Attending the two-day conference of the Georgia Intercollegiate Press Association held at Emory University March 30-31 were Mary Lott Walker, editor; Mickey Young, news editor; and Jean Crook, managing editor, of the Colonnade.

About 40 college newspaper journalists met for the purpose of forming the Georgia Intercollegiate Press Association. This newly organized unit will represent the thoughts and ideas of its members toward more freedom of expression in college newspapers throughout the state of Georgia.

Larry Custer, editor of The Emory Wheel, stated at Friday's meeting that, "By banding together in an organization, we may have freedom of the press, and we may be much stronger as college journalists".

A dinner in honor of those attending the conference was given Friday night at the Henry Grady hotel in Atlanta by the "Georgians for George" movement. Material concerning the re-election of Senator Walter F. George was given the group and questions were asked concerning his platform.

At the last meeting on Saturday, the members voted to have a charter and creed to help strengthen the organization. The group further voted to have a monthly newsletter to be published September through May with the exception of December.

Officers elected at Saturday's meeting were: Larry Custer, president; Jim Meloney, vice president, editor of the Mercer Cluster; Selby McCash, secretary, editor of the University Signal; and Jo Lenderman, treasurer, North Georgia College.

Elected as trustees were: Mickey Young, News editor of the Colonnade at GSCW; Walt Guthrie, news editor of the University Signal, Georgia State College; and Joan Bailey, editor of the Periscope, Shorter College.

Since the meeting at Emory, the members have planned another meeting to be held at Emory University May 19.

Addition Is Made To Memorial Collection

The GSCW library received recently an addition to the Alberta Telfair Gould Memorial Collection. This collection includes books in the fields of geography and travel. Among the recent additions are guidebooks on Greece, North America, Paris, and West Germany; Fielding's Guide to Europe: 1955-56; and travel books on China, India, England, and South America.

In 1921, five hundred dollars was given to the GSCW library for the specific purpose of buying materials in the fields of geography and travel to honor Alberta T. Gould who was librarian in the GSCW library from 1899 to 1906. In March, 1922, the college library committee obtained a bronze plate to mark the collection; but when the library grew and moved into the present building, it was not considered neither appropriate nor practical to continue the books as a separate collection.

The original correspondence establishing the fund was lost in a fire that swept through the administration building of this institution in December, 1924. Then contact with Mrs. Gould's two daughters was lost. Only recently was the college informed of the wishes of those who established the fund.

The money has now been invested in government bonds. The daughters, Mrs. L. G. Koch and Miss Mildred R. Gould of Greensboro, North Carolina, made an additional contribution to the fund last August. This Alberta Telfair Gould Memorial Collection will be further enlarged as the interest on the bonds accumulates.
