
### THAT GC FEELING ...



The Georgia College Colonials Club held its annual awards banquet May 24 at Georgia College and honored two student athletes and a person from the Milledgeville community for their contributions to the intercollegiate programs. The Colonials Club awards to the outstanding male and female athlete went to Kevonne Stouder, a senior member of the Georgia College women's gymnastics teams, and Darin Chaplain, a member of the Colonial baseball team. The student awards are based on athletic ability, academic ability, and leadership.

The Colonials Club William Childers Service Award went to Mr. Don Allen, Manager of Milledgeville Ship and Shore Travel Agency. Allen has been working with the intercollegiate program at Georgia College for the past few years and has been instrumental in travel arrangements not only for Georgia College's teams but from teams around the nation who come to Milledgeville for various special events, including the NAIA National Women's Gymnastics Championships and various playoffs in soccer, basketball, and baseball.

Stouder, a native of Warner Robins, Georgia, has competed in varsity gymnastics for four years at Georgia College. She has maintained a 3.5 grade point average in two academic majors and has been named an Ali-American Ali Around Gymnast in both the AIAW and the NAIA. She helped lead the Georgia College women's gymnastics team to two national titles in 1981 and 1982.

Chaplain is a junior from Mableton, Georgia. He has maintained a 3.2 grade point average. He posted a 10-2 record on the mound for Georgia College this season with a 3.46 ERA and was instrumental in the Colonials successful bids for the District 25 NAIA Championship, the Area Championship, and the teams going on to the NAIA World Series in Lewiston, Idaho.

Georgia College Colonials Club is the official booster organization for the intercollegiate athletic program at Georgia College and provides a number of scholarship awards and special events, including the annual all sports dinner.











#### **DEBATE TEAM**

The Georgia College Debate Team had an active winter quarter this year. Debaters Terry Knighton and David Sulzbacher competed in tournaments at the University of South Carolina, Berry College, and Georgia Southern College. Knighton and Sulzbacher won rounds against teams from the University of Tennessee and the University of North Carolina-Wilmington. Debaters Tammy Higdon and Thomas Baldwin joined Knighton and Sulzbacher for the tournament at Berry College. In spring quarter, Knighton and Sulzbacher took Higdon and Baldwin by a 2-1 decision in a public debate in Russell Library.

#### JOURNALISM MAJOR APPROVED

The University System of Georgia Board of Regents gave approval to Georgia College for its four year degree program in Journalism last February. The new bachelor of science degree program went into effect Spring Quarter. The new Journalism program will have three areas to concentrate in. They are Public Relations, Advertising, Print, and Telecommunications.

Journalism majors at Georgia College will be able to make use of excellent facilities including the recently completed television studio in Atkinson Hall, headquarters of the Georgia College cable television project (GCTV) as well as the media lab located in the English Building that was developed through funding from the Knight Foundation. #### NURSING DEPARTMENT RECEIVES NATIONAL ACCREDITATION

The Spectrum staff would like to congratulate the Nursing — Department on receiving full accreditation by the National League for Nursing in December of 1983.

According to spokesperson Mary Collins, although partial accreditation is sometimes given to institutions, the Nursing Department received the full unconditional accreditation until the next review in eight years.

Georgia College offers a Baccalaureate degree program in Nursing and places students in clinical internships in a number of central Georgia hospitals. The NLN accreditation means that GC Nursing graduates have access to a number of professional graduate programs, scholarships, military promotions, and various forms of financial aid.

GC Nursing students are able to take advantage of a number of clinical learning laboratories including the VA Center in Dublin, the Medical Center of Central Georgia in Macon, and Central State Hospital in Milledgeville.

#### **NOVA**

The NOVA Orientation Leaders are upperclass students who volunteer their time to help new students and their parents learn about Georgia College. During the summer orientation sessions, held this summer on July 11 - 12 and August 8 - 9, they lead small group discussions, conduct campus tours, and generally help the new students and their parents feel comfortable at GC. They also have major responsibilities at the fall orientation (held just before the start of fall quarter), at other quarterly orientation sessions, and at additional college functions throughout the year. Members are chosen during winter quarter, and trained in the spring.

#### S.G.A.

The Spectrum would like to congratulate the Student Government Association (SGA) officers for the 1984-85 year. They are: President, Chuck Claxton; Vice President, Liz Reynolds; and Secretary-Treasurer, Avis Russell. Executive elections are held at the end of Winter Quarter every year, and Student Senate elections are held in the Fall. The SGA office is in room 143 of MCU. Students are welcome to drop by and get to know their officers and senators.

#### EAST CAMPUS COMPLEX FORMED

Georgia College has an East Campus Complex. The complex consists of Rocky Creek Park, the Georgia College lake lot next to it, and the Lake Laurel Facility.

Rocky Creek's facilities include bath houses, a pavillion with office and storage space, grill, dock, picnic area, beach, swimming area, nature trails, and primitive camping facilities. Located next to the Rocky Creek Park is Georgia College's lake lot, for use by the college community. Its facilities include a dock, picnic tables and grills, and a boat ramp. The third member of the complex is Lake Laurel, the oldest of the three college facilities. It is located on Lake Laurel Road and has a lodge that sleeps 43, docks, sailboats, and canoes.

Floyd V. Anderson, who is Director of Recreational Services, oversees the facilities at the East Campus Complex. Anderson reported that the park can be used by GC recreation majors as a practical training facility. "They can now do internships on campus, instead of having to go off campus," he said.

Anderson also added that in the off-season of Rocky Creek, groups will be able to use the park in the afternoons and evenings and on weekends by reservation. Reservations can be made by calling the complex office at 453-4294. Rocky Creek Park is open daily from May until September.

#### **EXTERNAL DEGREES**

Georgia College has initiated a special degree program in Macon that will allow Macon area students to work toward the bachelor of business degree in management and the master of business administration degree.

The courses will be offered at Macon Junior College and taught by Georgia College faculty members. The courses are a part of university system sponsored external degree program.

Courses began in September. Program coordinator for Georgia College is Dr. Bruce Brumfield. The new four year degree and graduate programs will allow Macon students to complete class work without coming to main campus in Milledgeville.

#### FLANNERY O'CONNOR SYMPOSIUM

Georgia College hosted the third Flannery O'Connor Symposium Saturday, April 14 and Sunday, April 15 in Milledgeville. The symposium entitled "Of Time and Place and Eternity", was "a weekend of thoughtful and lively lectures, films, and tours of the writer's terrain". Speakers for the 1984

event included Ralph Wood on the Protestant response to O'Connor's fiction; J.O. Tate on O'Connor's "Southern-ness"; and Frederick Asals on violence in O'Connor's works. Presenting The Flannery O'Connor Memorial Lecture was Sally Fitzgerald, who read excerpts from the forth-coming biography. The symposium events also included a visit to Andalusia Farm north of Milledgeville, where O'Connor did most of her writing.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF BLACK AWARENESS MONTH

"Achievement Against the Odds Through Education" was this year's theme for Black Awareness Month held in February.

An exhibit at the Museum of Archives of Georgia Education opened the month. The title of the exhibit was "The Integration Years - 1950 to Present". It was the culmination of four years' research and was partially funded by the E.C. Mitchell Fund, the Grumman Aerospace Corp., and an institute of museum services grant. The exhibit displayed a general view of desegregation in Georgia.

A black history symposium on integration was held. Featured at the symposium were Dr. Thomas Armstrong, a G.C. history professor; Dr. Marcellus Barksdale, a professor and specialist of oral history; and Dr. Melvyn Williams, an attorney from Macon. The symposium was co-sponsored by Phi Alpha Theta, a national honorary society for history majors at G.C. The symposium and oral history project were supported by grants from the Georgia Endowment for the Humanities and the National Endowment for the Humanities.

"A Tribute to Harriet Tubman", a one woman act play showed events in the life of this famous Abolitionist. The event was sponsored by the Allied Arts Division of the Milledgeville-Baldwin County Recreation Department and Georgia College Lyceum.

In addition, Dr. Luther Burse, who is President of Fort Valley State College, gave a speech at Peabody auditorium. The month ended with musical performances from "The Waller Family" and "The Voices of Joy". "The Voices of Joy" is a local gospel group in which several G.C. students are members.

#### **ALUMNI NOTES 1984**

The Georgia College Alumni Association honored a number of individuals at the annual Alumni Weekend April 27-28.

William Zarkowsky, Vice President of Grumman Aerospace Corporation in Milledgeville, has been named recipient of the Golden Key Award. Zarkowsky will be retired from Grumman this spring and is scheduled to teach a special seminar in the Georgia College School of Business. He holds a bachelors degree in Aeronautical Science from New York University and a masters degree in Industrial Management from MIT.

Zarkowsky served as President of Grumman Aerospace and a member of its Executive Committee. He is on numerous engineering comittees and is a member of Kappa Sigma, Delta Sigma Pi, and lota Alpha. Zarkowsky is a member of the Georgia College School of Business Advisory Cabinet, and Economics for Executive Forum.

Sarah Anne Staples, Professor of Biology at Andrew College in Cuthbert, Georgia, was selected recipient of the Alumni Service Award for 1984.

Ms. Staples received her B.A. degree from Georgia College and an M.S. degree from the University of Georgia. She has held two National Science Foundation grants for study and research and was a Rotary scholar in Norway.

At Georgia College Ms. Staples was elected to Phi Sigma and was listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. She has received local, state, and national acclaim for her work with Phi Theta Kappa National Scholastic Fraternity for Junior Colleges. She was named Outstanding Sponsor 1980 of the organization.

Laura T. Hillman has been named recipient of the Alumni Achievement Award. Ms. Hillman taught voice for several years in the Georgia College Department of Music and is currently on the faculty at Florida State University. She holds an undergraduate degree from Georgia College and a masters from Columbia University.


Martha S. Lucas, Editor '83-'84
