Changed Proposed Farewell Address Given For Judical System At Final Meeting Of Several important changes to the judiciary system of the College Government College Government Association of Countin College (3) An Investigator of Student Indiciary to be appointed by the College Senate

College Government Association of Georgia College were recently proposed. At the final meeting of winter quarter of the Student Senate on February 24, Senator Carol Payne, the newly elected female co-chairman of Honor Council, proposed several amendments to the Constitution and to the Code of Laws of the College Government Association of Georgia. These amendments, introduced with the intent of improving the current judicial system, which many GC students have found neither satisfactory nor effective in its purposes and procedures, are basically as follows:

(1) The name of the Honor Council will be changed to Student Judiciary. Everywhere in the CGA Constitution and Code of Laws the term "Honor Council" is used, Student Judiciary will be substituted.

(2) The student body will elect one chairman, who will vote only in case of a tie, to head the Student Judiciary rather than two co-chairmen, as has been

(3) An Investigator of Student Judiciary to be appointed by the chairman with the approval of the CGA President will be in charge of investigation of all potential cases concerning violations of student conduct delegated to the Student Judiciary as provided for in the CGA Constitution.

(4) The Honor Code as such will be abolished, and the rules and regulations over which the student Judiciary will have jurisdicition will be those listed under "Student Conduct" on pages 20-21 of the current Student Handbook.

Otherwise, with the exception of a few minor changes for clarification, our judicial system will remain as it is.

These proposed amendments were put into the Judicial Committee of the Senate. If this committee recommends their passage, the amendments must be approved by a two-thirds' majority of the Senate by roll call vote at two separate Senate meetings and, then, be presented to the student body for ratification or rejection.

Georgia College Students Volunteer Help At CSH

There are approximately 25 Georgia College Students actively involved in volunteer work at Central State Hospital this year. Through the efforts of the Agape Community Service Coordinator, these students have gotten several worthwhile programs underway.

A new program was started this year in the adolescent division. G.C. students have worked sorting, counting, and filing books to begin a resource library for the adolescents. The students will then use this library as an aid in their tutoring of the adolescents. A one-to-one contact between tutor and student has been set up. Agape has also provided an opportunity for the adolescent girls to visit our campus. The tutorial program and the visit,

to the campus have provided new learning and socilization experiences for these adolescents in allowing them to mingle with people nearer their own age.

There are also several great programs involving the Children's Division. G.C. students operate the token store (part of the behavior modification program) each week. Through this activity, the college students get to know the children on a more personal basis.

There has been a big-brothertype program set up in this division. This relationship between the students and children allows for reinforcing positive behavior and for providing a close friend for the children. Their participation in the Student Senate has been atrocious. The only time that they have made it to Senate sessions, in mass, has been only to acheive their own selfish goals. There is no visible evidence of any contribution, either academic or social, to Georgia College. In order for Pi Beta Alpha to attain recognization as a campus

organization, then the circus best quit clowning around.

The student center will soon be completed. The governing body if this student center should be composed 100 per cent of students. The functions of this building should be exclusively student. The proposed government gives students little voice and succumbs them to the whims of a few in the administration. You as the governing body of the students should investigate, formulate, and dictate the government of your college union building. Do not stand idlely by and tolerate this farce. You have been warned. Get off your posterior and not only head off, but counter attack the proposed ridiculous proposal.

The Senate this year has been a failure. I wish that there was some nice way of saying it--but there is none. Those who campaigned with such gusto, like gusto quickly fizzled away. But like the old saying goes, "There are a few good apples in every rotten barrel." There are a few Senators who have shined and shown extraordinary interest. To you I say, "Do not be discouraged by a few defeats, but continue fighting." And when all else fails, go to Dr. Bunting. He is your best bet for action. Do not burden him with petty grievances, but I have learned that he is ready, willing, and able to help you or

any student. My final mandate and maybe my most important is to the Student Senate. To Juan, I challenge you to conduct orderly, productive meetings. Our constitution gives you the responsibility to hold four meetings per quarter, follow Robert's Rules of Order, and do other duties. You, the Senate, have the responsibility to see that he carries out his responsibility. A majority of the membership must be present to conduct a meeting. His power is not unreproachable. If a quorm is not present, then call for a quorm call and if there is not one present, have the secretary record it in the minutes, then

appeal it to Honor Council. It's a two-way street--you, Juan, and you, the Senate--must keep each other in line.

The good Lord and Mr. Fuller willing, I finish March 10th, and after some of the things I said tonite, I'd better get out. If you're offended, the truth usually does hurt. But before I go, I will give you one last chance to put me on the firing line-any questions?




