Return To Yesteryear

In a move to alleviate certain societal and health problems in the state, a degree program first offered at Georgia College 56 years ago has been reestablished at the Milledgeville institution of higher

When Georgia College was known as the Georgia Normal and Industrial College, it became in 1917 the first college or university in the nation to offer a major leading to a B.S. degree in health education. The degree program was later dropped.

The new bachelor of science degree program at GC, approved by the University System Board of Regents in October, is based on criteria established by a task force of educational consultants and accepted by the State Department of Education.

The new program will be used to certify teachers in health education from kindergarten to the twelfth grade.

The major, an interdisciplinary one, will involve the departments of biology, home economics, sociology, education, and health, phusical education, and recreation at GC.

Four courses are now being added this fall to the GC curriculum in addition to those dealing with health education. The new courses are mental health education, communicable and non-communicable diseases, curriculum developments in health education, and a tobacco, alcohol and drugs course.

Currently offered during the fall quarter are personal and community health, and health education in the secondary school. During the winter quarter, courses to be offered will include public health principles and administration, first aid and safety education, personal and community health, school health, and health education for the elementary teacher.

Since 1971, health education has been required in all public secondary schools in Georgia and the need for better qualified health educators has become acute.

A trend noticeable throughout the U.S. has been for certification of all health education teachers and this is expected to become true in the Peach State, according to Dr. Sam James, assistant professor of health, physical education, and recreation at the college.

Such problems as premarital pregnancy, venereal disease, the high divorce rate, consumer health and quackery, poor nutrition, and emotional disturbance cry out for a course such as that now reestablished at the college, says Dr. James, program coordinator.

GC and the University of Georgia are the only institutions of higher learning in the state to offer degrees in health education.

Tryouts for the production itself are slated for November 26, at 6:30 p.m. in Russell Auditorium. The requirements are: Major Roles: 4 women and 4 men; Supporting Roles: 11 women and 11 men; Chorus: Large Number: Dancers: 5 women and 5 men.


Miss Benton is a member of Sigma Alpha Iota, a music fraternity for women, and the Music Teachers National Association.

Going Up

A contract to erect the first unit of the new physical education building at Georgia College has been awarded to the T.M. Nickles Construction Co. of Augusta, according to an announcement made by Fame which will enshrine four Dr. J. Whitney Bunting, college president.

A bid by the Augusta firm of \$468,900 was accepted on November 1 by the Georgia Education Authority.

The building will be constructed on the new GC athletic complex two miles west of Milledgeville, just off Georgia 49.

The red brick, one-story structure will house offices of the health. physical education, and recreation department at GC, an all-purpose room, dressing rooms, shower facilities, and an equipment storage

Another unit, to be connected later to the first, will house additional classrooms, a gymnasium, and a swimming pool.

Completion of the first unit is expected next November with occupancy slated for the beginning of the 1974-75 winter quarter.

Architect for the new building is Barker and Cunningham of Atlanta.

The new athletic complex, two miles from the main GC campus in downtown Milledgeville, was carved out of a pine forest with excavation beginning in June, 1971. College athletic teams currently use the eight tennis courts, two softball fields, a baseball diamond. and a soccer field at the site for intercollegiate competition. Other events, including an annual outdoor living institute, are held at the complex.

Floyd V. Anderson, director of the department of health, physical education, and recreation, called the awarding of the bid "part of a dream fulfilled" and " a great step forward in implementing continually-growing programs of the department."

"When both units in the building are completed, the structure will be among the finest of its kind in the South," he pointed out, adding that he had high hopes that the other unit on the complex will be started as soon as possible.

The present health, physical education, and recreation building at the college, approximately 40 years old, will be used in conjunction with the new unit until the entire athletic complex is finished, ac-
