In addition, since only the dormitory students were on campus and since each residence hall had its own recreation facilities, the College Union remained closed until Monday morning.

To all the students who survived the weekend on campus, and to all who fought slushy roads to return on Tuesday morning, thank you for your cooperation. Here's to the "Great Snow of '73"! It will be long remembered.

Remember Thy Meal Ticket

Students have often wondered why dorm students are required to buy meal tickets. The Colonnade held an interview with the Dean of Students, Dr. William Littleton, to see if this question could be answered.

Dean Littleton stated that the regulation had a definate purpose behind it. The meal program has to have some way of knowing approximately how many students will be eating. This is the best way for the food services to know. If the college didn't operate this way, the prices would be much higher than they are now.

The food services do not receive money from the State of Georgia or from the colleges. They operate solely on what they take in. "The purpose," said Littleton, "is not to make money for the school, but to save money for the average student."

There are three reasons for which a student may be exempted from buying a meal plan. If a student's class scheaule prevents him from eating lunch and supper he need not buy a meal ticket. The same is true if a student has an off-campus job that causes him to miss major meals. Also, if a student's physician requrest that he be exempt from buying a ticket, he may do so.

Another development that has worried many students is the new rule concerning meal slips. As of last week, should a student forget his meal ticket, he will have to go back to the dormitory and get it. Meal slips will no longer be given out. The Colonnade asked Dean Littleton why this policy had been implimented. He stated that on some days from 40 to 50 people come through the line without their meal tickets. Before they can be issued slips, their records have to be checked to see if they purchased tickets. "It was becomming a physical impossibility," said Littleton. The Dean remines students that their meal tickets are cash equivalent and must be carried to meals.

Jan Williams:

"We have found," Collett added, "that many young people are seeking a way to do something on their own volition that can make a difference. Their support of AFSC's programs has been identified by many of them as one way to make a difference to the thousands of victims of this war."

The AFSC will more than double its efforts in the year ahead to respond to the accumulated misery of the Indochinese people.

It is equally important," said Collett, "that Americans keep wellinformed about the role of the United States in Vietnam. Many of the involvements of our country in Vietnam have taken place with the American people unaware of the sweeping and tragic nature of those involvements."

The AFSC operates a prosthetics and rehabilitation center at Quang Ngai, north of Saigon, which fits maimed civilian victims of the war with artificial arms and legs. Medical and surgical supplies have been provided to North and South Vietnam by AFSC over a period of several years, and the AFSC's spokesmen have been prominent in efforts to convince the United States to get out of Vietnam conferring in Hanoi, Paris, Saigon, and Washington, D.C. with representatives of all warring factions.

AFSC's peace action role in the United States has dated from 1954 when the Board of Dirdctors warned against U.S. involvement in Vietnam at the time of the Geneva agreement. Since then it has carried out unceasing peace education and action efforts that have included teach-ins, draft and military counselling, the 1969 "March Against Death" in Washington, D.C., and the development of printed and audio-visual material revealing the facts about the war and U.S. involvement often buried under the propaganda of the governments

Funds raised for the million-dollar campaign will go to support the initiation of new AFSC war relief programs in all parts of Vietnam and for domestic and international work for peace in Indochina.
