Miss Wood, a member of the College's women's gymnastics team, had earlier won the talent competition with a gymnastics routine and Miss Fordham was named first in the swimsuit competition.

Debra Barrineau of Macon was honored as Miss Congeniality.

The new Miss Georgia College represented Terrell Dormitory


in the competition. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Savage of Chamblee, she was named Miss Basketball of 1969, Homecoming Queen of 1970, and was elected to the school Hall of Fame at Cross Keys High School.

Although she's only in her second quarter at Georgia College, Deby is serving as President of her dormitory House Council and is a member of the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Club and the Sounding Board.

Her education plans include continued study of mental retardation and physical therapy.

As Miss Georgia College, Deby receives a scholarship, a number of gifts from Milledgeville merchants, and the right to represent the college at the Miss Georgia Pageant to be held in Columbus in June.

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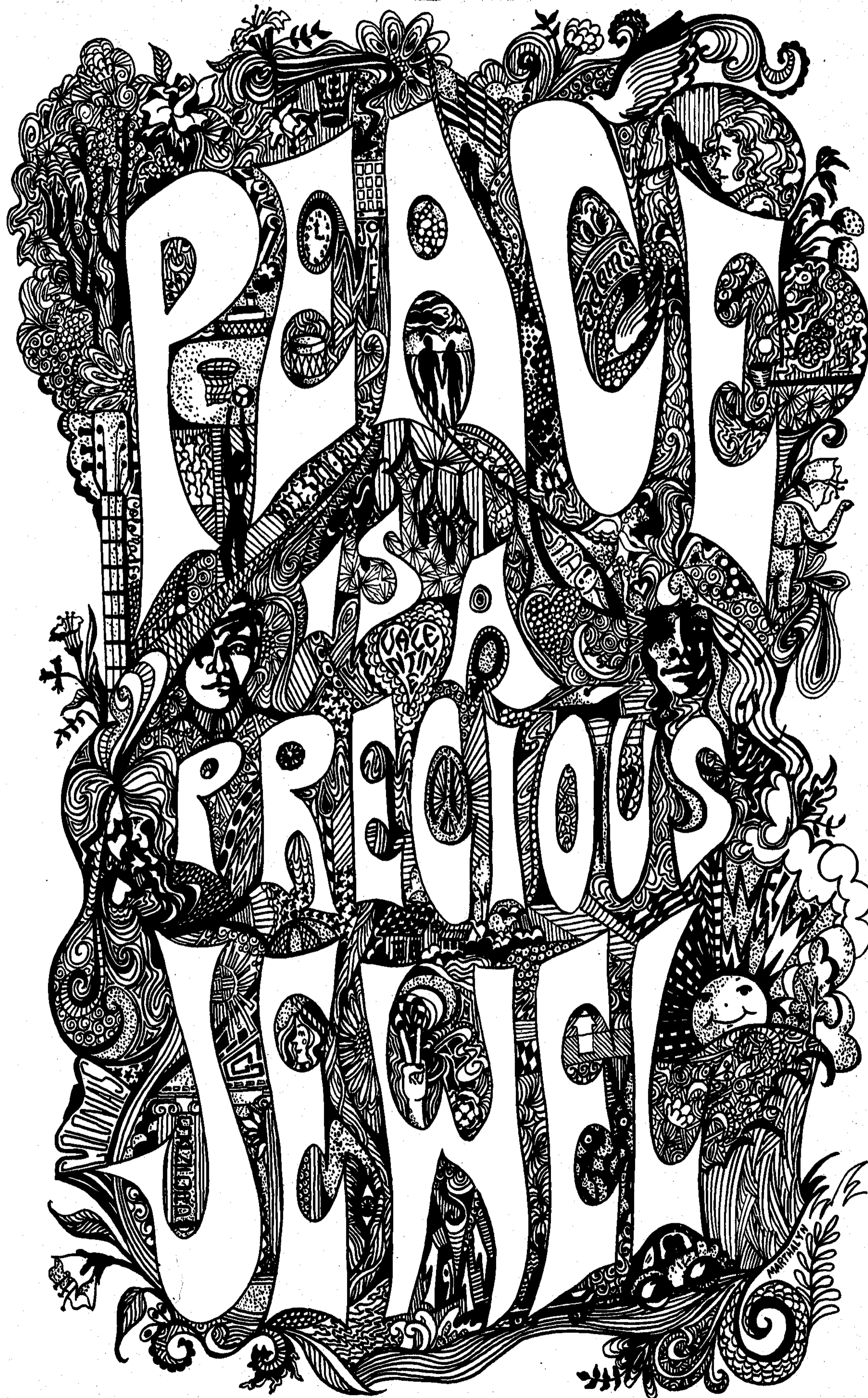

The Student Activities Budget is another problem which must be faced. I will work to get more student control of our money. I also would like to see the Athletic program's money separated from the Student Activity fee.

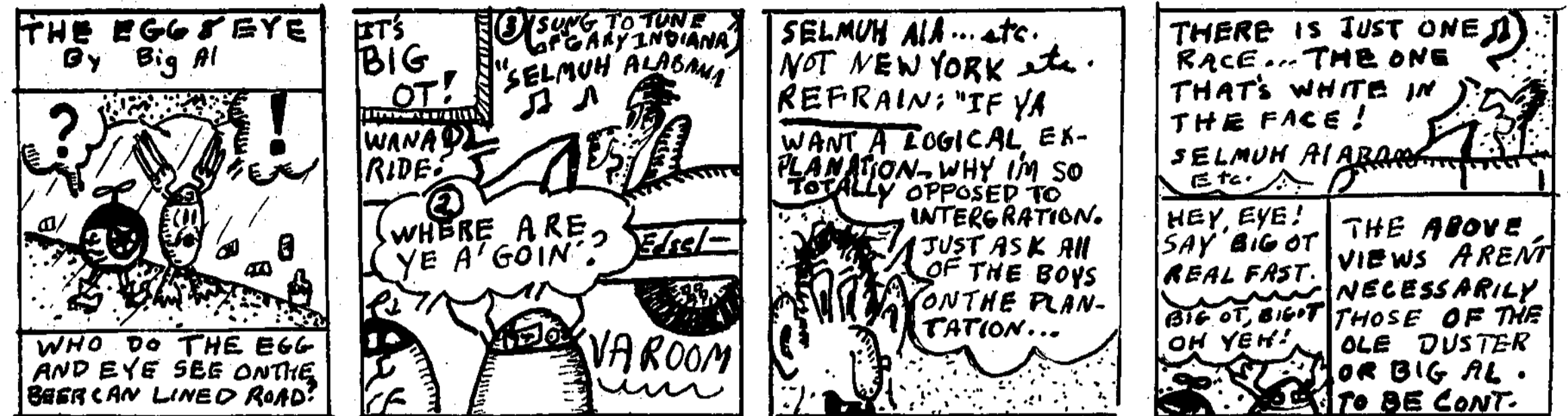
Slipper must be revamped to include more students. This spring we will have open meetings of any and all interested students to take in any ideas and to decide on a definite solution more pleasing to more students.

These things bring sadness because they show how alone each of us really are.

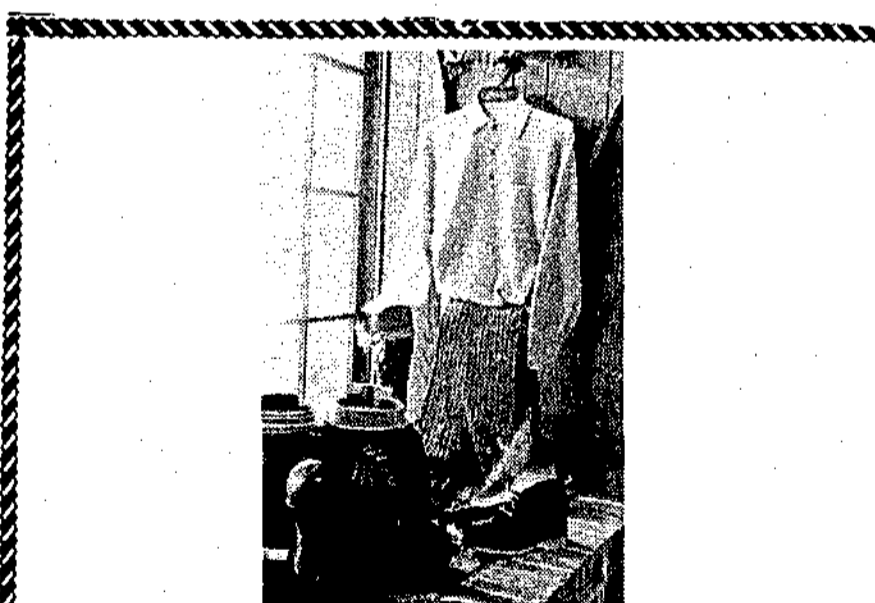
At the end of the song, we are told that "there is no return" from the "Long, long road" of life. And that wouldn't it be better to share our love--

# Colonials Edge Norman, GC Women's Gymnastics Team Beats Georgia

The Georgia College Colonials, still suffering from cold shooting and the absence of key performers, fell before Middle Georgia and La Grange College in recent games, but managed to overcome stubborn Norman College.

Panthers proved too much for the Colonials to handle. The Georgia College five managed to stay close in the first half, trailing 30-25 at intermission, but were unable to keep up as LaGrange put on a scoring burst in the second half.

Tuesday in Cochran, the Colonials took the courts without starting guard Randy Howell, who was forced to stay behind because of illness. Sorely missing Howell's ability to get the ball downcourt under pressure and suffering from long shooting droughts, the GC five came out on the short end of a 99-83 score.

Mark Stallings again led GC scorers with 16 Jimmy Hires had 12, Jim Tungate 11, and Randy Howell 9. Alan Garner collected 6 points, Aaron Nix and Danny Power 2, and Tom Wells one.

At one point, Coach Ron Luke's charges went 11 minutes and 39 seconds without a field goal. Behind by as much as 25 points at times, the Colonials redeemed themselves to some extent with a scoring flurry in the closing minutes.

Calvin Williams led the Panthers with 28.

Forward Alan Garner led Georgia College scorers with 20 points, 14 of them in the second half. Mark Stallings had 13, Jim Tungate 15, and Jimmy Hires and Tom Wells 11 each.

Now 5-8, the Colonials face Southern Tech Thursday at 7:30 in the Baldwin Gym and entertain Georgia Southwestern in a homecoming match Saturday. That game will also start at 7:30 at Baldwin. Yet another home game, against Norman, is scheduled to nest Thursday.

The little town of Norman Park in South Georgia was the scene Saturday of one of the Colonials' most suspenseful contests of the year. The Georgia College squad pulled out a 50-48 victory over Norman College as Jim Tungate hit both sides of a one-and-one free throw situation with nine seconds left on the clock.

The Colonials led for most of the game, but never by more than four points. The halftime score was 22-20 in GC's favor. Mark Stallings and Alan Garner again ad good nights, Stallings scoring 15 and Garner 12.

Jimmy Hires and Randy Howell had 9 points each, and Tom Wells hit 2. Tungate, whose two free throws put the game away, had a total of 3 for the game.

In Monday's game with LaGrange College in the Baldwin Gym, the powerful

Tuesday in Athens, the Lady Colonials took first place in three of four events to defeat Georgia 60.7-57.3. Sheila Wood took first place in floor exercises while Pat Floyd captured firsts in both vaulting and uneven parallel bars.

Crystal Fountain placed third in floor exercises. Debbie Ginn second in vaulting and Doris Floyd second on the balance beam.

Injuries took their toll on the GC girls Saturday, as they fell before George Peabody College in Nashville, Tennessee, by a score of 63.05-55.4. Pat Floyd was unable to compete in the vaulting event because of an injured foot and Crystal Fountain was out of action altogether.

Still, the performances of Sheila Wood, Debbie Ginn and Doris Floyd kept Georgia College close. Sheila took second place in floor exercises, vaulting and uneven parallel bars, and Doris placed second on the balance beam.

Debbie gained first place in the vaulting competition, the only first the Lady Colonials calimed in the meet.

The next action for the gymnasts will come Saturday at 11 in the GC gym as they entertain Florida State University. A home meet with Tulane is set for 7:30 p.m. on February 17.

## Columbus Downs GC 97-76

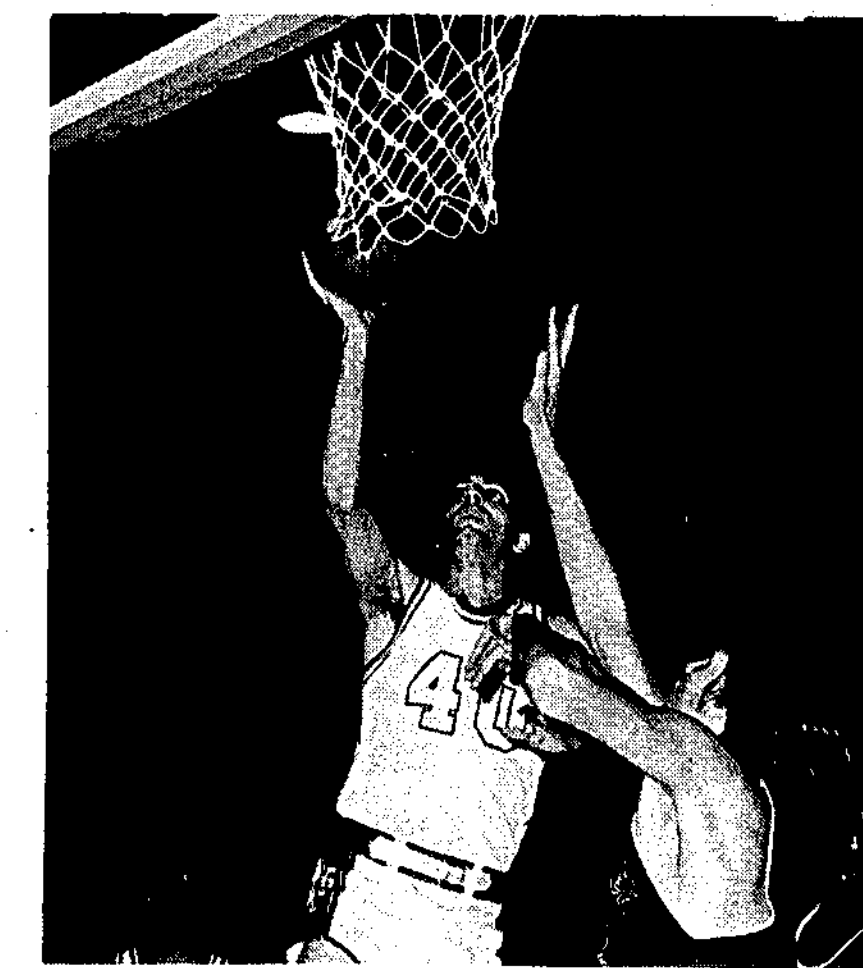
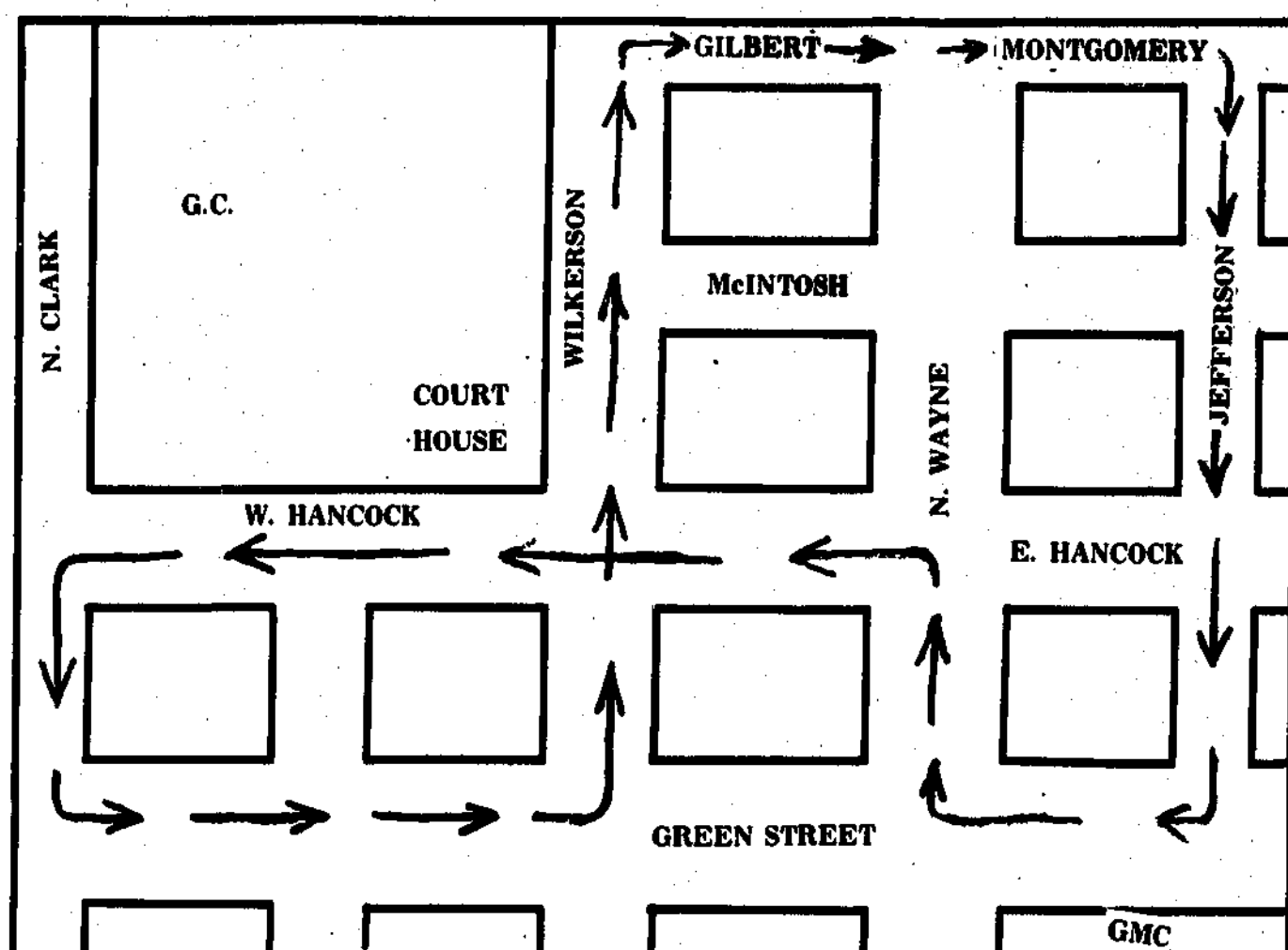
"Why doesn't anyone cheer?" asked Georgie as he poked the boy next to him. "Oh! I didn't mean to wake you," said Georgie apologetically.

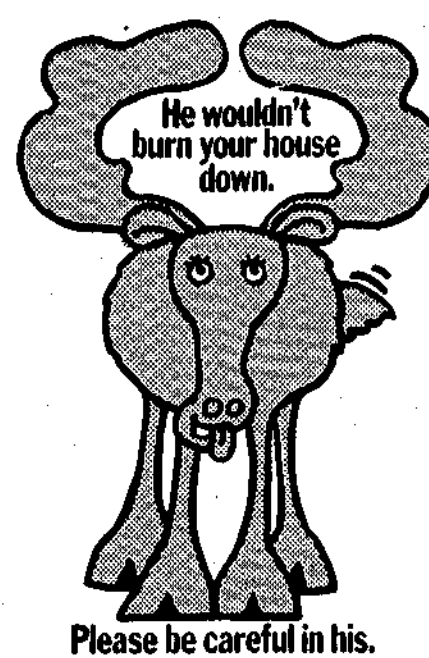

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## Former Drug Addicts To Perform At GC

"Marathon", a play in which former drug addicts probe the causes and treatment of addiction, will be presented at Georgia College on February 24 at 7:30 p.m. in Russell Auditorium.

The play will be open to the public, with tickets to go on sale at the college February 17.

"Marathon" is a two-hour capsule view of the philosophy and techniques used in the rehabilitation of addicts at Rhode Island's Marathon House. Eight current residents of the house, all between the ages of 15 and 23, recreate scenes that take place during addiction and rehabilitation in a series of improvisational skits.

The program emphasizes social attitudes and psychological problems as they relate to drug addiction and demonstrates the Marathon method of stripping the addict of his pretensions and self-deception, forcing him to deal with his problems with com-

plete honesty.

"Marathon's" stress is on communication. The message is not "don't smoke" or "don't use dope", but "Stop copping out. Turn on to yourself and others without drugs."

The play will be followed by a "rap session" in which the actors will answer questions from the audience.

Marathon House is described as a therapeutic community dedicated to the certain knowledge that drug addiction can be cured, but only through the elimination of the basic cause of which addiction is a symptom. Great emphasis is placed on developing a responsible involvement with others as well as a real sense of concern for them.

The name "Marathon" is derived from one of the community's basic therapeutic methods, an extended group therapy session lasting from 25 to 40 hours with only a brief break for sleep.

## Music Teachers To Attend

### Workshop At Georgia College

A pair of outstanding music educators will be on the Georgia College Campus Friday and Saturday to Feb. 12 & 13 to work with piano teachers from across the state as part of a Piano Teachers Workshop jointly by Georgia College and the Eighth District Georgia Music Educators Association.

John Bigg, Visiting Pianist-in-Residence at the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music, and Lawrence Rust, Associate Professor of Music and Head of Piano Pedagogy and Instruction at Northern Illinois University, will be featured at the workshop.

Registration will take place from 3 to 5 p.m. and from 6:45 to 7:45 on Friday.

At 8 p.m. Friday, Bigg will perform in a Russell Auditorium concert. The program will include works by Beethoven, Terence Allbright and Liszt.

Saturday's activities will begin with another registration session from 8:30 to 9 a.m. A lecture and discussion session will begin at 9, a master class with students at 11, another master class at 1:30, and an electronic piano laboratory demonstration at 6.

Adjournment is scheduled for 6 p.m.

## Social Research Project Underway

Senior students studying Methods of Research in Social Relations under the Department of Sociology are conducting a social research project the results of which should be both interesting and informative to the Georgia College community. Last year a similar group of sociology majors conducted a study that concentrated upon behavioral patterns, educational goals, and college traditions. The class this year has chosen to survey students and faculty with respect to a wide variety of political, ethical, environmental, curriculum, civil rights, and student rights issues intending to compare local findings with those presented in national surveys and polls.

The researchers have prepared original questionnaires and will distribute them to a stratified randomly selected sample of 200 GC students and to the population of faculty members. The class will then analyze and interpret the data utilizing various electronic coding and data processing machines.

The students who have been selected will be notified personally early next week and requested to meet in the North Dining Room of the college cafeteria anytime between 9:00 A.M. and 12:00 Noon on

Thursday, February 18th for distribution of the form. Refreshments will be served to participants! The survey is quite easy to complete and should require less than 20 minutes of one's time.

In addition to this campus-wide poll of students and faculty, two other topics are being pursued by the students in this sociology class. One group is conducting a survey of workers in the college cafeteria with a series of questions related to job satisfaction and organizational analysis. The other group is conducting structured interviews of 50 youths at Boddie Junior High School in order to study their degree of delinquent behavior and alienation.

## U. S. Backed Invasion Of Laos Triggers Student

### Anti-War Response

Don Gurewitz, National Executive Secretary of the Student Mobilization Committee, the largest student antiwar group in the U.S., and student antiwar leaders from Georgia State University, Oglethorpe College, and Emory University will announce plans for a spring offensive against the war.
