books and stationery.* Students furnish their own books and stationery.
5. *Visitors.* Parents and friends visiting students ordinarily cannot be accommodated in the dormitories, as there is no room for them. They can secure board in private families near the College, or at hotels.
6. *Making accounts at stores.* Parents, as far as possible, should discourage the making of accounts at stores by their daughters.
7. *Students' deposited funds.* Money deposited with the Bursar for safe keeping will be held by him subject to the check or order of the student or her parents.
8. *Preventing wasteful spending of money.* Parents who may wish the Bursar to prevent the wasteful spending of money by their daughters must instruct him to that effect; otherwise, every student will be allowed to draw money from her deposit account and spend it.
9. *No money advanced.* Patrons must not ask the Bursar to advance or lend money to students for any purpose whatever.
10. *Effect of suspension.* If a student is suspended from the College, she must pay the entrance fee of ten dollars upon her return.
11. *Faculty salary checks.* The salary checks of the faculty are presented through the Bursar's Office.

THE DORMITORIES.

The dormitories of the College are as follows: The Mansion, the Annex, Atkinson Hall, Terrell Hall and its Annexes A, B and C, Ennis Hall, and Bell Hall. The buildings are arranged, furnished, and equipped throughout in the best possible manner for the purpose intended. Everything is done to make them comfortable, pleasant and healthful homes for the students. The style of living is in every particular as good as that found in the best conducted and most refined colleges.

PRINCIPLES OF SUPERVISION.

The students in their domestic life in the dormitories are under the direct control of the President and of the Matrons.

It is needless to give here in detail the rules and regulations by which life in the dormitories is governed. Suffice it to say that they are such as require of every student good morals, good order, neatness, promptness, faithful discharge of duty and lady-like conduct.

FURNISHINGS BY STUDENTS.

Students are required to furnish their own blankets, sheets and other bed-covering, pillow-cases, towels and napkins. Every student should also bring a raincoat, pair of overshoes, and an umbrella.

DOMESTIC TRAINING.

In the college dormitories students are required to care for their own rooms and to keep them in good order, and to do some of the lightest dining-room work, such as serving the table. Pains are also taken by the matrons and housekeepers and the instructors in Home Economics and Health to instruct all students carefully in other details of housekeeping, including especially household cleanliness and sanitation.

It is believed that this system of discipline and work is an admirable training for the students and will go far toward fitting them for the responsible duties of housewives and home-makers.

CARE OF THE SICK.

1. *Dormitory infirmaries.* In each building a large airy, comfortable room is provided as an infirmary. It is furnished in a manner suitable for a sick person, and the inmates receive the most careful nursing and attention. Students who are ill are promptly removed from their bedroom to the infirmary or to the Hospital, if necessary.

2. *The Parks Memorial Hospital.* The Parks Memorial Hospital, constructed by the alumnae with the assistance of the Faculty, students, and friends of the College without cost to the State, is fully equipped to care for the sick of the College. A graduate nurse of much experience and common sense is in charge and is assisted by a corps of competent nurses and servants.

COLLEGE UNIFORMS.

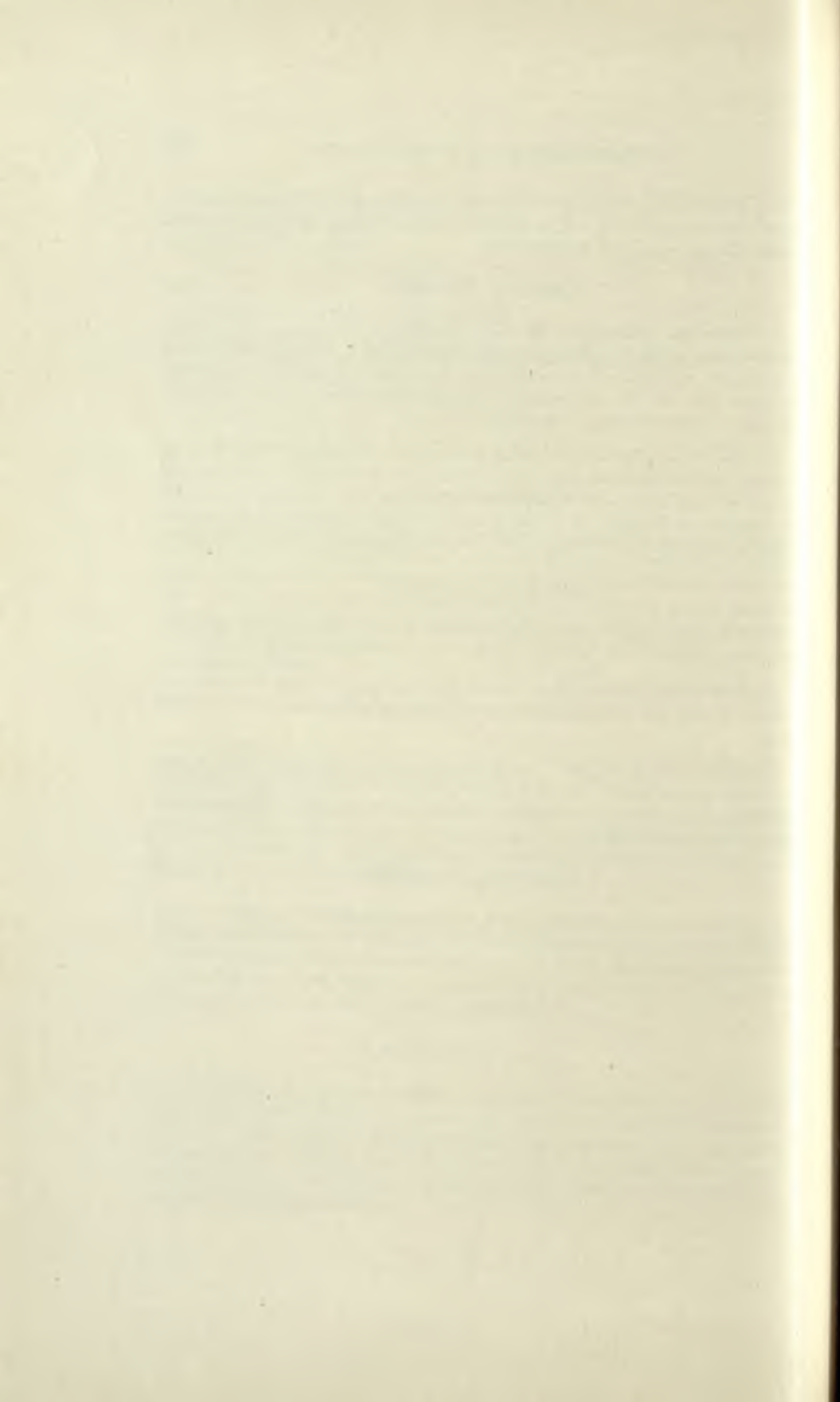
All students, except Seniors and students over 21 years of age and who have taught three years, are required to wear the college uniform.

A great saving is thus made in the students' expenditure of money and effort. It also produces a democracy of spirit and fellowship in the student body.

A circular containing full information concerning the uniform will be sent to every student soon after she has been admitted to the College. Students must not undertake to make up this uniform, or buy any part of it, until after the circular is received.

ACADEMIC COSTUME.

Candidates for baccalaureate degrees will wear at commencement the standard bachelor's cap, gown, and hood, the latter bearing the college colors, brown and gold.
